2 Men Get 7 Years For Four Thefts

Chester Lee Blevin, 35, and William David Laswell, 23, were sentenced a total of seven years each in the penitentiary Thursday on two charges of storehouse breaking and two charges of dwellinghouse breaking.

The two entered pleas of guilty. Four juries were empaneled, each with a single case, and fixed the men's punishment. The pair received two years each for breaking and entering the home of Dollie Abney at Renfro Valley, and two years for breaking and entering the home of Monroe Abney at Renfro Valley. They received two years for breaking-in at the Mt. Vernon Hardware and one year for entering the Southern Store at Mt. Vernon. The four terms will run consecutively; that is, another term will begin following the completion of the previous term. The court failed to order the terms to run concurrently together.

This ended a trail of thieves that saw a couple of home and businesses allegedly entered in Rockcastle, Jessamine and Fayette counties. When arrested at the home of Blevin in Laurel County, about \$5,000 in loot was recovered. Other loot was recovered later in Jackson County where the men supposedly sold it.

It took little more than an hour for the completion of the case. Each jury remained out only about 10 minutes.

John P. Landrum, 59, Buried At Mt. Vernon

John Pearl Landrum, a native of Rockcastle, died at his home in Petersburg, Fla., last Thursday, the victim of a heart condition. He was 59.

E & H Bonds Low For Month

During the first six months of this year the citizens of Rockcastle County purchased \$32,556 in Series E and H Savings Bonds, or 31.9 percent of the county's annual goal of \$102,000. June sales amounted to \$2,925.

This contributed directly to the State's cumulative sales of \$31,225,053, or 1.1 percent of the E and H goal of \$67,800,000. In June, Kentucky's sales amounted to \$4,591,519.

"For the first time in several years," according to E. H. Hilliard, state chairman, "the citizens and volunteers of Kentucky find themselves behind the other states in the purchase of U. S. Savings Bonds, although the deficit is not so great that it can't be overcome between now and the end of the year."

"At a time when personal income and personal spending are at an all-time high," Mr. Hilliard continued, "statistics show that, by comparison, personal savings are at a new low, and I would like to urge those who have not been purchasing Series E and H Savings Bonds to do so."

Yearly Rent Set At \$500

Rockcastle County Baptists Inc., got the green light for operation of the Rockcastle County Baptist Hospital Friday when they signed a contract with Rockcastle County Fiscal Court.

The contract is for 20 years and calls for payment of \$10,000 in rent for the hospital during the 20 years, with the option of extending the lease for 25 years longer. Signing the contract were County Judge Walter Sowder and the Rev. Raymond Lawrence, president of the hospital's Board of Directors.

Under terms of the lease the Baptists can terminate the lease at anytime within 120 days after notification of the county judge or turn over the hospital to the county "immediately" in case of bankruptcy.

The contract calls for lease of the grounds, building and equipment.

In signing the contract, the Baptists agreed to pay for all services such as water, electricity, gas, fuel, food and medical supplies.

During the lease, the Baptists wear out or is otherwise destroyed.

The Baptists also agreed to carry out the agreements the county made with the federal government in order to secure funds for construction of the hospital. These agreements are: (1) To operate a non-profit hospital.

(2) There will be no discrimination as to race, creed or color.

(3) The hospital will receive some indigent patients.

(4) The hospital will be open at all times for inspection by federal hospital authorities.

Under the contract, the county agreed to keep up repairs on the building and furnaces. The money will come from the county treasury.

The county will take out all fire, storm and other insurance on the building, but the Baptists will insure the equipment.

The county also agreed that the Baptists will, passably (Continued on page 4)

Expectant Mothers Need Polio Shots State Man Says

"The importance of vaccinating pregnant women against polio must be emphasized," Russell E. Teague, M. D., commissioner, Kentucky State Department of Health states today. "Kentucky's first polio death of the year, that of a young expectant mother, reminds us that too many mothers, thinking first of their children, neglect to protect themselves."

Dr. Teague was referring to a Lexington mother, who, with her unborn child, died of polio July 2. Although her eight-year-old daughter had been vaccinated, the mother had not taken vaccine. Pregnant women are more susceptible to polio than other women in their age group.

"Enough vaccine is available in the State to protect all pregnant women, as well as persons under twenty years of age, the other most susceptible group," Dr. Teague said. "Expectant mothers should begin the series of injections early in their pregnancy, as three doses give the most effective protection against polio, in the majority of cases," he added.

To meet the recommended dosage the first injection of polio vaccine should be followed by a second in from two to six weeks, and the booster dose to build up long-lasting protection should be given after seven months or more. Medical authorities have given assurance that it is safe to take vaccine during the summer, if the usual precautions about postponing injections during illness are observed.

Expectant mothers are being urged to consult with their physicians and to follow the plan adopted by the medical profession in their localities for administration of the vaccine.

