

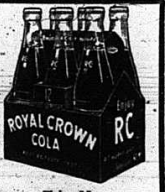

The Signal Says...

AT LAST A NEW U. S. 150

Last week Rep. Ed Kubicki Jr., of Danville, announced a compromise has been worked to promote U. S. 150 into a four-lane highway from Mt. Vernon to Bardonia.

The announcement, no doubt, has caused motorists to stand up and cheer. Since 1948, when the U. S. 150 was first opened into the left shoulder of the State Highway Department's file cabinets and that the state would begin paving the pavement.

To show the new road is past the thinking stage, is the announcement by Gov. A. B. Chandler, pres. secretary this week that U. S. 150 would be built, as we said last week, into a four-lane highway between Stanford and Danville. So it seems doubtful that one section would be built into four lanes and the remainder in two lanes. The state is also well aware that U. S. 150 is heavily travelled by trucks and the remaining two than four lanes between here and Bardonia would be a waste of money and time.

Changed the highway will be four lanes, the obvious reason as Mr. Chandler's announcement, at least, U. S. 150 is a four-lane road. U. S. 25. There will be a question. There have been several points between the new U. S. 25 and U. S. 150. Several points between Lowell's Knob on South Mt. Vernon to the area of K. Y. 70. Some of those points must be wrong. Our source, close to the state administration, says the objection will probably be in the neighborhood of the L & N Railroad tunnel just west of Mt. Vernon, with the tunnel serving as an overpass for U. S. 25 and thereby saving the state from building and overpass on an underpass. It sounds reasonable. But speaking of passes, the state has not passed the word on the route U. S. 25 will take. It's doubtful if highway officials have made up their minds.

Now that the 100 million dollar road bond issue has been passed, no doubt U. S. 25 and U. S. 150 are in the top ten projects. It will be only a matter of time before the state highway department will move into high gear. Motorists themselves are demanding better roads, and from the bond issue vote, they appear more than willing to pay for them.

GORDON GRAHAM HAS A GOOD IDEA

Gordon Graham, Mt. Vernon druggist, has recently begun talks with various parents and others around Mt. Vernon about re-activating the Boy Scout troop at Mt. Vernon.

In his talks he has sought the aid of persons in all professions, and most have responded with willingness to at least talk about the troop.

The town once had a Boy Scout troop, as Livingston now has, and Gordon gave his time and energy, almost alone, to keep it on its feet. But as it continued to grow and its own business grew, he was unable to continue the maze of duties connected with the program and the troop was finally disbanded.

Currently, with young boys searching for something to keep them busy during the evenings, the time is ripe for parents to respond to his suggestion of re-igniting him in re-activating the troop. At least everyone should lend an ear to his suggestions. He has a good idea.

Recipe of the Week

Hamburger with Noodles
1 pound ground beef
1/2 c chopped onion
1/2 c chopped green pepper
2 c canned tomatoes
1 t Worcestershire sauce
1/4 t pepper
1 1/2 t sodium glutamate
1 1/2 c water
1 6-ounce pkg. broad noodles
1 1/2 t salt

Brown the beef, green pepper and onion in a large skillet that has a tight cover for later use. Add all remaining ingredients except the noodles. Stir three or four times to blend seasonings. Place uncooked noodles on top of the meat mixture. Cover tightly. Bring to boiling, then reduce heat and simmer 12 to 15 minutes until noodles are tender and have absorbed most of the liquid. Tomato soup may be substituted for the canned tomatoes. Serves 6.
