(4) Dispel the myths about SCI and the bad opinions.

(5) Analyze the method of board elections.

(6) A drive to recapture membership interest.

The sponsoring of a governor's tour.

The meeting adjourned with a call to all members to get out and raise money to keep SCI active in the area.

Greyhound Rest Stop Ends Sept. 3

A Southeastern Greyhound Lines official reported Wednesday that the company intends to discontinue its rest stop at Mt. Vernon "on or about Sept. 3."

In a letter to the Signal, H. S. Campbell, district sales manager, reported definite arrangements have not been completed, but are forthcoming.

"We plan to discontinue the meal and rest stop at Mt. Vernon due to the fact that we have received numerous complaints from passengers to the effect that the stop is not necessary between Lexington and Corbin, a distance of only 96 miles," he declared. "Those complaints, of course, are received mostly from passengers traveling through from the North to the South who feel that this stop merely prolongs their journey."

The official said at the present time he was unable to tell the public whether or not the ticket office will be moved from the present location on Sept. 3.

"But it is very possible we will build another rest stop in Mt. Vernon for our passengers to use as a rest stop and a place to purchase their tickets," he reported.

"I have declared the company expects to find a suitable location in Mt. Vernon that will be agreeable with all concerned," Mr. Campbell reported of the present location at Mt. Vernon has not to date been leased.

The company is reported as holding a five-year lease on the building. The building is owned by Mrs. Norine Milen of Mt. Vernon.

"Mr. Campbell said 'We cannot give you any definite information as to just when or to whom the station will be sub-leased'."

Reports recently have indicated several persons have made inquiries about renting the building, but no one appears to have been reported.

Martin Posts \$3,000 Bond

A Three Lukks man, Olen Martin, 33, was held to the November term of Rockcastle Circuit Court Wednesday on \$3,000 bond on a charge of willful murder in the fatal shooting of Stanley Johnson, 41, of Three Lukks.

A second man, wounded in the fracas at the Johnson farm, Radif, about 25, of Dayton, Ohio was treated for a facial wound in Berea College Hospital and released Sunday.

The shooting occurred at Johnson's farm late Saturday following what has been termed by participants as a "drinking and dunking party."

Calvin Johnson, the only person to testify at the examining trial, told the court he and his father, his brother, John, 14; his cousin, Nels Johnson; Mitchell Abrams, Joe Jones and Radif had been at the Johnson farm around the pond. He stated his father had a "jug of whiskey" out in the pond and the boys went to get it.

He testified, the group, run out of whiskey went to a nearby home. On the way back they got into the auto and Martin walking along the road and gave him a ride. They returned to the Johnson farm and spent much time drinking, he related.

Later, he testified, Martin, his father, his brother, Nels Johnson, all of them went from being in the pond to get into the auto and started drinking. Martin, he stated, and he, his father, brother, and Radif went to give the truck a push. He said he was in the auto when it came out of the auto and shot Radif and then killed his father. He said there was no reason for the shooting.

Martin told State Trooper Ellis Florida, when he surrendered shortly after the shooting, that he and three other boys were hunting when the auto containing the seven men stopped. They asked him to go along. He said he got into the auto and out of the auto and shot Radif and then killed his father.

He said there was no reason for the shooting.

Martin stated the group drove to the Johnson farm and talked over the details of the shooting on the farm pond. The men then began to brawl and beat Nels Johnson. (Johnson appeared in court with black eyes and bruises). The men then threw Nels Johnson in the pond and also Jones and Abrams.

He reported Johnson's and Radif then turned to him and said it was his turn to be thrown into the pond. He resisted, and a short discussion, shortly, Martin and the other men left the pond and went to the auto. Martin said Radif followed. Martin stated he shot two men and he shot two feet," Radif kept "coming to ward me" and he said he "shot him" with a 23 pistol.

Mr. Turner related Johnson's sons, Calvin and John, loaded the injured man into the auto and started away. He said Stanley Johnson then came aboard and "threatened him" and made a "grab for him." He said he "shot Johnson." Johnson died a short time later.

Martin also told police Johnson had threatened him several times before.

A movie also released on bond following the trial.

Former Signal Editor Dies At Stanford

Mrs. Anne Evans Walton, former postmaster at Mt. Vernon, and publisher of the Mount Vernon Signal, died Friday at Stanford Hospital after a long illness.

