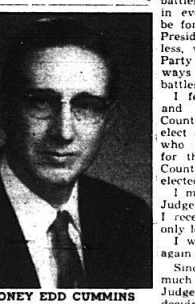

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## County Schools Open Evaluation Program

Rockcastle County Public Schools will be put under a microscope beginning Mar. 1 as county school officials, college professors, teachers, parents and students begin a self-evaluation program in preparation for a State Department of Education evaluation which will come later in the year.

The self-evaluation program got underway this week at Broadhead at a banquet attended by teachers, college representatives and county school officials.

The self-evaluation program is designed to investigate five areas of education, with the emphasis on improvement of the 64 schools in the Rockcastle County system.

The areas to be investigated are: (1) Philosophy and Objectives of the schools (2) Organization for Education (3) Planned Program of Pupil Experiences (4) Utilization of Educational Resources for Education, and (5) Home-School-Community Relations.

It's going to be one of the biggest jobs Rockcastle County schools have faced, seems to be beyond question as far as local school administrators are concerned. But they believe the work and time involved will be well spent. No great amount of money is involved in the program.

According to Mrs. Neureul Miracle, superintendent, the State Department of Education plans to evaluate all county school systems in the state every four years. And when State education committee officials observations, the rating of the county high and grade schools will be made, and all on the basis of what the state team finds.

Some 30 to 40 persons chosen by the State will descend on Rockcastle possibly at the end of 1957 and remain three or four days, checking the physical plant and educational standards.

In preparation for the State's visit, the schools are beginning the self-evaluation program. Each year officials check service programs. Each year the county school system has what they call an improvement program within the school system. This year officials check self-evaluation as the topic.

In order to facilitate handling the self-evaluation program, the four groups will be divided into four areas with groups over each. These groups will do most of the work. The four groups are: representative from a Kentucky college or university will be included in the groups. The lead-ership of the four groups is: Broadhead Grade and High School—Cleston Saylor, chairman; Berea College—D. C. Anderson, recorder; a representative from Berea College.

Livingston Grade and High School—Mrs. Bertie Rice, chairman; Mt. Vernon—Mrs. Neureul Miracle, representative from Union College.

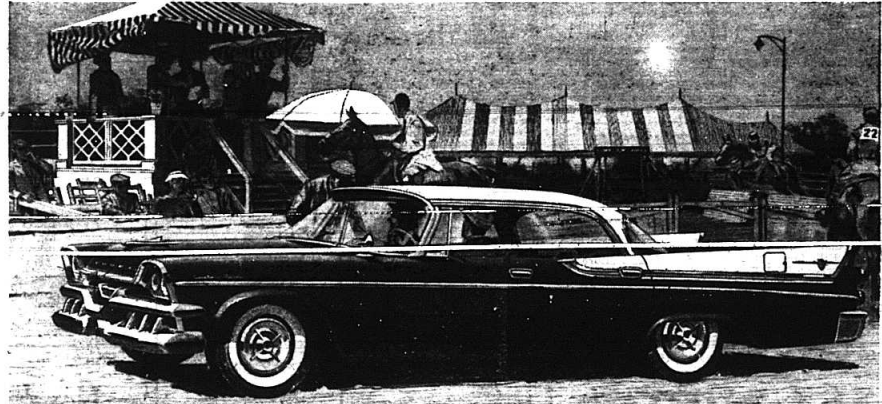

Mrs. Casus Fleisher, recorder; Mrs. Juanita Witt, chairman; a representative from the University of Kentucky. North Rockcastle (Meeting at Conway School)—Mrs. Beulah Stew, chairman, Miss Oneda Burdette, recorder; a representative from Eastern State College.

At various times the groups will meet to discuss their findings and to make recommendations to each other. The first meeting is scheduled for March 1.

Finally, after the groups have met and made their findings, there will be a general assembly of all groups at which time recommendations and decisions will be made and a total self-evaluation report made.

At an undetermined later date, the State will move into the county for its evaluation. The State will send its findings, rating and general recommendations to the school system.

Parents in the county will be asked to take part in the self-evaluation program. Groups will decide on when invitations to parents will be made. Parents will be included on the State team. Parents from Rockcastle may be asked later to join a state team to help evaluate other county school systems.

To give an example of what the various groups will look for, the following are listed: The five areas to be investigated in area one, philosophy and objectives of the system, the school will undertake to arrive at basic rules on which to generally operate and progress.

Drawing it finer, in area two (Organization for Education) is found the following items to be looked at: General organization, organization and administration, educational planning with the local Board of Education, system-wide administration, local school administration, pupil personnel services.

Under area three (Planned Program of Pupil Experience) are the following items of self-evaluation under headings of general education and vocational education: Citizenship, language arts, mathematics, science, health and physical education, creative arts, industrial arts, agriculture, home economics, trades and industries.

In area four (Utilizing and Extending Resources for Education) and under headings of human resources, are the following: Direct teaching services, supervisory services, guidance services, program for exceptional children, school plant, library, school lunch program.

Such a comprehensive and minute investigation of the county schools does not end here. For instance, the teacher herself will be observed and questioned. The check-list for Advertise in the Signal pays big dividends.

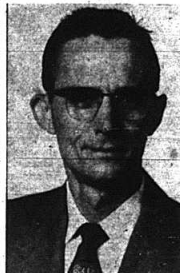
