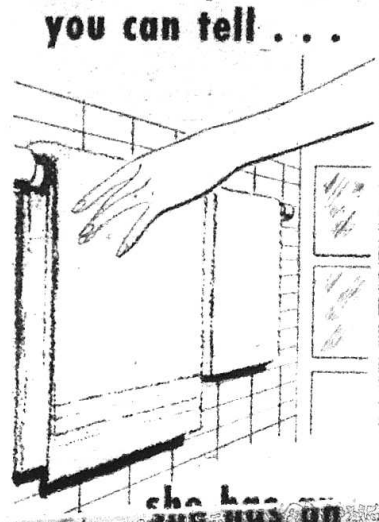

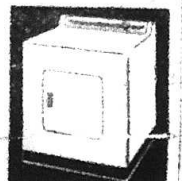

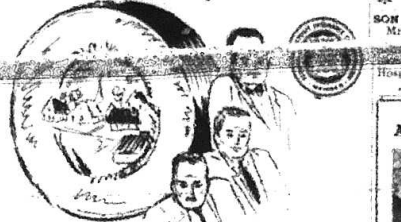

SOIL CONSERVATION NEWS
Roy Brown, Quail stopped by last week to inquire about a source of Arlington series lespedeza seed. Arlington is a strain of sericea that is desirable because of its fine root system and long life. Sericea is a member of the lespedeza family that is a perennial (comes from the roots instead of the seed each year).

Sericea is used for hay and pasture. It will grow where alfalfa will not grow. It can be

cut two and sometimes three times per year. In good hay weather it will cure in one day, making hay of the finest quality. It should be cut for hay when it is twelve to fourteen inches high. It should be kept clipped to six or eight inches for pasture. If it is allowed to grow to greater heights it becomes tough and bitter. Sericea seed is one of the few seeds that is cheaper this year than last year.

Roy says that he will sow his sericea in April on a good seed bed and will cultivate the ground after seeding. He plans on seeding 35 to 40 pounds per acre.

Many farmers are making plans to get their pasture seeding under way. Some seeding is now being done. Assistance is waiting until the 1957 A. C. Program is confirmed by the state A. S. C. Committee.

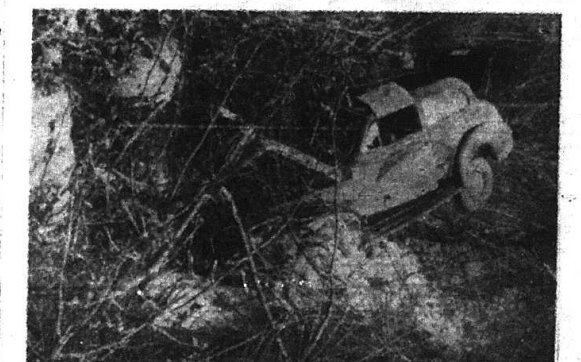

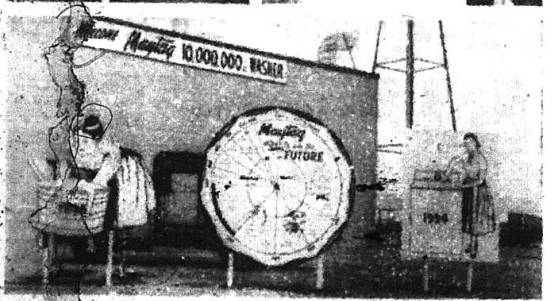

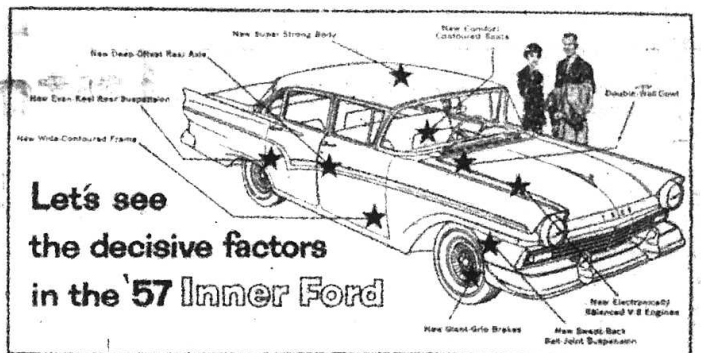

Most residents in the northeast section of Rockcastle County will no doubt stand up and cheer over the announcement that at last the Post Office Department has designated a rural route for their area.

