ROCKCASTLE AGRICULTURAL PROGRAM HAS A NEW LOOK

After 45 years, Rockcastle is at last going to have an Agriculture Extension Program of its own.

South Madison County, which has been sharing the program with Rockcastle will go to Madison County, where it obviously belongs.

Looking back, we wonder why Rockcastle hasn't been a single unit all along. Probably it had to do with money, or lack of personnel, or some other good reason.

As noted in last week's Signal, the change means Berea College will drop its financial support of extension work in Rockcastle and South Madison. To Rockcastle, this means the Rockcastle County Fiscal Court will have to add about \$1,000 to the \$2,000 it puts up annually, if home demonstration work is to continue in this county.

If it had to be done today, the Fiscal Court could not put up the \$1,000. The money will have to be included in the next budget due in April. The members of the court will have to vote the money. Where or how the Court will get the extra \$1,000 is not yet apparent.

We do not have facts and figures to support us, but persons we have contacted seem to think home demonstration work is an important phase of local agriculture.

No doubt the Fiscal Court will look closely into the matter of the added \$1,000. We are sure the Court wants the best agriculture program possible, especially in a county where agriculture is so important to the livelihood of so many.

Poles, Lines Down When Truck Snags Wire

TELEPHONE SERVICE BEING RESTORED

Telephone service was disrupted and street lights blacked out Friday night when a tall truck snagged a telephone line and snapped six utility poles at Mt. Vernon.

Five telephone poles were damaged when a truck turned into a service station operated by Jack Nee at the corner of U. S. 25 and U. S. 150 and caught a cable on the truck's trailer.

One man was injured, but residents poured out of houses and buildings along Main Street when foot-diameter street light globes fell crashing into the streets and exploded. For the first few minutes no one seemed to know what had happened.

EASTERN KENTUCKY CHAMPIONS OF 1909
They Had A Big Following

Spring Of 1909-- Baseball Was King Locally

About this time each year, with spring in the air and basketball over, there comes the crack of wood on leather as baseball takes over as king for the summer.

It was like that in 1909 at Mt. Vernon as the champion Mt. Vernon city team threw its gear in the bullpen and limbered up on the sidelines.

Such activity happened every spring back when the century was new. But in the last few years, Mt. Vernon has seen very little baseball, as one by one the small Central Kentucky teams have dropped from competition, leaving only the high schools to carry on the great American sport tradition.

During that championship year, baseball was really "in the air." From the first pitch of the season until Mt. Vernon was crowned, folks lived and thought baseball completely.

On Saturday and Sunday they packed the ball field, where now stands the residence of Mrs. Hazel Owens at the back of Mt. Vernon High School.

Fans cheered themselves hoarse for the champs, and enjoyed every minute of the afternoon despite the absence of soda pop, hot dogs and popcorn. About the only liquid refreshment—observable, that is—was warm lemonade at the exorbitant price of two cents a glass.

Not every game went smoothly for the fans. There were occasions, as there are today when tempers flared, fists flew and someone made a hurried retreat, taking along a black eye and the cat-calls of those remaining.

Of the 1909 team pictured above, six are deceased. Five are still living. One player, second baseman, P. L. Thompson, not in the picture, died recently at Louisville.

Below is a list of the team in the picture. A (d) indicates deceased. A town indicates the present home of the player. They are, front row, from left, catcher Shirley Tate (d); Burdette McKenzie (Stanford); Second row, from left, third baseman Charlie McKenzie (St. Petersburg, Fla.); Charlie Goldsboro (St. Louis, Mo.); Walter Miller (d); pitcher Victor Tate (d); first baseman Joe McKenzie (d); Third row, from left, Jim Beatty (Somerset); Bill Fish (d); George Proctor (d); Bill Merricks (Covington).

There was a time though, as we said, when Mt. Vernon was indeed king of area baseball. Where now fans pack gymnasiums for basketball, in 1909 they packed the bleachers for baseball, giving a great yell when the familiar PLAY BALL rang across the field.

Though no one remembers the exact number of games the Eastern Kentucky Champions of 1909 won, most people do remember they won all their games. And though no one remembers what teams were on the low end of the final score, most of the teams who did lose could have been London, Livingston, Walnut Grove, Wildie, Brothead, Berea, Lancaster or Stanford, since all these communities had teams in those days and played Mt. Vernon

through the years.

It also might be said that the baseball team of 1909 was one of the best dressed. Uniforms were purchased and kept "spic and span" by the local merchants. Merchants also bought equipment. If the team needed anything at all, it was an easy matter to get it.

The main reason baseball was so popular during those years was transportation. There were very few roads and what roads there were, were not too good. Secondly, there was no place to go on week ends except to the ballgame.

Like present day basketball, the baseball team of 1909 has its archrival coaches—those who predict wins, losses, and how each player will perform during or should have performed.

Gradually, as in all groups, players of 1909 went their separate ways and new players grew up to take their places. Baseball continued to flourish in the area until the early '40's. The Wildie and Renfro Valley teams were last to be disbanded.

As happened in so many of the small town baseball at Mt. Vernon finally became a casualty of the auto and the Sunday afternoon ride.

