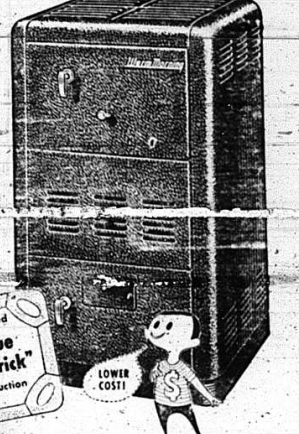

Rockcastle county farmers helped Kentucky's fertilizer consumption to a statewide total of 219,143 tons in 1955, reports the Middle West Soil Improvement Committee, in summarizing statistics compiled by the University of Kentucky.

Among the most popular fertilizer ratios in use on Kentucky farms last year with 73,296 tons was the 1-4-4 ratio, which includes fertilizer grades such as 3-12-12, 4-16-16 and 5-20-20, the statistics show.

The committee reports that Kentucky farmers have stepped up their use of fertilizer since the end of World War II, because they realize that 1-Plant food is a high paying investment that can, when used, 2-Fertilizer can help farmers meet the cost-price squeeze by cutting the cost of producing crops and increasing net income per acre, 3-Plant food, in teamwork with other soil-building practices, maintains the land at high crop-yielding levels.

Doctor Owens, also reported that no cases have been reported in this county. The number of victims of Polio this year has been sizably decreased as compared with previous years. Officials feel that the Salk Polio Vaccine is primarily responsible for this decrease in the number of cases of this dread disease.

All family doctors in the

county have the Salk Polio Vaccine on hand. Mrs. Nell Colson, R. N., Public Health Nurse of Rockcastle County, has clinic days at the Health Department in Mt. Vernon on Saturday mornings, and all day on Fridays. Special clinics are also held in other parts of the county where Mrs. Colson can administer the Salk vaccine shots.

Dr. Owens reported, Robert Hayes, county sanitation officer, has state officials here last week during the Brodhead Fair. The group checked the fair concessions each day and reported sanitation, "generally good."

The health officer reported a midwife meeting recently at which time a motion picture was shown. Seven attended the meeting. A physical examination was also given to those who attended.
