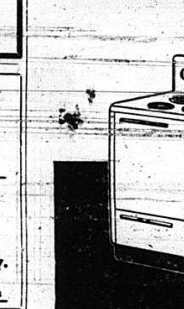

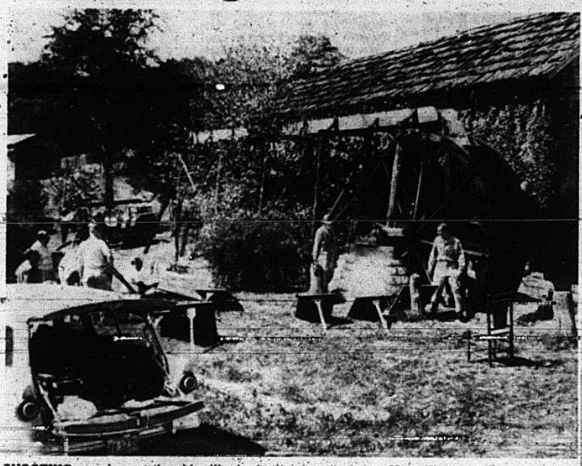

These four words have been heard about a dozen times in these last few weeks around Renfro Valley.

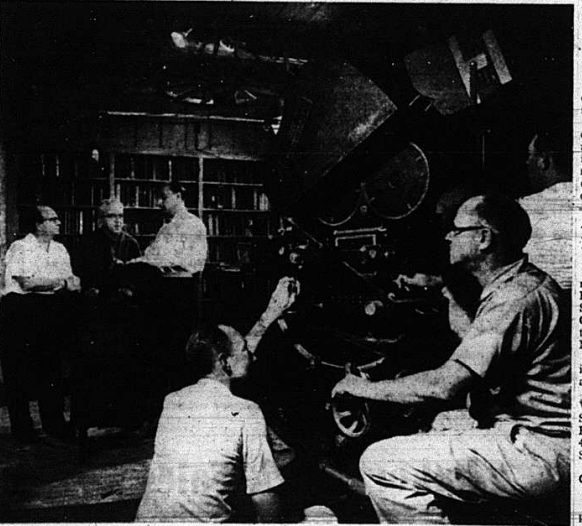
The reason is television—that medium of entertainment, information and recreation that has taken over the evenings of Mr. and Mrs. America in the last few years.

## 70 Cases On Criminal Docket; Arthur Mason Gets New Trial

Some 70 cases will be on the criminal docket in Rockcastle Circuit Court when it opens Monday at Mt. Vernon with Judge R. C. Tartar on the bench.

Probably the most important case to come before the court will be a retrial of a rape case against Arthur "Pete" Mason of Mt. Vernon.

Mason, sentenced to 18 years in the penitentiary on charges of a 13-year-old Mt. Vernon girl, was granted a new trial by the Court of Appeals on grounds his attorney, H. K. Speer, of Owensboro, did not have time enough to prepare his defense for Mason.

Mason has been released on \$1,000 non-pending the trial.

This term, false pretenses exceeds all other offenses. There are 27 cases of false pretenses. Nine of these cases are lodged against John Turner and James Murphy (addresses unknown) and four against Luther Turner, address also unknown.

The three men are accused of selling a spray, liquid or powder, to persons in the county who are ill, and have caused kill blight or other diseases on apple trees. The concoction didn't work.

Child desertion, usually the top offense in Circuit Court, took second place this term with only 19 cases to be heard.

## Keep Children In School Official Says; Man Fined

For the county and city schools to get all the state money due, children must be kept in school, according to John L. Saylor, Rockcastle County Public Schools attendance officer.

Mr. Saylor issued this statement following the conviction of Earl Evans of Sand Springs in Evans County for violation of the compulsory attendance law for Kentucky. Evans was fined \$10 and sent to jail in lieu of the fine.

The attendance officer reported all children from 7 to 16 are required to go to school. He said formerly the state allocated money to each school district on a census-pupil basis. This method of distribution enabled the county to receive money for each child of school age regardless of his attendance at school.

