County's Agriculture Program Separated From South Madison

Farmers in South Madison County who have been included in the South Madison-Rockcastle Agricultural Extension Program will find themselves in the Madison County program after July 1.

On that date the South Madison Agriculture Extension Program will be combined with the Madison County program into a single county unit, leaving Rockcastle County a single unit, with H. Lee Durham, the present county agent in charge of Rockcastle.

Such is the announcement made by W. C. Wilson, district leader of agriculture extension agents, and Miss Aida Henning, district leader of extension agents, of the Madison County Committee of South Madison and Rockcastle County area, both of Lexington.

South Madison and Rockcastle have been combined for the past 45 years. The change was made through a mutual agreement between Berea College and the University of Kentucky College of Agriculture and Home Economics. The change will allow for a more unified and simplified coverage of the area.

The change also means that Berea College will drop its financial support of all extension work in South Madison and Rockcastle and leave it up to the fiscal courts of the two counties.

In Madison County, the Fiscal Court will be asked to appropriate additional funds for demonstration agent work. Mrs. Emma Jean Hamm is the home demonstration agent in Madison. She is Madison County Agent in Lexington.

In Rockcastle County, the Fiscal Court will be asked to appropriate additional funds for travel, extra office space, and other office supplies for home demonstration work. Mrs. Louise Hart is the home demonstration agent for the two areas. It is not reported whether she will continue in that position in Rockcastle.

Rockcastle County Fiscal Court is presently putting up \$2,000 a year for extension work. The Rockcastle Fiscal Court will be asked to appropriate approximately \$1,000 more if home demonstration work is to continue in the county.

In the past, Berea College has been furnishing office space for county and home demonstration agent, equipment, supplies, travel pay for home agents, salary for extension secretary and utilities, amounting to about \$2,000 a year.

The county agent's salary comes from appropriations by the State Legislature and Congress and handled by the University of Kentucky.

Any personnel changes or additions to the Rockcastle office have not been announced.

Tell 6-Month Hospital Facts

The first six months report of the Rockcastle County Baptist Hospital was issued this week by Administrator Floyd Owens.

A total of 1,091 patients have been cared for at the hospital since it opened. Of these were bed patients and 663 were emergency room patients.

Other figures released included: 62 babies born; 596 laboratory examinations; 210 x-ray examinations; 17 major operations; 11 minor operations; 27 casts placed on fractures; electrocardiograms; 21 blood transfusions; 7,050 meals served to personnel, patients and guests; 17 doctors added to the medical staff.

The figures released do not include the financial condition of the hospital after the first six months.

Harold Ballinger, Mt. Vernon, was among the 136 University of Kentucky students pledging to the 19 social fraternities on the campus. Ballinger was pledged to the Alpha Gamma Rho fraternity.

During the 1955-56 school year UK fraternities ranked first among all state universities in scholastic standings. It was the third time in the last four years this has occurred.

