The plaque was hung as a result of a grant last July of \$2,133 from the Kentucky Press Fund to purchase air conditioning and other equipment. In addition to the \$1,500 air conditioning unit, which insures therapeutic care during the summer months, the grant was also used to purchase exercise equipment, chairs, table, books and book cases, file cabinets and other items. Prior to installation of the air conditioning unit, therapeutic treatment had to be curtailed during June, July and August as a result of hot weather. Paul Westphalen, Fulton publisher and K. P. A. executive board member, pointed out in making the presentation last summer that the Kentucky Press Fund derives all its money from individual efforts of the state's newspapers in sponsoring sports and other events.

Yes, as Dickens observed, the

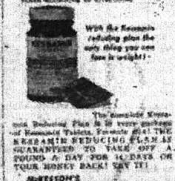
person of the agency that lightens the burden in this world, is indeed far from useless.

THE HOSPITAL IS IN THE BLACK

Residents of Rockcastle County who so generously contributed their money and time to get \$20,000 for an operational fund to run the Rockcastle County Baptist Hospital through its first months will undoubtedly be happy to learn that after only four months the hospital has gone from the "red" to the "black."

In a report to the Signal of the first four months of operations, Administrator Floyd Owens states during December the hospital did \$5,065 in business and had \$4,423 in expenditures, leaving a balance of \$642.

With the extremely high cost for skilled personnel to operate the hospital and with no endowment fund, as yet, Berea College Hospital, this is indeed a remarkable feat.

In accomplishing this, hospital officials have held the cost-to-patient well within the amount charged by dozens of other hospitals in Kentucky. In short, you can be treated locally as cheaply as any other hospital, except possibly the very large hospital, which are heavily endowed with private funds.

Paternal service at the hospital still remains excellent as most patients will attest, and to some patients, it is a downright pleasure to be in the modern 307-room building.

In giving his report, Mr. Owens does not fail to say if any money is left in the operational fund. With a few figures we'll guess these was considerable. But with the continuing rise of costs of operation, officials will no doubt from time to time find a place where the money can be well spent.

We are happy with the operation of the hospital to date. Mr. Owens and the directors have kept a firm hand on finances, fought the battle of inflation, and come out with a profit.

LETTERS GOING TO PARENTS ON POLIO VACCINE

All elementary school pupils in Rockcastle County, both in country and city school or Sem, are to receive letters about Salk vaccine during the next month from the Rockcastle County Health Department. So that Rockcastle County children and their parents will become aware of the urgent need for protection against crippling poliomyelitis, these letters are being distributed to the schools by county teachers and health workers.

Ninety-four other counties are also figuring in a program to distribute literature about polio vaccine to all elementary students and teachers. All list through 8th grade classrooms in these counties will receive wall charts on which the names of children who are taking the series of three injections of antipolio vaccine will be posted. Students may also receive credit on the posters for pre-school age children and sisters who have had injections.

In addition to the distribution of literature containing information on polio vaccine to all elementary pupils in Rockcastle County, the health department is also sponsoring projects in Mount Vernon, Berea and Livingston High Schools to inform local teen-agers of their need for immediate vaccination.

Only 208 of the 1729 persons in Rockcastle County who have had at least one injection in the fifteen to sixteen age brackets in the County during the year have been vaccinated.

Teen-agers and young adults are still susceptible to the disease, they are more severely affected," he said.

The UK Agricultural Experiment Station's tobacco-breeding section has developed an experimental line of dark tobacco with apparent immunity to the fungus disease, black root rot.

The immunity factor was brought in from a wild Australian plant related to tobacco, known as "Nicotiana debneyi." Dr. G. W. Stokes and Dr. W. D. Vallentyne, plant pathologists, said that through special selection work, "Stake" has been saved from the wild species (Nicotiana debneyi) the piece of a chromosome that contains the apparent black root rot immunity factor.

