

## We View SCI With Out-Right Alarm

We have heard Scenic Cumberlands Inc., propose a million dollar park and advertised it. We have heard SCI plan vacationland along Lake Cumberland and at various other sections and published it. We have urged businessmen on countless occasions to support SCI's program in order to attract tourists to the area. But now we draw the line, and to use an old expression, SCI is standing on the other side of it as far as its latest project is concerned.

This week the organization proposing a multi-million-dollar tourist attraction called "Fincastle Village" to be located between London and Corbin. As seen in a story on Page 1, it is to be a "pioneer village" that will include an Indian settlement, museum, souvenir shop, restaurant, hotel and golf course. It will sell arts and crafts and even taffy and other candy products.

Looking over the plans, we need only use one cent's worth of imagination to picture Renfro Valley on that spot between London and Corbin. A brandname and radio-show is all that's lacking.

The reason for the new village has been simply and pointedly stated by J. Heber Lewis, of Burnside, chairman of the organization's Internal Development Committee. Said he: "It's high time private investors build a tourist attraction of importance in Kentucky."

IMPORTANCE!!!! Where in the world has Mr. Lewis been keeping himself all these years? Hasn't anyone told him about Renfro Valley? Hasn't anyone told him the Valley draws more tourists than any other tourist attraction in Kentucky, including the Kentucky Derby? Hasn't anyone told Mr. Lewis 700 radio stations in the United States are available to carry Renfro shows? Hasn't anyone told him Renfro Valley has signed with a sponsor to go into television? Apparently, no one has.

On reading further into the story, we find the new village is to be developed with private capital. Shares will be sold. That's fine. We're for private enterprise. But we didn't know SCI, an organization financed—though in small part—by businessmen in this county, would use its influence to encourage new recreational enterprises similar to those in existence in Rockcastle, and especially, "on our doorstep." In short, we were under the impression SCI would publicize and aid business and recreational facilities already in existence; for example, Little Jackson State Park, Cumberland Falls or "Wilderness Road" drama at Berea. We'll look forward with a great deal of interest to the names of the stock holders in the new enterprise.

After reading the story in its entirety, we can only conclude such a village will be in direct competition with Renfro Valley and business in Rockcastle. If it should cause a decrease in visitors to Renfro, it will mean a decrease in business in Berea, Mt. Vernon and points between—something we do not care to see.

We have recently looked on SCI with some skepticism, even to the point of disapproval. Now we view SCI with outright alarm. We wish it could stick more closely to its goal—a goal that stresses the beauty, interests and needs of a total area.

### FARM CREDIT UNITS PLAN TO MERGE

Plans for merging two long-standing units of the Farm Credit District of Louisville took an initial step forward today with the election of executive officers of the merged institution by the District Farm Credit Board.

Provisions for the merger were included in the farm Credit Act of 1956, signed into law by the President on July 26. The new law also provides for the retirement of the Government capital and eventual ownership of the financing unit by the farmers who use its services.

Merged were the Federal Intermediate Credit Bank of Louisville and the Production Credit Association being held at the Pulaski County Park tonight.

All present officers of the two units will be retained to head the merged institution when the new law becomes effective on Jan. 1, 1957, announces Paul R. Mootz, Columbus, Ohio, chairman of the board.

Since its establishment in 1923 the Federal Intermediate Credit Bank has provided a credit service to production credit associations and other financing institutions by purchasing their loans to farmers. Since its establishment in 1933; the Production Credit Corporation has helped organize, supervise and survive the 40 production credit associations in Ohio, Indiana, Kentucky and Tennessee. Farm operating loans made by the system in these four states annually run about \$190,000,000.

Next Jan. 1, Mr. Mootz said, the production credit associations and other financing institu-

tutions using the Bank's services will begin the job of reorganizing Government capital and replacing it with farmer-owned capital. This conforms to the purposes stated in the new law to promote the efficiency of the farm credit system and "to facilitate increased farmer participation in the management, control and ownership of the merged banks and retirement of the government capital therein."

### WORKING CHILDREN TAX LAW TOLD

Parents of youngsters who are working during the summer vacation were reminded today by William M. Gray, District Director of the Internal Revenue Service, that under certain circumstances their children may still be claimed as full exemptions for Federal income tax purposes.

The children themselves may be entitled to refunds in whole or in part of income taxes withheld from their wages during their employment. The special exemption rule, Mr. Gray explained, applies to children who will still be under 19 years of age at the end of the year and to children who are full-time students, regardless of their age.

Exemption may be claimed by the parents if they contribute more than half the child's support, regardless of the amount earned by the child. This new law was passed by Congress in 1954. Mr. Gray explained. Prior to 1954, no person earning \$600 or more could be claimed as a dependent by another taxpayer. Inquires received, however, indicate that many who are entitled to this benefit are not aware of it, and some parents continue to have their dependent children stop work before earning \$600.

Children 19 and over must be engaged in full-time study at a recognized educational institution for at least five months of the year or must be pursuing a full-time accredited on-farm training program.

### GREEN CUCUMBER MANGOES

Take two dozen large cucumbers; cut a block square out of the side of each one. Scrape out the seed. Lay them in weak salt water for five hours. Drain and dress with 2 large lemons, 2 green peppers chopped, 2 ounces celery seed, 2 ounces white mustard seed, 1 ounce black pepper, 1 ounce salt and 1 cup sugar. Put 2 small onion-salts in 1 (thick) and with the dressing. Replace the block in the cucumber and tie with a strip of cotton. Put a layer of vine leaves, a layer of cucumbers, and a teaspoon of powdered alum alternately up to a kettle until it is full. Cover with vinegar, seal 3/4 of an hour. Lift them out of this vinegar into jars. Take a gallon of fresh vinegar, 1 1/2 pounds brown sugar, boil 15 minutes, skim and pour over the pickles.

### Emergency Pastures Cut Feed Cost, Keep Milk Output High

It's time for emergency pasture when grazing gets short. Dairy farmers say that the traditional summer milk slump by growing well fertilized emergency pastures is profitable for bluegrass growth that is burned out by hot, droughty weather, reports the Middle West Soil Improvement Committee.

Emergency pastures such as Sudan grass or oats and rape, says the committee, can pay off in fatter milk checks. They can save you money by eliminating the cost of feeding more grain. They can help cut down costs of milk production and increase your net returns.

The key to these benefits is high pasture yields per acre to get those high yields, you need a high fertility level.

Whether you plant Sudan grass or oats and rape, emergency pasture crops need not only a balance of fertility, but ample amounts of fertilizer as well.

Using a fertilizer containing nitrogen, phosphate and potash at from 300 to 500 pounds per acre can be used in advance against fast stands and has yields that cut the carrying capacity and tan up the cost of each pound of feed.

Some agronomists say that seedings for emergency or supplemental pastures can be made up to the middle of June. Such grass is particularly resistant to drought, the agronomists point out.

Good preparation is necessary, however. Agronomists advise keeping livestock off Sudan grass pasture until the growth is 10 or more inches high and has turned a dark green color. This is a safeguard against possible poisoning.
