Movin' Around--

Rockcastle loses 1,107 people. Rockcastle County lost 1,107 residents in the 12 months ending April 1, according to figures released by the State Department of Education at Frankfort. Though Rockcastle lost citizens to other states and urban Kentucky areas, the county fared better than some others. A total of 3,361 left Bell County, 3,170 left Harlan County, 2,137 left Letcher County, and 2,034, McCracken County.

Other counties losing more than 1,000, and less than 2,000 persons were Ballard, Boyd, Breathitt, Knox, Lawrence, Lewis, Perry, Pike, Pulaski, Whitley and Wolfe.

Most of the counties showing gains in population are urban counties, such as Jefferson, Fayette, Campbell, Kenton, Bullitt, Oldham, Davies, and Henderson.

Wreck Injuries Fatal To Livingston Resident

George William Smith, 37, of Livingston, was killed instantly last Thursday when the truck in which he was riding overturned several times near Preachersville on Route 36.

Mr. Smith, who was asleep at the time of the accident, was nearly decapitated when his head was crushed between the head and the truck cab. Uninjured in the accident was the driver of the truck, O. Mullins, also of Livingston.

Mr. Mullins reported to State Police, Smith was asleep beside him in the truck cab, his head resting on the right window frame. Mullins said as he rounded a curve and topped a hill, a convertible in which four youths were riding came over the hill in his lane of traffic.

Mullins reported in order to avert a head-on collision with the convertible, he swerved his truck off the road to the right and down a six-foot embankment. The car struck trees, then scraped against several trees before Mullins brought it to a stop about 200 feet farther.

The spokesman, Russell Hunt, warned that aphids damage tobacco by sucking out plant juices. They multiply rapidly and later in the growing season are a considerable problem.

City, County Schools Get Set For Fall Term; Teachers Hired

MVHS Has New Course

A tentative opening date of Sept. 4 has been set for Mt. Vernon Grade and High School, according to Clyde Linville, superintendent.

The opening date could possibly be postponed to Sept. 11, depending on the completion of the school's new \$10,000 industrial arts shops and combination industrial arts-agriculture classroom.

Mr. Linville reported he hopes the building will be completed by Sept. 4, but if it is not he will probably advance the opening date. Work has not started on the building.

When the expected 650 students enroll at the school there will be very few changes in the school curriculum. About the only addition will be the industrial arts classes.

The students will have a change in the number of class periods each day. There will be six, one-hour class periods each day instead of five, one-hour, 15-minute periods.

The eighth grade will also be departmentalized, becoming a part of the high school, and operating on the high school schedule.

Some new furniture has been added including single desk chairs in the seventh grade.

Six new teachers will be on the faculty. Ray Jenkins of Louisville will be music instructor replacing Albert Gene Grinn.

Mrs. Barbara Hiatt, who taught last year at Brodhead, will be librarian, replacing Mrs. Rose Adams, who will teach.

County Schools Open Aug. 30

Several changes in personnel, but little change in enrollment, is expected when Rockcastle County schools open Aug. 30 according to Mrs. Neureul Miracle, superintendent.

There is expected a small increase in enrollment, but not over 25 pupils. Last year there was a total of 3,177 pupils in county schools, including Brodhead and Livingston Grade and High schools. This year enrollment is not expected to go over 3,200. Last year, Brodhead had 1,027 students, and Livingston, 536 pupils, leaving other county grade schools with 1,487 students.

Very few curriculum changes are anticipated in county schools. Mrs. Miracle reported industrial arts is contemplated at Livingston Grade and High School if the school can acquire facilities adequate to meet state requirements.

No consolidation has taken place in the some 50 county grade schools so far this year. School officials won't know if there will be consolidation until the school can take a look at the schools sometime in August.

3 Cases Heard In Circuit Court

Three cases were heard in circuit court Tuesday at Livingston Grade and High School. The gymnasium is being renovated; new lockers have been added and general redecorating is being done.

The playground and the area around the school at Livingston is being blacktopped. Blouse Hallett, who will be in charge of the work, said the work will be done around the school at Brodhead.

In the personnel field, Mrs. Anna Barnett, who formerly taught at Berea College, will teach English at Livingston. Mrs. Bertie Rice will teach in the grades at Livingston.

Mrs. Aline Hallett has been hired band instructor and music teacher at Brodhead Grade and High School. She replaces Wilma Hallett, who plans to do graduate work.

Dr. Hayes office hours will be from 9 a. m. to noon Tuesday and Friday, and Dr. Callaway will be in his office from 9 a. m. to noon on Monday and will be there all day Saturday.