## Kentucky State Police Recruiting Troopers

Commissioner of Public Safety Don S. Sturgill urged business men to consider a career in law enforcement with the growing Kentucky State Police, pointing out that 100 vacancies exist for state troopers.

The state legislature authorized a 10% man increase in the Kentucky state police force.

Troopers are selected by an impartial and non-political board composed of two Democrats and two Republican members. Sturgill said that police officers are prohibited by law from taking part in politics other than to cast a vote in regularly constituted elections.

Trooper applicants are not cleared by any political organization.

The commissioner explained that all cadet troopers attend a three-month training course at the state police training school in Frankfort in which they are taught subjects relating to police work. The next school starts the first of February. During the course cadets receive classroom and on the job training which qualifies a man for either position.

Commissioner Sturgill emphasized that the minimum height limitations here mean Kentucky Police troopers must be of good physique which are present of Kentucky, not less than 5' 11" more than 55 years old, at least five feet nine and one half inches tall, weight at least 150 pounds; be a high school graduate or have an equivalent educational, pass physical and mental exams and possess a valid Kentucky operator's license.

Application forms can be secured at any state police post or from Kentucky State Police, Frankfort. State police posts are located at Frankfort, Leitchfield, Mayfield, Madisonville, Elizabethtown, Ashland, Dry Ridge, Morehead, London, Harlan, Hazard, Pikeville, Bowling Green, Henderson, Lebanon and Richmond.

The blacktop on the hospital drive way and emergency entrance is now complete. The money for this was given by the Rockcastle County Fiscal Court and the State.

## HOSPITAL

Our financial situation is still doing very well considering we have only been open four months. Our greatest expense was incurred in getting the hospital open to receive patients. This included buying the large initial order of many different types of drugs, medicines, food, surgical soap and supplies, housekeeping supplies, solutions, and office supplies such as many different types of medical record forms to be kept.

## New Donation

The Fairview Baptist Church donated \$103.25 to the hospital during December. This contribution is appreciated both for the money and for the good will expressed by them.

These seem to be some confusion as to how we admit a patient, and the procedure we follow if a person wishes an x-ray or some type of test made. We admit patients to the hospital only on doctor orders and likewise do x-rays and tests on doctor orders. However, patients are admitted at any time to our emergency room and given emergency treatment using the facilities we have available to care for the sick and injured. The doctors of the church have been more than cooperative in the interest of the hospital, and in the patients.

To date we have typed 75 people for our "Walking Blood Bank." We would like to have many more on our list. It would certainly be appreciated and their earnest assent to our hospital if

the hospital last month was \$5,065. Expenditures were \$4,432, leaving a balance of \$633. Enough personnel is also needed to operate the hospital 24 hours a day, seven days a week, which involves three shifts of workers, plus relief workers. Hospital salary expense is great due to the fact that highly trained hospital personnel are required to be on duty at all times.

## Good Personnel

We have been extremely lucky to be able to obtain competent personnel who have been well trained and also with the experience that is so valuable to a small hospital. We have the best of equipment but the hospital service at the bedside is still essentially a personal service and our personnel are more than qualified to give this service.

The continuing support of the people of Rockcastle County is gratifying and we are trying our best to fulfill the confidence displayed.

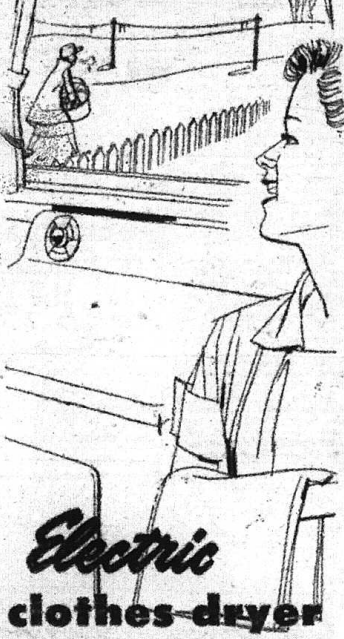