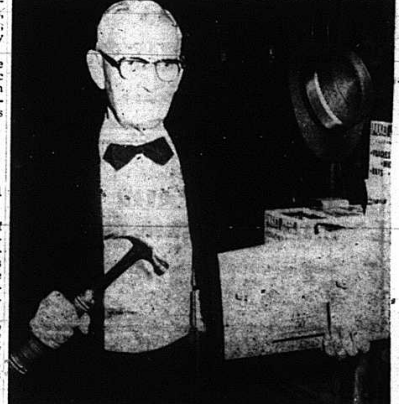

The county agreed that all plaques erected in the hospital will remain intact as long as the hospital stands. This applies to plaques subscribed for by donors to the operational fund. Should the hospital at any time change operations, the plaques be rented to another organization, the plaques will remain.

Neither the Baptists nor the county can alter the building without the consent of the federal government, under the contract terms.

Two new donations have been made to the hospital's operational fund. They are: Willie Christian Church, \$100, and the Pine Hill Bible Baptist Church, \$25.

for filing is not later than Oct. 1, as late claims will not be entered in the federal records will be filed for a 12-month period, running from July through June 30.

As a taxpayer, tenant or farm operator who buys gasoline for use on a farm may file. Claims will be allowed on gasoline used by custom operators or neighbors in connection with cultivating the soil, or raising or harvesting a crop.

Refunds will not be allowed for gasoline used off the farm, or for that used for other than actual farming purposes such as highway use, lawn-mowing, processing, packaging, freezing or canning. Good records must be kept too, to justify all claims.

CATCH TRUCKERS EVADING TAX

Kentucky revenue men have caught more than 1,600 truckers at road blocks and charged them with violating the state's motor fuel tax laws.

Of the 1,626 arrested between April 15 and July 1, a total of 1,431 were fined. Under state law, truckers are required to procure highway motor fuel licenses, post state and local quarterly tax reports on trucking activity in Kentucky.

A 1956 law requires truckers operating heavy equipment of four or more axles to pay a special two-cent-a-gallon surtax on each gallon of fuel consumed in Kentucky. This is in addition to the regular seven-cent-a-gallon tax on gasoline and diesel fuel imposed on all vehicles.

Proceeds from the new surtax, with other highway usage taxes, will be used by Gov. Chandler's administration, M. D. Glasgow, to help pay off the proposed one-hundred million dollar bond issue to be voted on Nov. 6.

The roadblock program, Revenue Commissioner J. E. Luckett said, was designed to obtain compliance with the law, not to penalize truckers. The fines and costs have averaged \$30 and \$35. Under the law, a fine could range from \$19 to \$500.

CORPORATION TAX LOW IN KENTUCKY

Only two states in the South and 13 states in the entire country have lower business corporation income taxes than Kentucky, Commissioner George W. Hubley, Jr. of State Department of Economics Development stated.

Hubley said a report prepared for him by the State Department of Revenue shows that of 32 states collecting corporation income taxes, Kentucky has the 19th lowest "effective rate."

Pastures that are clipped provide better grazing than those where seed-heads and stems are left standing. John Holbrook, C. B. Bussell and Champ Crawford of the Hatt community are clipping leucaena, ladino, and lespedza pastures. The young tender grasses and legumes are more readily eaten by the livestock.

Justin Blevins, Bee Lick, has requested assistance on a pond for his farm. Mr. Blevins says that it will have a spring to feed it and that it will be principally a dug pond. This pond will be staked out this week.

James Poynter, Pleasant Run, saw me a few days ago and said that his sericea seeded this spring was such a poor stand that he was considering plowing it up. Leonard Luckey, area conservationist and the local conservationist of the SCS looked over the field and pointed out to Mr. Poynter that sericea was slow in starting the first year and that his stand was

near perfect. Farmers seeding sericea for the first time should not be discouraged until the sericea has time to develop. Most sericea fields will not need to be clipped high to control weeds.

Medical Students Get Scholarships

Agreements to practice medicine in rural Kentucky have been made by 16 medical students during 1956 as a result of their approval for loans from the Rural Kentucky Medical Scholarship Fund, according to C. C. Chandler, administrator, M. D., Glasgow, fund chairman.

Dr. Howard's report followed a meeting in Louisville last week of the fund's executive committee which granted loans to Robert G. Self, Elkhorn City, John T. Teegen, Davenport and James E. Van Hoose, Nippa. Thirteen other new loan recipients had been announced earlier.

The 1956 loan approvals brought to 35 the number of current medical students being aided by the fund. Thirty-five loan recipients are now in practice in Kentucky; an additional 25 are interning or discharging their obligation as physicians in the armed services. The fund, initiated in 1946 by the Kentucky State Medical Association, basically consists of contributions from farm, medical and other groups and individuals.
