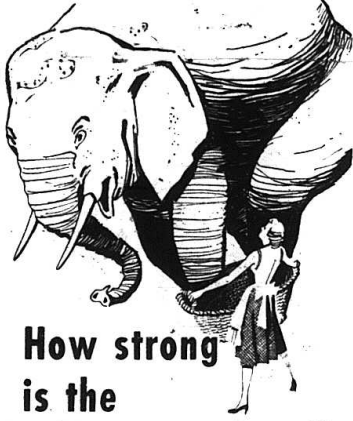

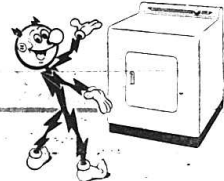

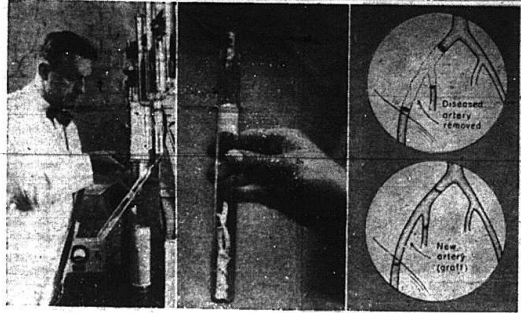

ROCKCASTLE COUNTY SOIL CONSERVATION DIST. SUPERVISORS' ANNUAL REPORT 1956

The Rockcastle County Soil Conservation District is composed of the entire county, with headquarters at Mt. Vernon, Kentucky, in the County Education Building. The area of the district is 199,847 acres, of which 131,604 is agricultural land. The district has 750 cooperators with 66,899 acres of land. These cooperators have basic plans on 47,403 acres of land.

The supervisors of the district for 1956 were: W. S. Stewart, Chairman; John Houston, Vice-Chairman; Bradley Saylor, Secretary and Treasurer; W. L. Coffey and W. E. Proctor. Regular monthly meetings were held on the first Friday of each month. Twelve regular meetings were held and several special called meetings, which were needed to transact the business of the district. Attendance of board members was good.

The district participated in the Goodyear Soil Conservation Awards Program for 1956. Accurate records have been kept of all business, as well as minutes of all meetings. The program committee developed a suggested program at the beginning of the year which was adopted by the Board of Supervisors. This program included observation of Soil Conservation District Week by using slide projector for showing slides on Soil Conservation and meetings at Slaty Branch and Copper Creek; requesting Farm Bureau to sponsor essay contest and if they could not, district supervisors would sponsor; presentation of awards to non-farm men making contributions to Soil Conservation in county; seeking cooperation of ministers; meetings with farmers, F. F. A. boys and 4-H boys on soil judging in cooperation with all agricultural agencies in general field operation with all agricultural agencies in general field operation; entering Goodyear Contest; having at least one meeting of Board of Supervisors on a supervisor's farm; assisting in working out the A. C. program for the county; placing S. C. D. signs at entry of county on main roads; using slide projectors at Fair; seed identification contest at Farm Bureau picnic and maybe school fair; asking Fish and Game Club to furnish wildlife seedling material to farmers to plant and not harvest; conservation program at Lions Clubs in county; and attendance of District Representatives at State Convention.

The supervisors attended the area meeting held at Wolf Creek Dam where a director of the state association was elected. They also attended the state association meeting at Cumberland Falls. Last summer, the supervisors made a tour and study of the Green River Watershed.

In cooperation with the Courier-Journal, W. H. A. S. and the State Board of Education, we sponsored the Soil Conservation Essay Contest for which the district and Rockcastle County farm bureau donated additional prizes. One district D-6 caterpillar dozer, purchased through the Soil and Water Resources and leased to Chandler and Purcell of Brodhead, Kentucky, has worked 2,134 hours during 1956. The district owns a Case bush and bog harrow which is used by farmers for pasture renovation. The five dibble planting bars which the district owns were used in setting 44,000 seedlings. Through a memorandum with the Division of Fish and Wildlife, fish for fourteen ponds were furnished and planting materials for four wildlife plantings. Through a memorandum with the Conservation Service, a full time planting technician and part time soil scientist who make soil and water capability maps have worked in the district this year. In cooperation with the County A. S. C. Committee, 5% of the county allocation was set aside for employment of an aid to assist farmers in carrying out soil conservation practices under the A. S. C. program.

