## Stone Company Opens New Plant Here

The new plant of the Kentucky Stone Co. at Mt. Vernon was officially opened yesterday, constituting an investment for the company of about \$200,000.

The new plant is across U. S. 150 and the Louisville & Nashville Railroad from the old site. The crew of 30 men, plus 100 tons of new machinery, will now move to the new plant.

The most unusual feature of the quarry is the conveyor system that will take the rail cars which will bring rock from the new site on the south side to the crusher on the north side.

The capacity of the new plant is about 1,000 tons per hour.

The new plant will employ from 15 to 20 persons, including the supervisory force. The company does not plan to hire additional men for the new plant.

The Mt. Vernon quarry is one of 12 plants belonging to the Kentucky Stone Co. The operations began at Mt. Vernon in 1957. The company has an office plant located at Muhlenberg in Louisville.

The new plant was built in 1958 because more rock was needed, than the old plant could produce. It would probably be needed in the future, also because of the location of the quarry site to the city. The new plant is on 10 acres purchased from William C. Clark.

John Williams is general superintendent and the oldest employee at the local plant. He joined the company in 1957. After 12 years he received his pension.

He has been with the company for 49 years.

Frank Harmon and Ottie Rask are the next oldest employees.

## 4 Hurt In Auto Crash

## Local Polio Group Gets \$700 Check To Bolster Funds

A check for \$700, received by the Rockcastle County Chapter of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, will help provide financial aid for local patients. It was announced today by Mrs. Earl Hammens, chapter chairman.

The check was sent because local chapter funds have been depleted mainly in the care of the one new polio patient of the year, Edith Mae Foster of Conway.

Despite receipt of this check from national headquarters to supplement our own March of Dimes funds, it is anticipated the chapter will carry bills totaling over \$10,000 over into 1957. Funds to pay these bills will be provided by the March of Dimes this year.

"We had hoped that national headquarters would be able to advance us enough money to meet all our 1956 bills," Mrs. Hammens said. "However, aid to chapters from the national organization amounting to \$4,780,000, has exhausted the funds available for this purpose."

Although polio incidence has lowered, the nation's National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis continues to grow.
