**Want To Cut The Grocery Bill?**  
By planning meals, the grocery bill may be cut as much as 20 per cent, says Mrs. Pearl Haak, Foods specialist from the University of Kentucky.

Mrs. Haak presented the information on "Meal Planning" to leaders from each "Homemakers" club at the leader training meeting held Tuesday, Oct. 16 at the County School. The following club leaders will be: January - "Low Caloria Foods," February - "Salads," March - "Table Arrangements and Serving the Meal," April - "One Dish Meals," and May - "Stretching the Food Dollar."

Lunch at the training meeting on Oct. 16, the leaders brought a raw vegetable and sandwiches. The raw vegetables were combined to make a delicious combination salad to eat with sandwiches. Everyone enjoyed this unique way of preparing and serving lunch.

The leaders present were: Madames Paul Hadley, Lea Dash, Pat McCray James Shear and Mae Boggs, Omer Huff, T. Johnson, E. Dowden, D. C. Sexton, Hugh Hahn, Hugh Walker, Mrs. Burdon, Mrs. Cleves McQueen, Ben Brown.

Some suggestions for having well planned easily prepared meals adequate for buoyant health are:

- 1. Have a Basic Seven chart in the kitchen and check to be sure all members of family are eating daily:
- 1. A serving of a yellow or green food.
- 2. A serving of tomatoes or citrus fruit.
- 3. At least three servings of vegetables, including potatoes, and two fruits, one raw.
- 4. A quart of milk for every growing child, pregnant and nursing mother and a pint for other adults.
- 5. One egg and at least a serving of lean meat.
- 6. Three or more servings of whole or enriched grain products (bread and cereal foods).
- 7. Three servings of butter or fortified margarine.
- 8. Plan meals for several days at a time.
- 1. Have the menus for the days supplement each other and do not load the table with food at any one meal.
- 2. Serve only one kind of bread at a meal, and hot bread not more than once a day.
- 3. Be sure all cereals are enriched.
- 4. Serve a favorite dish when some food is served that a member of the family does not like very well.
- 5. Build up an attitude of cooperation in persons by eating some of all the foods served.
- 6. Prepare foods simply but plan menus well seasoned.
- 7. Plan menus for the entire family.

Mrs. Haak also gave information on Ways to give "Zest" to food and to make it interesting, and Ways to Shorten the Time of Food Preparation, which will be discussed at the Homemakers' club meeting in November.

Foods is the major project planned by the Homemakers' club this year. There will be five lessons following this one - "Meal Planning" The following club leaders will be: January - "Low Caloria Foods," February - "Salads," March - "Table Arrangements and Serving the Meal," April - "One Dish Meals," and May - "Stretching the Food Dollar."

**Oven Pork Chops**  
4 pork chops  
1 cup bread crumbs  
1 medium onion  
1/2 cup chopped celery  
1 1/2 teaspoon salt  
1/2 cup milk  
Pepper

Brown inch-thick pork chops slowly in frying pan, seasoning them on both sides, then place in baking dish. On each one place a mound of dressing made crumbs, onion, celery, 1/2 teaspoon salt, and 1/2 cup milk. Stir the remaining milk around the chops. Cover and bake in a moderate oven, 350 degrees, for 45 minutes or until well done. Remove cover and bake 15 minutes longer until nicely browned.

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## Is Fred Clark dead?

Was the body found in a burned railroad camp car on a lonely siding at Livingston on Mar. 3, 1944, the body of Fred Clark?

Family, friends and officials of Rockcastle County believe, though he was not positively identified, that the body was that of Fred Clark, who had been burned to death while asleep on his cot.

Last Thursday, a sister of Clark, Mrs. Louise Clark Brown, a waitress in a Miami, Fla., restaurant, walked into the Miami (Fla.) Herald office and told reporter that Mrs. MacLeslie had seen her brother who was supposed to have died in a camp car fire. Mrs. Brown had been in the restaurant several times.

On the following day, a second sister, Mrs. Anna Diersing of Cincinnati, Ohio, reported she had seen the body of Fred Clark, and that he was "here in Cincinnati three years ago." Both sisters said they have received telephone calls from someone who sounded like their brother.

Mrs. Hukle Hukle of Orlando, widow of Clark, was quick to repudiate the two sisters. She said the family intends to do everything to prove Clark is the man buried in Elmwood Cemetery at Mt. Vernon. She said the family is thinking of having the body exhumed, and "have a positive identification of the body made."

There never was any doubt in my mind but that Fred died in that fire," Mrs. Hukle said. "I know something you describe, you just feel it. One man who lives near us told me he tried to get Fred out of the car, but he was burned. He was driven back by the flames. When the man looked into the car he saw Fred lying on the cot and recognized his face. Seconds before flames caught him, I have Fred's watch and ring. Of course, I would be happy to know that Fred did not die, but I am positive in my mind that he is dead."