Morgan Draws 3 Year Term On Gun Charge

Demas Morgan, who was accused of terrorizing children on a school bus with a pistol, was sentenced to three years and one day in the penitentiary in Rockcastle Circuit Court Wednesday.

Morgan was sentenced on a concealed weapons charge stemming from the incident.

Witness testified Morgan stopped the school bus near Crestwood, Ky., Wednesday, the driver with a pistol and trying to force him to drive to Renfro Valley. After a scuffle between Morgan and his son the bus driver drove away. Later, Morgan stopped John L. Saylor, attendance officer for the Rockcastle County Public Schools and forced Mr. Saylor to drive him to Renfro Valley. Morgan then jumped from the vehicle and fled on foot.

Following the trial, Morgan indicated he would appeal the case.

Lizzie and Logan McClure of Livingston each were fined \$10 and sentenced to 30 days in the County Jail on a charge of public nuisance.

A rape case against Arthur "Pop" Mason was dismissed. No prosecuting witness appeared.

Ben Clark was sentenced to two years in the penitentiary on a charge of child desertion. Clark executed bond to take care of his children and Judge R. C. Tartar released him until the November term of court.

Funeral services were conducted at the Wildie Christian Church Sunday with her son, H. C. McNew, officiating, assisted by Rev. E. Roy Gentry. She was buried in Berea Cemetery, Britton Funeral Home of Berea had charge of arrangements.

City, county and state police in four counties are still searching for three men posing as termite exterminators who are accused of swindling \$250 from an elderly Rockcastle County couple.

After about 40 minutes the men handed Mrs. Maddox a bill for \$250, saying Mr. Maddox told them she would "take care" of the bill. She reported she paid them with cash she was saving for medical expenses.

Maddox returned, learned of the incident and notified police. Painters questioned at Mt. Vernon contributed enough money to repay the couple. The painter's denied knowing the three wanted men.

Johnny Mills Beat To Death

A willful murder indictment against Guy Vaughn, 31, of Bernstadt, was returned Monday in Laurel Circuit Court for the murder of Isaac Johnny Mills, 43, of Lyndon, a disbarred tourist court on Ky. 30 near East Bernstadt last week.

Mills was convicted in Rockcastle Circuit Court several months ago for shooting and wounding Clayton Anderson at Livingston. A jury gave Mills a 10-year term, but the sentence was delayed while Mills appealed his case. The Court's appeal was denied the conviction and Judge R. C. Tartar was expected to sentence Mills during this term of court.

The Court's appeal was denied Vaughn signed a statement admitting the killing. Vaughn was quoted by the State Police as saying "I had to do it before Mills got me."

Five witnesses told State Trooper Harold Watson that the two men were walking arm-in-arm when Vaughn picked up a discarded automobile exhaust pipe and hit Mills in the head. The pipe broke, and Vaughn allegedly grabbed a 43-inch long water pipe and continued beating Mills.

"Mills' head looked like a sponge," Trooper Watson said. Mills had two three-inch gashes on his forehead and four-inch cut at the base of his skull.

Watson arrived at the scene less than a minute after the killing. Vaughn was standing near the body. Watson said he surrendered meekly. According to Watson, Vaughn had been "drinking." However, the State Trooper said he wasn't drunk.

In his statement, Vaughn maintained that Mills had attempted to kill him on at least two occasions. He said Mills failed because his "pistol" didn't fire when he pulled the trigger. Vaughn entered a plea of "not guilty" Tuesday, Mar. 19.

Antique Lowe Press Stolen At Renfro

A Lowe press valued at \$600 and about \$400 in type was discovered stolen from a building at Renfro Valley Wednesday, according to an announcement by John Lair, owner.

The exact time the press and type were stolen is not known, Mr. Lair said. He believes it was sometime within the last two months. He could not be certain since the items are seldom used.

Only one other Lowe press is in this country. The press is about the size of an upright typewriter and has a press cylinder shaped like an ice cream cone. Most of the type taken was new cast with old fashioned lettering. Also taken were border, ornaments and a few wood cuts.

The articles were stored in a building at the rear of Renfro Valley Lodge and were to be used in a "Printer's Museum" to be constructed. The door of the storeroom is seldom locked.

The thieves emptied type drawers and replaced them. Several other items including antique presses and printing equipment were not taken. The thieves also broke up three set-up forms to remove type of the same kind stolen.

Mr. Lair said he believes the items were taken during day time and over a period of several days. They were not injured.

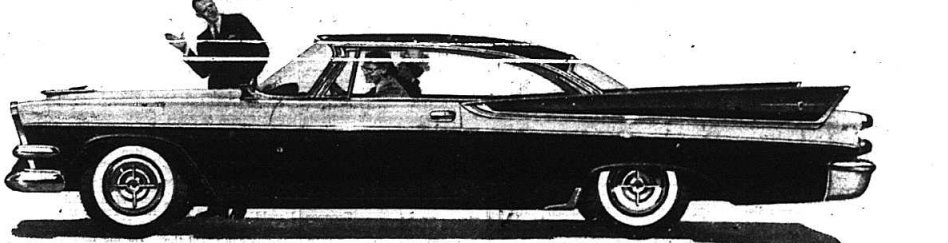