Super Highways Hurt--SCI

The super highways of tomorrow will reap havoc to the tourist industry as it is known in Kentucky today, according to a report of the Cumberlands, Inc. And limited access highways are only one of four problems for which tourist business leaders must find immediate solutions, is the opinion of J. B. Sasser, a director of the Southeastern Kentucky tourist development association.

In a report issued today, Sasser said the State's planned system of high-speed expressways which virtually eliminate Kentucky's bread and butter tourists trade—the great volume of business derived from through-state traffic.

"We cannot stand in the way of progress," he asserted. "Now that we know the super highways are bound to come, we should not waste our time fighting them. Instead, our tourist industry must prepare plans to adjust and adapt itself to the transition."

Foreign travel, a state-wide minimizing of educational and promotional measures on behalf

of the industry, and failure of businessmen to assume their proportionate share of the development and planning underwritten by Sasser as equally important problems now facing the tourist business.

Although his report deals primarily with conditions faced by that other plans would be developed by the highway and ten-county area, Sasser said the facts hold true for the entire commonwealth.

"Pointing out that most of Kentucky's yearly half-billion dollar tourist income comes from through-state travelers and not from the comparatively few who stop here for excursions, Sasser said this problem must be worked out on a state-wide level. "And it must be worked out while we still have time, before the new roads are built."

In Somerset, SCI's headquarters announced that the organization is pursuing development of east-west tourist travel partnership to the problem.

High Collit, Executive Director of SCI, said the organization's surveys prove that most of its tourist business comes from north-south travel—the

direction of at least two proposed routes on the Federal Inter-Regional Highway program. Promotion efforts to lure tourists east or west from one super highway to another, he said, should recognize a portion of the anticipated loss. He indicated that other plans would be developed by the highway and ten-county area, Sasser said the facts hold true for the entire commonwealth.

"Revealing that the national travel index shows tourist spending during the first half of 1956 off 14 percent for the same period of 1955, the Sasser report said, "A general reduction of spending is and will continue to be a factor in this decline, but the recent increases in foreign travel by Americans have taken the biggest bite."

He contends that many persons who used to vacation in Florida and other U. S. resort areas now touring Europe and South America.

"We can't stop the trend to foreign travel, but we can work to increase our share of the domestic travel market," he suggested.

The number of policies paid off in the first six months of 1956 was 14,193, which compares with 12,116 in the first half of 1946 and 10,994 in the first part of 1936.

Can Tomatoes Quickly A method of canning tomatoes that any other is recommended that preserves more vitamin C than Mrs. Pearl Haak, University of Kentucky. The secret lies in setting the tomatoes into the jar quickly, once they are cut.

Wash the tomatoes, using only those that are ripe, firm and without blemish. Tomatoes that have turning may give the canned product an off-flavor. Remove all the core and cut in quarters without peeling. Tuck lightly in jars, pressing down to remove the tomatoes with their juice to within a half-inch of the top. Add 1 teaspoon of salt to a quart.

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Juice may be extracted when the jar is opened; for soups or stews, the skins may be easily removed with a fork. Very seasonings on vegetables. Stir in a seasoning canner sometimes make a dish so good that family members forget they are being served if frequently.

With peas and lima beans, for example, serve an herb sauce made by cooking in butter 2 teaspoons of finely chopped parsley, then add to white sauce. A pinch of marjoram or thyme may be added. Add to a sauce of green beans, greens and cabbage, add 2 teaspoons of prepared mustard to medium or thin white sauce.

For carrots, green beans and limas, a cheese-mustard sauce is good. To a thin white sauce, add 1 cup of grated cheese and 1 teaspoon of prepared mustard. Remove from heat and stir until cheese is melted.

A teaspoon of minced onion, pimento or parsley may be added to a white bean or cabbage soup. Cut summer squash in quarters the long way, cook in salted water, add a dash of onion, thoroughly, and garnish with paprika and minced parsley.

Fresh mint leaves, cooked with peas and lima beans, or, especially when the peas are served with lamb. Celery tops and minced green pepper add zest to cabbage salad; in place of celery, tops add 1/2 teaspoon celery seed. Drain cooked green beans, add 2 tablespoons of bacon fat and bits of broken crisp bacon. Heat again just before serving. Reminder.
