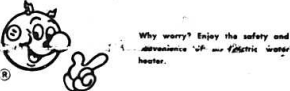

## 4 Indictments Returned Against Dees & Company

### GRAND JURY HEARS OF POOR SERVICE

A Grand Jury in Rockcastle Circuit Court returned four indictments early Thursday against the Mt. Vernon Telephone Co. and its owner, J. F. Dees, charging both failed to render reasonable telephone service.

Two of the indictments were against the Company and two were against Dees.

The indictments charge the Mt. Vernon Telephone Co. and Dees failed to render reasonable service to the citizens of Rockcastle County in general, and the Rockcastle County Baptist Hospital in particular.

The indictment was returned to Circuit Court Clerk, George Murphy Thursday morning. Judge R. C. Tartar told the Signal the cases would be set down and tried.

It has not been reported who brought the charges before the Grand Jury. The charge is one of a few of its kind ever returned against a public utility.

A conviction on such a charge carries a fine of not more than \$1,000 or imprisonment for not more than six months, or both.

A conviction would not mean a change in the status of the telephone company.

The Grand Jury apparently acted on a Kentucky Revised Statute entitled "Rates, classifications and service of utilities to be just and reasonable; service to be adequate."

The section reads (in part) as follows: "(1) Every utility may demand, collect and receive fair, just and reasonable rates for the service or to be rendered by it to every person.

(2) Every utility shall furnish adequate, efficient and reasonable service and may establish reasonable rules governing the conduct of its business and the conditions under which it shall be required to render service."

Officials at the hospital here, reported earlier an incident which they classified as poor service. This incident was reported to the Grand Jury.

The hospital officials said that Dr. George Griffith tried to telephone Dr. Hubert Jones at Berea during an emergency.

At the time of the telephone call a patient at the hospital was bleeding profusely with an ulcer. The call to the telephone was unanswered.

Finally, Dr. Griffith went in person to the telephone exchange to place the call, officials explained.

During the time the hospital has been in operation, 15 incidents pertaining to service have been reported by the hospital. The telephone company has been the target for organizations in the county for consideration.

### Hung Jury In Olen Martin Murder Case

A jury in Rockcastle Circuit Court failed to agree late Friday in the murder trial of Olen Martin, 33, of Three Links, and was dismissed by Judge R. C. Tartar.

Judge Tartar set the July term of Circuit Court for a new trial.

The jury stood eight to four when it was dismissed. The jurymen considered the case for about an hour and reported they were unable to agree.

Judge Tartar asked them to retire and re-consider a verdict. After another hour, the jury emerged, reported they could not agree and was dismissed.

Martin was tried for the murder of Stanley Johnson, 41, also of Three Links, following a party at a pond at Johnson's farm.

Martin also has a malicious shooting and wounding charge against him. He is accused of shooting Roger Radcliff of Dayton, Ohio, during the same evening.

Witnesses told police at the time of the shooting the men were playing a game and dunking each other in the pond. In the game, a jar of moonshine was placed in the middle of the pond and in order to get a drink the men had to wade into the pond.

Johnson died shortly after he was shot. Radcliff was taken to a hospital and recovered.

The person who sold the press sold it for \$130. The press is valued at \$600.

Saylor could not be reached for comment. An unverified report is he is in the Army. Warrants will probably be issued through Franklin Circuit Court for his arrest.

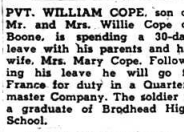
Miss Cox was stricken at the home of her mother, Claude Cox. She was taken to the hospital where she died a few hours later.

"We are in the growing state, and need additional contributions in order to expand therapy, special camping, and new services for Kentucky's many thousands of hard-of-hearing children," McElroy said.

The Kentucky Society, which raises \$217,400 in the 1956 campaign, provides medical and hospital care, special schooling, speech and hearing provisions and special camping for children crippled by diseases, injury and deformity.

Services are given to children in each county in the state. The Society currently is planning a new hearing center in Louisville to provide specialized testing and training for children with severe hearing problems.

Its Kenton-Boone chapter recently completed a treatment center in Covington to serve northern Kentucky areas. The new center will be dedicated Apr. 14.

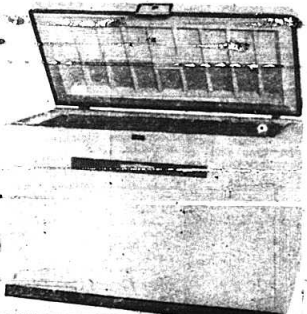

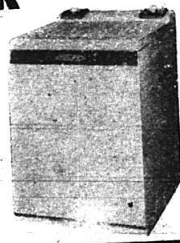

The usual doctor reports that show that, time both these diseases have been practically eradicated by immunization and sanitation. The prevalence of whooping cough, tetanus and several diseases have been cut, and great progress is being made in polio prevention.

Today's greatest problem for the Health Department is tuberculosis control. There are currently 41 active cases in the county and many more suspects. TB patients today are treated at the State Hospital in London and after release are watched by the local Health Department.

Gradually, the public is becoming more conscious of TB. Doctor Owens says. The mobile x-ray unit has been one of the biggest factors in bringing about this consciousness. The officer hopes in the future more people will take advantage of the free x-ray service, and about 10 percent of the county's population was x-rayed, he reported.

Though 78, Dr. Owens still makes his calls to patients and has a full day of work. It is his wish to continue to work for the welfare and medical progress of the county.
