District Dairy Show
 Mrs. Ellen Hansel, Mt. Vernon, reports showed three Holstein heifers in the recent 4-H and F. A. Dairy Show at Somerset, 20 of the best were in the Junior Calf Class. One Red and white ribbon group and one in the red ribbon group and was also awarded the first place ribbon in the group.

Winter Pasture For Bred Sows
 Results of experiments at the Kentucky Agricultural Experiment Station indicate that some producers can produce hogs more efficiently by use of pastures for bred sows. Sows on pasture which were fed 50 percent less fat feed and more pigs per litter that were larger and stronger at birth.

"Babo" can be cross drilled at the rate of four bushel per acre in August. Good seed bed preparation and nitrogen application should, however, be given by November.

One acre of good ryegrass pasture should be allowed for about eight bred sows. The concentrates saved by the sows to graze; can be more profitably fed to growing pigs.

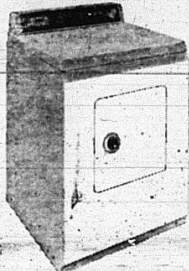

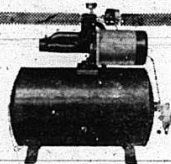

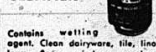

One executor reports he has sold about 2,000 pounds of Atlantic Alfalfa this fall. When to cut lespedeza? That is a question almost every farmer is asking now. Many farmers say they like to cut in full bloom. Byron Owens, C. B. Bussell and W. S. Cass were already cutting since their lespedeza is blooming. Dr. E. N. Ferguson of the Kentucky Experiment Station says that the best quality hay is produced when lespedeza is cut in full bloom. The executor reports that the best new shoots and seed for reseeding Kobe blooms about two weeks later than Korean and most of the time does not reseed when cut in full bloom. Watch your fields and when lespedeza blooms cut for top quality hay.

Heavy Damaged Burley Can Go In Soil Bank

Secretary Benson as urged today to permit farmers to place hail-damaged tobacco in the soil bank up to the time of harvest.

The executive secretary of the Kentucky Farm Bureau Federation, John W. Zoon, asked the secretary of agriculture for this consideration in a telegram Tuesday. The Farm Bureau pointed out that participation in the soil bank has been very encouraging. The telegram said that hail storms in recent days have damaged many acres of numerous tobacco crops in the state.

"We urgently request you give consideration to reopening acreage reserve phase of soil bank to allow farmers with tobacco damaged by hail to still participate in the soil bank up to the time of harvest," the telegram said.

The closing date for the acreage reserve part of the soil bank for all except wheat was July 27.

Fast Crop Time

Cover Approaching

Cover the soil with growing plants in the winter to reduce erosion and frost damage, says Lyle Leonard, Kentucky Agricultural Extension Service soils specialist. One such way is planting cover crops.

Sowing time generally is in September, but sometimes it comes later, depending on availability of the land.

Leonard recommends that cover crops follow cultivated crops. Lespedeza land calls for a cover, especially after grazing. Likewise, "picked-corn" land can use cover.

Leonard says wheat as a cover crop gives a good grain crop. Vetch can be used on tobacco land. Oats furnish good pasture, but should be sowed early in September. Barley also is good for grain and cover and should be sown in September, particularly on very good land. Rye is good for late-seeding or on thin land.

Fertilize for good growth, graze in the fall when growth is good; and mulch or manure thin and eroded spots to get protection cover.