A grass and legume identification contest at the Farm Bureau picnic was well received and created much interest in grasses and legumes. The supervisors met with the county and community committees of the A. S. C. to develop the County Agriculture Conservation Program for Rockcastle County.

The two watershed applications are inactive at the present time. A reconnaissance survey determined that the applications were practical, that there was a need of a watershed program, but due to the present interest by local groups and farmers, and the financial ability, the applications would not be pushed at the present time.

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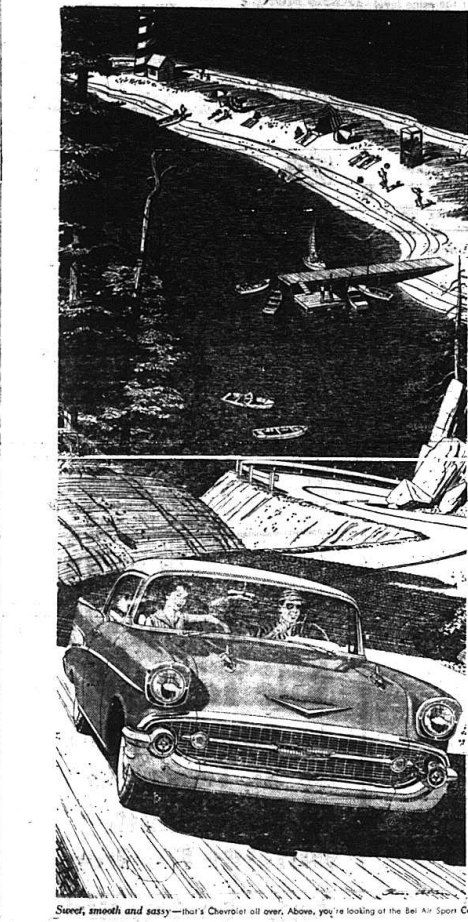

MR. HAMM GETS AN "A" FOR EFFORT

R. H. Hamm should be congratulated for his efforts to run down a source of revenue that would finance a new court house and jail for Rockcastle County.

For several weeks, Mr. Hamm has been looking into the court house jail problem in an effort to find some way in which the buildings could be financed. That the county could use a court house and jail, needs only a casual glance toward the ancient and outmoded edifices that stand along lower Main Street.

Mr. Hamm's search for revenue took him to Frankfort where he sought the aid of Edward M. Hall, assistant director of the Division of the Budget. Mr. Hall said, offhand he didn't know of any available source, but said he would investigate the matter and let Mr. Hamm know the results.

This week, Magistrate Hamm received his answer, and an answer he probably half-way expected. There is no outright state or federal aid available. There hasn't been since the days of the WPA. However, said Mr. Hall, a few years ago a federal government agency was authorized to buy county bond issues for such buildings at a four percent interest rate.

Such funds did exist at one time, but whether they still do is not known. Anyway, no counties at that time took advantage of the funds because they got a better deal elsewhere; that is, lower interest rate.

Currently, the possibility of a new court house and jail is most remote. It is extremely unlikely Rockcastle voters would approve another bond issue until the bonds which paid for the Rockcastle County Baptist Hospital are redeemed.

About all folks can hope for, due to the lack of money, is more repairs to the court house and jail. Regardless of what happens, Mr. Hamm deserves an "A" for his efforts.

HEART RESEARCH TAKES MONEY

Heart research, which already has produced "amazing achievements" in curing diseased hearts and saving lives, promises even greater discoveries. Public support of Heart Fund activities can be stepped up.

This statement came from Jackson D. Guérant, Danville, as the 1957 fund drive which he heads in Kentucky, got into full swing. The campaign lists through February.

Guerrant cited as research achievements the prevention of rheumatic fever, the foot runner of "rheumatic heart disease," prevention of bacterial infection of the heart through surgery to repair congenital heart defects and damage to heart valves; replacing sections of diseased blood vessels by artery grafts, and finding new drugs to lower blood pressure, thus helping many thousands of high blood pressure, or coronary artery diseases—conditions which set the stage for heart attacks, strokes, or heart failure; dramatic new gains in techniques of diagnosis, habilitation and even great achievements in heart and blood vessel surgery.
