Have One-- Chestnuts Ripe At Bullocks

Pardon me, but would you care for a Castanea vesca? If so, Ernest Bullock of Mt. Vernon has quite a few, and these days who doesn't? "Pardon me, but would you care for a chestnut?" Chestnut trees, in plain English are exactly what Mr. Bullock has, and in abundance.

Several years ago it was the custom this time of the year for folks (and squirrels) to head for the woods to seek out the reddish-brown little nuts to store for winter. Then suddenly, blight went along on the chestnut tree, lumbermen found chestnut wood in the great demand and many of the remaining trees left the woodsman's ax.

In fact, at one time in Rockcastle County, chestnut trees were so numerous one could choose for its name, Chestnut Ridge.

Mr. Bullock's trees are of a different variety than the chestnut trees native to Kentucky, but there is very little taste difference. His trees are a variety native to China, though China suffered a similar blight more than a thousand years ago.

Chestnuts derive their name from Kastana, a city in Pontus. The fruit, seed or nut, is encased in a prickly pericarp which usually contains two or three seeds, sometimes one.

The pericarp is the protective covering, a covering so prickly it keeps the squirrels at bay until the cool autumn days force the covering to burst and scatter the chestnuts.

Eleven of the Commonwealth's airports will share \$200,000 in State funds to be distributed during the fiscal year.

State Gives \$347,000 Fund

A budget of nearly half-a-million dollars has been set up to run Rockcastle County Public Schools this year—the largest budget in the history of the school system, according to Mrs. Neureul Miracle, superintendent.

Out of the \$494,229.16 budget for the year, the State of Kentucky will give the county under the State Foundation Fund Allotment Program, \$347,601.76, or \$116,876.11 more than gave the school system last year. The county got \$230,925.65 last year.

The reason for the increase is there is more money in the State Foundation Fund cash register this year. It was added by the State Legislature.

Out of the second budget, \$25,000 is marked "instructional," meaning teachers salaries, putting county teachers salaries about on par with Fayette County's teachers. Jefferson County has higher salaries, but in the case of Jefferson County, added school money is received from whiskey taxes.

A total of \$51,948.16 is allowed this year in county schools, for "capital outlay" meaning buildings and equipment. If the county does not spend this amount, the money will be carried over in a capital outlay fund for use at a future time on some project.

To get the \$51,901.76 from the state, county schools must participate 100 percent in the Foundation program. It participated 100 percent this year and last year. The county school's put up \$78,803.80 of its own money to get the 300 thousand-plus dollars.

The amount put up by the school systems all over the state is determined by an "ability index." The index is determined by percentages of local property tax assessment evaluation and property sales.

Mrs. Miracle said the fortunes of the county school system have never been better, thereby echoing the sentiments of Clyde Linville, superintendent of the Mt. Vernon Grade and High School, when he reported the state had upped the city school allotment.

Said Mrs. Miracle: "The Foundation Program eventually means for every child a well-lighted, sanitary room with proper ventilation, pure water from drinking fountains, comfortable furnace heat, janitorial services, hot lunches in modern cafeterias, library services, athletic spaces and equipment, high-lying." At the present time, hospital doctors are not performing operations, since the Board has been unable to locate a nurse anesthetist. Patients needing operations are advised to go to other hospitals for the procedure. Mrs. Owens said she hopes to have a nurse anesthetist within two weeks.

X-ray equipment has been installed at the hospital and

two x-ray laboratory technicians are coming from Corbin to do complicated x-ray work until an x-ray laboratory technician has been hired. Mrs. Cora Lee Speer is also doing some x-ray work.

(Continued from page 1) well trained teachers with sufficient instructional material and equipment.

The one deficiency found in the Foundation program by Mrs. Miracle was the amount of money allocated some years for transportation (school buses). This year the county will get \$34,000 for transportation. Last year it got \$26,000. Mrs. Miracle said she hopes the next Legislature will amend the section of the law to allow more money for transportation.

She also reported the Foundation Program demands chil-

dren have six hours in school per day plus unsupervised recess periods.

Mrs. Miracle enumerated the days school will not be in session—nine days out of 180 days. The vacation days are Oct. 5, Central District meeting of teachers at Richmond; Nov. 6, election day; Nov. 22 and 23, Thanksgiving vacation; Dec. 24 through 28, Christmas vacation; Feb. 22, school holiday; Mar. 14 and 15, spring vacation, if no time lost due to bad weather; Apr. 11 and 12, Kentucky Education Association meeting at Louisville.

She said handbooks have been mimeographed for teachers which include such items as daily schedules for the year, and lists governing teachers and pupils, as well as other items.

Fuel-Injector Systems Next Auto Advance

 Detroit, Sept. 8 (AP)—Introduction of fuel-injector systems will be the next major engineering advance in passenger automobiles.

But the systems still are far from general application. They still are somewhat expensive. Some are undergoing study and engineering changes. Most engineering sources agree the systems eventually adapted to passenger cars will be greatly improved over those first tested a couple of years ago.

Lower Costs Sought
 Aside from simplification, fuel-injector designers are trying to establish much lower production costs before putting them on the market. There is much question that if the fuel-injection systems could be produced at costs comparable to that of the conventional carburetor installation the switch to injectors would be virtually industry-wide.

It appears now that only the more expensive makes of cars will use injectors in the early future. Industry reports are that it will be offered with Cadillac's new Eldorado. Brougham, a top price prestige model expected to be publicly presented at the New York National Auto Show in December.

Production on a limited basis is expected to start soon after the first of next year.

Makers Test Changes

Meanwhile several of the more widely-known carburetor makers are reported to be testing radical changes in carburetors. It is rumored, for example, that a form of pressure carburetor may be offered in some 1957 model cars.

Presumably this would improve fuel economy through greater combustion of the fuel fed into the combination chambers of the carburetor. The auto makers, obviously, will go wholeheartedly for anything that provides more through combustion.

That would immediately bring a reduction in the amount of uncombusted fuel discharged through the exhaust system. This, in turn, would mean a lessening in whatever air pollution may be blamed upon the automobile.

Sinclair Refining Company recently announced it has developed a new chemical additive, which it said will reduce the problems of engine deposit build-up, eliminate pre-ignition and spark plug fouling and improve the efficiency and power output of the automobile engine.

The precise nature of the new chemical additive was not disclosed.

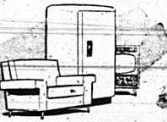