Under the minimum foundation program, under which the county schools operate, money is allocated to each school district on a basis of average daily attendance.

Said Mr. Saylor, "Consequently, if we are to receive the money to which we are entitled, the children must be kept in school. This fact makes it imperative that the attendance workers to use every facility at their command in an effort to keep children of the county in school."

"We would like to take this opportunity to invite every citizen in this county to work with us in improving attendance in Rockcastle County. You can assist us by an understanding of the compulsory attendance law; by giving us your moral support; and by giving advice and encouragement to your friends and neighbors who tend to keep their children out of school," Mr. Saylor said.

## Christmas Seals In Mail; You'll Get Hundred Soon

The 50th annual Christmas Seal Sale got underway today as more than a half million envelopes containing the traditional stamps that fight tuberculosis were distributed to post offices throughout Kentucky.

Nearly 600,000 Kentuckians will receive the TB Seals in the next few days, said John W. Woods, Jr., president of the Kentucky Tuberculosis Association, in announcing the opening of the annual fund-raising drive to support the fight against tuberculosis here.

"Fifty years seems like a long time to be fighting one disease," Woods observed, "but the long fight has not been in vain. We've seen TB reduced from a horrible plague to an illness that can be cured. The death rate has declined by more than fifty percent in the past five years."

The annual sale of Christmas Seals has been the only means of help to support the nationwide fight against tuberculosis for the nation for 50 years. Ninety-four percent of the money raised in Kentucky remains here to fight TB on local and statewide levels. Six percent is sent to the National Tuberculosis Association to help support the nationwide program of research and education.

The TB drive will continue through December.

## The Signal Says--

### AN ADMIRABLE RECORD

In the two months since the Rockcastle County Baptist Hospital opened for business it has established an admirable record.

As last weeks Signal noted in a front page story, there have been 110 bed patients, 145 persons receiving emergency treatment, three operations and 18 births.

This shows, as was hoped, citizens of the county are supporting the hospital by taking their ills there for attention.

In the two months only five persons have not responded to emergency treatment and died. In nearly all cases, these persons had received considerable treatment prior to their death and three of them had been patients in other hospitals. One was suicide by a gunshot wound.

So few deaths, considering the number of persons treated, speaks well for the staff of the hospital. When we inquired of an administrator of an out-of-county hospital concerning the number of persons treated compared to the number who have succumbed, he stated that very few hospitals in their early days can show such a record.

We hope the hospital will continue to have the support of the county and thereby make the record an even better one.

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State Park where sportsmen are assured the opportunity to kill limits of birds in controlled shooting. The pheasants are raised in captivity and released at the start of hunting period at pre-determined spots on the 1,500-acre shooting range.

Hunters may contract for a package deal—entitling them to kill a number of birds and receive meals and overnight lodging. The controlled hunting is expected to continue as long as sportsmen show an interest, possibly until March 1.

## Hunting Gets Underway In Kentucky Nov. 19

Kentucky's season on hunting gets underway in full swing on Nov. 19 when hunters may pursue the rabbit, squirrel, quail, grouse and furbearing animals.

Preliminary indications are that this should be an especially good season, since more quail, as many rabbits, squirrel and grouse and a good supply of furbearers may be had, according to the Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources' statewide game survey.

The second phase of the squirrel season opens on November 16, and continues through Dec. 16. For rabbits, quail, grouse and furbearers the season opens on the same date and closes Jan. 17. The waterfowl season is in full swing right now with the limit being on Jan. 15.

Bag limits are unchanged. For rabbits it is eight a day or a possession limit of 16 after two or more days of hunting. For quail it is 10 per day and a possession limit of 20. Two ruffed grouse may be killed in a day with a possession limit of four. There is no limit on furbearing animals.

The limit for ducks is four per day and a possession limit of eight. Waterfowl includes mallard, blue-winged teal, and other ducks included. The bag and possession limit of geese is five with not more than two Canadas included.

Each hunter must have a statewide hunting license and waterfowl hunters must also have a federal duck stamp. The Department asks the hunters to ask permission from farmers before hunting on his property. It is pointed out that this is a mere courtesy on the part of the hunters.