Showing that not all news in Rockcastle County is of an adverse kind, Mrs. Neureul Miracle, superintendent of Rockcastle County Public Schools, announced last week the state had approved a \$200,000 grade school center at Roundstone and could expect it to be in operation by the fall of 1957.

In choosing a site, the state has chosen the best one available in that section of the county. It is situated on a rise, needs little excavation work and has a good view both directions for buses to enter and exit on U. S. 25.

Most of all the school will be situated in the center of the area. Its construction will solve one of the many problems that have haunted school officials and students for a long time. It will mean consolidation of the entire area. It will mean students will not be on a school bus longer than 30 minutes, and parents will not have to get out of bed at very early hours to get their children off to school; and children will be home much earlier in the afternoon.

The new center is the first of an undetermined number which will eventually be constructed in various areas of the county which will eventually consolidate the entire county. Mrs. Miracle says she will not be content until the other schools have been erected and the ideal physical situation exists in county schools.

No doubt about it, the state's School Foundation Program is working wonders for schools in Rockcastle County. The day that was once so far in the future that would see the ideal school system in the county now seems to be tomorrow.

### FRED CLARK

(Continued from page 1)  
The details of which have been pieced together as accurately as possible from the Clark family, acquaintances and county officials.

It was evening. There was a party going on in the railroad camp car. As at many parties, this one became rowdy, and there were reports of a fight. About 2 a. m. the party broke up and the various visitors went home leaving two men, Richard Dewese, 28, of Laurel County, and Clark, 40, of the Brush Creek section; both employees of the railroad and both living temporarily in the car.

Shortly before 6 a. m. the town was aroused. The camp car was afire. As in those days, residents of the town rushed to the scene, and someone remembered the two men had remained in the car. When the men tried to enter they were

driven back by the flames. The car was completely destroyed. Sometime later, probably about 8 a. m., Bill Coen, Mt. Vernon undertaker, Sheriff Walter Sower, County Judge J. H. Lambert, and Ed Burnett, a brother-in-law of Clark, went to Livingston for the bodies and to investigate.

Dewese was found in the kitchen, lying on the floor in front of the stove, and Clark was found on a cot in another section of the car. Mr. Cox reported both bodies were burned beyond recognition. On the body on the cot was found a watch and ring with the initials 'P.C.' On the other body, which was found lying on its side, was a partially burned wallet containing papers identified as belonging to Dewese.

Judge Lambert called an inquest and later reported in the Mar. 9 issue of the Signal, "an inquest found no evidence of foul play, no bill Coen parent had been fully clad and the car had four doors through which they could have escaped." Judge Lambert reported there were no inflammables in the car, no evidence of explosion about the cook stove and no evidence of fire outside the car.

Later, two men were summoned by the Grand Jury and indicted for false swearing; but the indictment was thrown out because of a ruling that a county judge in Kentucky could not hold an inquest if the coroner was in the county. There is no record that Coroner Jack Jones was paid by the Fiscal Court for holding an inquest of any kind during March or April 1944.

Clark was pronounced dead, and soon after the case dropped out of public discussion. Mrs. Brown reported the man very drunk and was apparently discussing his past life with the blonde. Mrs. Brown heard him remark he was formerly from Kentucky. She then noticed the letter "F" monogrammed on his shirt pocket.

When Mrs. Brown returned to the table later, the blonde is reported to have remarked, "When do we get any service around here?" Mrs. Brown said the man replied, "Oh, don't worry about it, 'Sparky' will get it for us."

Mrs. Brown said "Sparky" is a nickname Fred Clark gave her when he was very young. Clark's parents at Lebanon Junction confirmed this. Mrs. Brown told police she nearly fainted. But she was unable to discuss the remark with

the customer and soon after the couple left the cafe. On the following night it is reported, the man entered the restaurant again and Mrs. Brown said she slipped up behind the man and said softly, "Fred Clark." She stated the man nearly fell off the stool.

She then accused him of being drunk, Clark and he denied it. He left the restaurant very flustered. The next night she

saw the man entering and headed for the telephone to call police. She declared the man saw her and turned and ran. She followed him on the street but lost him. She requested the matter to police and they said they would investigate.

By reviving the case after nearly 13 years, Mrs. Diering and Mrs. Brown have uncovered questions that may now be unanswerable. Is Fred Clark dead? If so, was his death an accident? Is he alive? If so, why did he leave this area? Whose life, then, came to an end in a blazing camp car on a blustery March night in 1944?

The answers may lie in Miami, Fla., or Cincinnati, Ohio, in the events of that night of tragedy; or perhaps, they lie in a lonely grave in Elmwood Cemetery marked "Fred Clark."

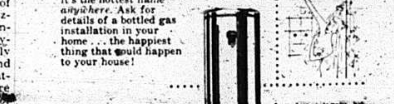
