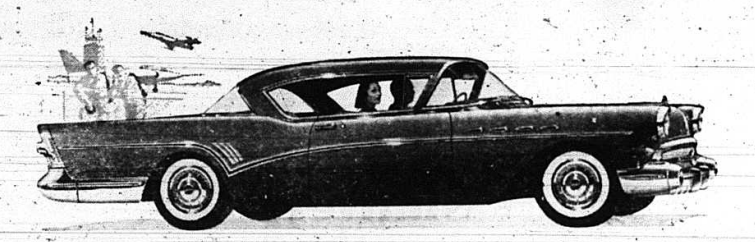

1 teaspoon baking powder
2 teaspoons salt

Cut a large onion in small pieces and fry brown in butter, add 2 1/2 cups water, one-half cup vinegar, and thicken with 2 scant tablespoons of flour, with cold water, and season with pepper and salt.

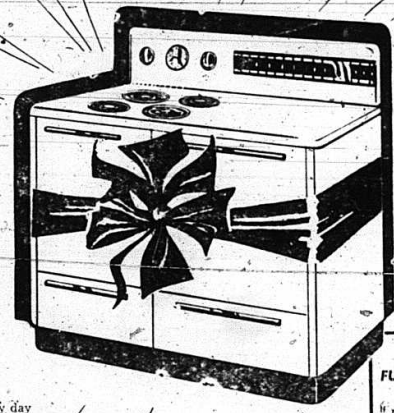

"People have put a great deal of confidence in me over the years. That has made life and work much easier," she said. "The public has been wonderful to me and I have enjoyed serving them."

Mrs. Martin, who forgot to give her age, was born in Rockcastle, the daughter of James W. and Mary E. Rroctor. She graduated from Brodhead High School and soon after went to work at Mt. Vernon. In 1933, she returned to Brodhead to make her home, and has commuted between the two towns since that time.

Taking her place at KU will be Mrs. Mary O. Cummins of Mt. Vernon, who for the past

four years has been a property and supply clerk at Aberdeen Proving Ground, Maryland.

Mrs. Martin's work at KU has also had its amusing moments. She recalls an incident several years ago when a poorly dressed woman and a little boy came into the office.

In order to "participate materially" you must take an important part in the management decisions or in the actual production, Mr. Henderson said.

If you use farmland owned by someone else and you receive a share of what you produce, your warnings may have been covered by the social security law since the beginning of 1955. The 1956 amendments make it clear that if, under an ordinary crop-sharing arrange-

ment, the crop or livestock you produce are divided between you and the landlord, with your share depending on the total amount produced, then you are considered a self-employed farmer for social security purposes. This is true even if the landlord takes an active part in the farm operations. This rule is effective for all taxable years ending after 1934, the speaker stated.

He concluded by telling his audience it could get more information through the social security office at Lexington.

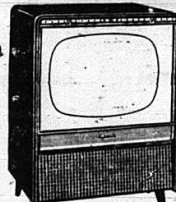

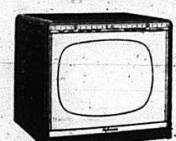

FHA Interest Rate Controlled By Law

In connection with the announcement today that the interest rate on Federal Housing Administration loans will be increased to 5 percent effective Dec. 4, the Veterans Administration pointed out that its interest rate of four and a half percent is controlled by law.

VA officials said that although the increase in the FHA rate may have considerable bearing on the availability of money for GI loans, the actual impact may not be known for some time.

The situation will be closely watched, VA said, and if the amount of money available for GI loans should shrink to harmful proportions, the Agency will ask the President to recommend to Congress an increase in VA's interest rate.

As to GI loan commitments already made by lenders, VA said it fully expects the lenders to close the loans at the four and a half percent rate.

State Parole System Receives Much Praise

Operation of the newly improved Kentucky probation and parole system was praised in a letter received by Dr. Elmore Ryle, director of the Division of Probation and Parole in the Department of Welfare.

Dr. Ryle received a copy of the letter addressed to the Kentucky Welfare Association by Ralph H. Logan, Louisville, chairman of that organization's Probation and Parole Committee.

The letter said, "we find that Dr. Elmore Ryle, the newly appointed director of probation and parole, has instituted, before we had an opportunity to suggest it to him, many of the things we had in mind."

"Dr. Ryle has under the new law appointed what appears to be a sufficient number of probation and parole officers to look after the work assigned to them. He has appointed a number of supervisors in the division throughout the State.

"The Division of Probation and Parole is off to a good start under its new management, and a good record of successful probation and paroles should result."

Big Safety Campaign Begins In Kentucky

"Our aim is to make every citizen of Kentucky safety conscious."

Charles B. Jones, director of the Division of Accident Control, made this statement while

explaining that each county in the Commonwealth will be visited by a field representative from his agency, "to help safety organizations and to initiate the formation of such groups."

"Particular emphasis will be placed on school, farm, industrial and home safety, in addition to a stepped-up campaign for safety on the streets and highways," Jones said.

The Division of Accident Control, a division of the Department of Public Safety, will establish scheduled programs of public safety education throughout the State, Jones said.

"In addition to these regularly scheduled programs, the Division will be prepared to furnish speakers to any groups desiring them," Jones concluded.



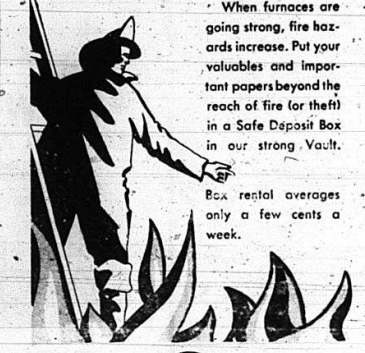
