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## Roads In Top Shape-Griffin

TOWN BRANCH BRIDGE has been completed this year. It is the first time a bridge has been built over the branch at this point north of Mt. Vernon. Shown inspecting their work is Magistrate G. H. Griffin and Henry Cromer.

About 65 miles of Rockcastle County roads will be tiled, graded and coated with rock this year, according to Magistrate Hobe Griffin, speaking for himself and four other county magistrates.

About 29 sections of tile (16 feet each) are going under roads this year in a general overhauling program. Also spraying of 15 miles of right-of-way to kill bushes.

"When I finish with county roads this year in the five districts, we'll have the best roads we ever had," Mr. Griffin reported. He also noted a new road was constructed last year between East Fork and Skeggs Creek.

Magistrate Griffin also reported each district has a budget of \$2,450 for the year. He said this is not enough money and "It should be \$5,000." The five districts receive a total of \$12,250 each year.

"I go over the roads and divide-up the work as evenly as I can. I always try to fix areas that need it the most," Mr. Griffin said.

Out of the \$2,450 comes wages of the road crew, gasoline and the cost of renting a grader. The magistrates have a \$5,000 general fund which is used to purchase equipment.

The county recently bought an \$8,400 grader for use in all the districts. The grader will be paid for this year and next in two \$4,200 payments. The magistrates cannot go in debt beyond their term in office, so leave debts outstanding.

All the magistrates in the county are doing a good job and will continue to do the best job they can with the money provided," Griffin declared.

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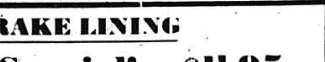
