Telephone Decision Tells Both Sides To Re-Apply To PSC For Certificates

Where do we go from here? That is the question in the Mt. Vernon Telephone Co., case judgment by the Court of Appeals last week.

Chances are as the judgment seems to indicate, the case will be later date end up once more in the Court of Appeals for another clarification, depending on future actions by the Mt. Vernon Telephone Co. and the Rockcastle County Co-Operative.

Before it adjourned for the Christmas holidays, the Court of Appeals handed down its long awaited decision, reversing in part and affirming in part, the case of the PSC versus the Telephone Company.

The history of the case is an old one, but once more:

The Mt. Vernon Telephone Co., applied to the PSC for a certificate to convert its system from magnetic dial.

The Co-Op then applied for a certificate of convenience and necessity.

The PSC denied the certificate to the company and issued to the Co-Op a certificate of convenience and necessity to operate a telephone system.

The Telephone Company appealed the decision to Franklin Circuit Court and the Circuit Court denied the Co-Op the certificate and allowed the Telephone Company a certificate of convenience and necessity to improve its system.

This ruling was appealed by the PSC to the Court of Appeals.

In its judgment, the Court of Appeals declared the Co-Op regulations as concerned certain data, such as copies of franchises, detailed maps, financing plans and estimated operating costs. It also stated the PSC didn't waive compliance of its own regulations. Therefore, the PSC should again consider in granting a certificate to the Co-Op, but that when these requirements are fulfilled, the PSC should again consider the Co-Op's application.

In another part, the Court said the PSC was correct in denying the Company a certificate.

At 7 p. m. Dec. 21, Owsley County will meet Anville in the first round. At 8:45 p. m. Livingston will go against Tyner.

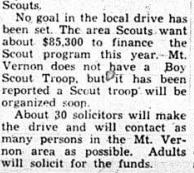
The consolation game will be at 7 p. m. Dec. 22, followed at 8:45 by the championship game.

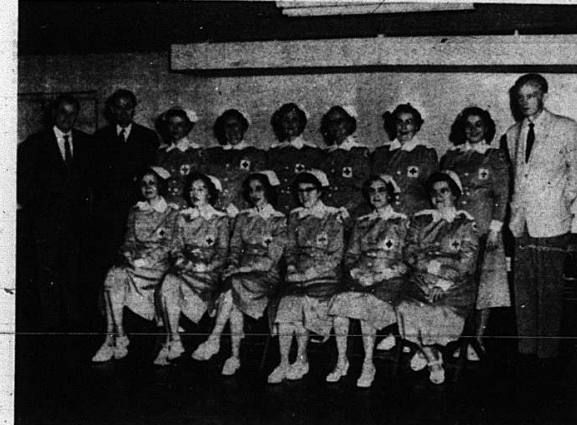
Club officials have asked residents and business people to enter their display in the contest and were not judged.

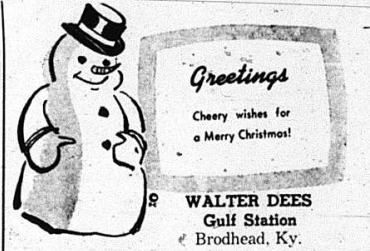

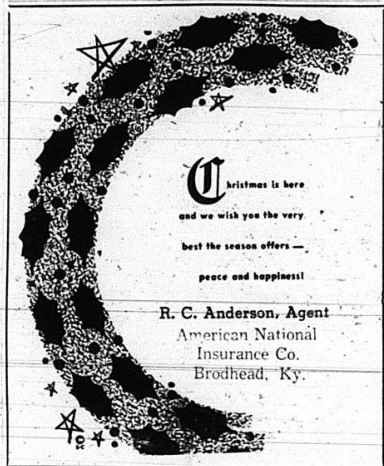