Over the years, residents of this section of the county have had to trodge to the nearest post office to call for mail, or had it delivered on a part-time basis.

The area embracing the new route runs from Mt. Vernon on Pine Hill to Livingston, to Three Links to Orlando and on to Mt. Vernon. It is going to be a very long route (68.55 miles).

Whoever the carrier will be, he is going to have a big job serving the area each day, with some 518 customers. No doubt he will have his headaches, but with a little practice, he'll soon have the mail delivered on a regular schedule.

A new rural route has been needed for a long time. We are glad that, at last, the Post Office Department has recognized and remedied the residents plight.

of KY 499, northwesterly over KY 499 to junction of Jepp Hill Road, north and northwesterly over Jepp Hill Road to Phymas Corner, northwesterly over Jepp Hill Road to Three Links and retreat.

From Three Links and northwesterly over Eglon Road by Eglon to junction of KY 421 by Merrill Post office to junction of Clinias Road, south and northwesterly over Clinias Road to junction of old road to Three Links, northwesterly over old Three Links Road to John Rice residence and retreat, southwesterly over Clinias Road by Clinias Post Office to junction of New Hope Road, south and southwesterly over Orlando and Hummer Road by Orlando Post Office to junction of U. Establishing the new route means families who have had no service will now have services. It will eliminate three star routes, two in Rockcastle and one in Jackson.

No carrier has been designated by postal authorities. A test will be announced at a later date. The carrying capacity will be \$4.50 a year plus nine cents per ton per day for transportation cost.

Plan Gardens Now: Use "Back-Up" Dates

Garden vegetables to be planted in March may cause a problem to Kentucky gardeners, one must "wink back" from the planting dates, because some vegetables must be grown a head of time in bed flats and in hot boxes.

Early cabbage is one such example, says George Mack, a UK Agricultural Extension Service vegetable specialist. It is generally set in the garden on March 10, but it should have been in a seed flat two weeks and in a hot bed or greenhouse five weeks (total of seven weeks) prior to setting in the field.

Leaf lettuce is another such plant. It is set normally on March 10 in Kentucky. But it should have been started in the greenhouse then set in hot beds or greenhouse by Feb. 1. Green sprouting broccolis is similarly handled. It is field-set in Kentucky which means it should have been started in need

In order to obtain high vigor, Taylor is crossing the outstanding creeping plants with varieties adapted to Kentucky soil. He hopes to combine vigor with the creeping habit of the Canadian alfalfa. The end of this program is a long way off, for instance, progeny of the cross between the Canadian plants and the adapted Kentucky varieties first will go to the field in 1937 for a check on creep and vigor.

But, if successful, a big step will have been taken in the direction of a vigorous pasture alfalfa which reproduces itself by creeping.

Marshall Tax Guide On Exemptions Told

Wm. M. Gray, Director of the Internal Revenue Service for this district today listed those who would file a United States tax return for 1936 and he also outlined the rules for claiming personal exemptions and exemptions for dependents. Every citizen or resident of the United States, occupying money, who had \$600 or more gross income in 1936 must file it as of or by Jan. 1, 1937. No return is required unless gross income was at least \$200. Those with less income should file to obtain a refund, any tax withheld from their salary or wages.

Returns should be filed as soon after Dec. 31 as possible, but no later than April 15, 1937. Checks or money orders for any tax due should accompany the returns and should be made payable to the "Internal Revenue Service."

Every taxpayer is entitled to at least one personal exemption, people 65 or over, or blind, he gets two \$600 exemptions. If both blind and 65 or over, three exemptions. The same exemptions are allowed for a wife or husband if a joint return is filed. If taxpayer files a separate return, he may claim his wife's exemption only if she had no income and was not the dependent of another taxpayer. If the husband or wife during 1936, also claim as at his or her exemptions are determined as of the date of death. He must check the appropriate block on a return.

A taxpayer gets only one \$600 exemption for each dependent, regardless of age or other circumstances. He also claims an exemption for each child step child, or legally adopted child who received more than half of her support from the filer who has not reached the age of 19 if the child is 18 or over, and is not a full-time student, and if no exemption occurs if he had over \$600 in income of his own. The child must also be either a citizen of the United States, or a resident of the United States, or a resident of a Possession of the United States.