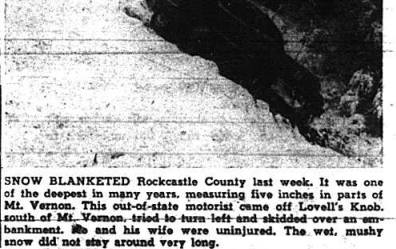

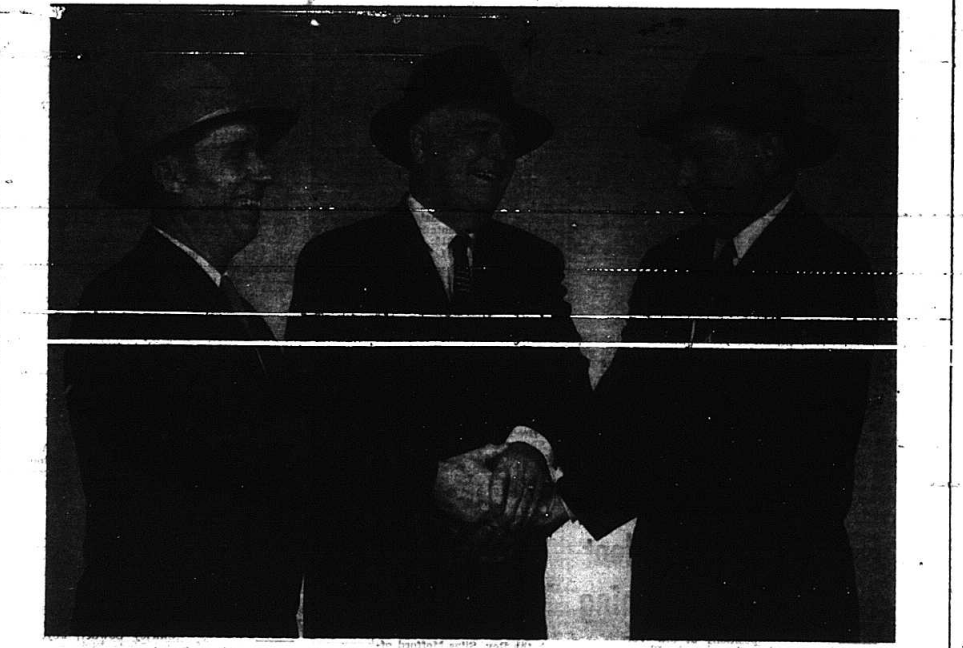

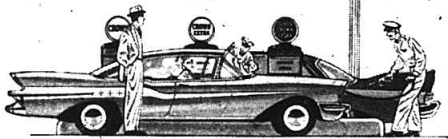

Mr. Sapra and Mr. Ayyub were puzzled at the privilege young people have in choosing a husband and wife. In Pakistan, the wife is chosen for the son, and sometimes, the bride and groom do not see their prospective mate until the wedding day.

Mr. Sapra's address is V-AID Training Institute, Lylalpur, Pakistan. Mr. Sapra has a master's degree in agriculture. From 1953 to 1955, he was farm manager at the Agriculture College at Lylalpur. He supervised agriculture research in crop production and farm management. He is presently an instructor in Agronomy at the Institute. In addition to training V-AID workers in agronomy, he is in charge of an agricultural farm attached to the Institute.

Mr. Ayyub's address is Village Aid Area, Kharian (District Gujrat) West Pakistan.

Mr. Ayyub received a Faculty of Arts diploma from Gordon College and a certificate from Kitchener College for a course he took while in the Pakistan Army. He is now a development officer in Lahore, where he supervises 44 village workers and two supervisors in carrying out community projects and acts as liaison between villagers and the government.

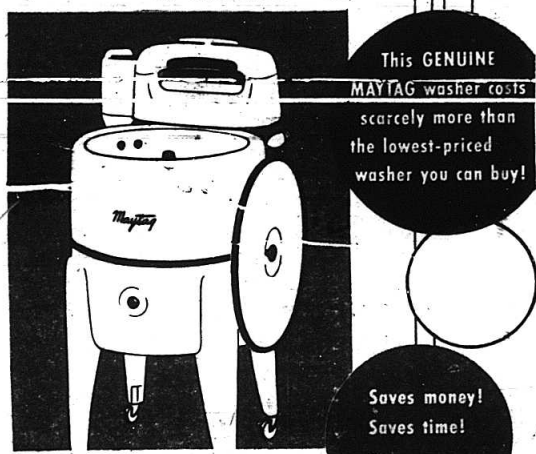

SOIL CONSERVATION NEWS

Rockcastle County farmers seeded 3958 acres of grasses and legumes in 1956 as part of their soil and water conservation farm plan. These grasses and legumes were seeded for pasture, soil, and erosion control in sod water ways and on pond fills. A good pasture furnishes cheaper feed than any other crop on the farm. The Soil Conservation Service can help farmers develop farm plans that will use each acre for the best suited to the soil and the needs of the farmers.

A good source of stock water is just as important as a good pasture. Farmers in the Rockcastle County Soil Conservation District have built 201 approved type ponds in the past few years. Requests for assist-

Free Chest X-Ray

Will be available to Rockcastle Countians when the Tuberculosis X-ray Mobile Unit of the Kentucky State Department of Health visits Mt. Vernon, Brodhead and Livingston as follows:



All persons over fifteen years of age are urged to make sure they do not have tuberculosis by having a chest x-ray. The service is being made available through the cooperation of the Kentucky State Department of health, the Rockcastle County Health Department and the Kentucky Tuberculosis Association.

Nearly three-fourths of all cases of tuberculosis in Kentucky are being discovered through these mass x-ray survey programs. The units tour throughout the state and approximately 300,000 persons get chest x-rays annually under the program.



Persons under fifteen years are x-rayed only if they are known to have been in direct contact with persons who have tuberculosis or upon a physician's referral. The tuberculosis case rate among this younger group is quite low. All teachers and food handlers are required to have an x-ray made.