MARKET AVAILABLE FOR HARDWOOD WASTE Owners of farm woodland will be interested to know that a market for waste wood has formed by unmercantable waste is now open and available to them near Burnside, Ky.

The hardwood waste can consist of sections of cut or narrow aged trees of any hardwood species (hardwood trees that shed their leaves in autumn) logs, bolts, and large limb wood.

Round or split wood should be roughly straight, stubs cut close with no forks, with the preferred lengths 3 feet to 7 feet, the diameter (distance through the piece) 3 inches to 12 inches. Over 12 inches should be quartered.

Longer logs and pole wood will be purchased by contracts.

Research Proceeding On Pasture Alfalfa

Early work at the UK Agricultural Experiment Station, to develop a vigorous, creeping type of alfalfa suitable for making silage, shows some promise. Norman Taylor, forage crop breeder, says that strongly creeping, root alfalfa have been developed at the Swift Current Experimental Station in Canada from crosses of yellow and blue-flowered alfalfa. This station has made seed available to U. S. experiment stations.

In Kentucky only about 3.5 bushels of alfalfa are raised in the field in 1935 began to spread in 1936. Some of the plants spread as much as a foot, a half in all directions from the original crown, but were very low in vigor.

Most alfalfa used in Kentucky are stand-up varieties for hay production. Grasses decompose rapidly. Goal of the breeders is to produce an alfalfa that does its spreading underground where teeth of grazing animals can't get to it, thus assuring longer life of the plants.

This pasture-type alfalfa is much more suited to grazing than hay crops can't stay with grass in pastures intensively grazed. Taylor says.

He is looking specifically for a variety that will renew itself by "root proliferation." Essentially, this is the condition where the parent plant puts out at fairly deep levels, a lateral system of roots capable of sending new plants in the surface of the ground. Right now there are no varieties at all which are so extremely well and which are suitable for Kentucky agriculture.

Half Of Accidents Happen At Night

More than half of all traffic deaths happen at night, even though a lot less driving is done at night than during the day.

In an average year, the National Safety Council estimates that the mileage death rate is three times as great at night as in daylight hours.

The reasons should be apparent to everyone.

You can't see as well at night, and you must see danger to avoid it.

Drivers try to maintain daytime speeds, yet even the best headlights illuminate only a fraction of daylight seeing distance.

Night driving is more likely to result in fatigue, sleepiness and dulled alertness.

It doesn't take the brains or skill to send an automobile hurtling through a tunnel of blackness. It does take brains to soberly count the hazards beyond the glowing finger of the headlight beam, and skill to be ready and under control for the emergency which may loom at any moment.

Big Increase Noted In Prison Probations

The probation of Kentuckians convicted of felonies has doubled in the last six months according to Elmore Ryle, director of Probation and Parole.

Ryle said 90 out of every 100 persons paroled never return to prison. He said 70 of every 100 prisoners released after serving their terms are back in prison within two years.

Ryle told the Hopkinsville Rotary Club the cost of maintaining a man on probation or parole is \$200 a year while each prisoner confined to State institutions costs \$700 yearly.

Kentucky Income Is Near Estimate

State general fund revenue

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The Kentucky Revenue Department had estimated receipts would total \$24,853,200.

According to the report by Commissioner J. E. Luckett and Deputy Finance Commissioner Ward J. Gates, the receipts of \$24,853,200 include \$14,000 in insurance taxes which were transferred from agency funds to the general fund after the June 22 estimate was made. The report added:

Distilled spirits production and inheritance taxes furnished most of the unexpected revenue to balance lagging receipts in individual income and consumption levies.

Compared with collections for the same period the previous year, the personal income and distilled spirit production and import taxes showed substantial increases, however, due to rate increases.

The separate road fund estimate was \$34,978,750, compared with receipts of \$32,863,496. The difference was caused primarily by a change in the method of reporting monthly gasoline tax receipts at the beginning of the fiscal year.

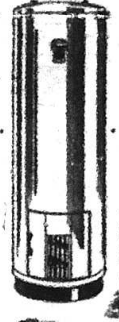
