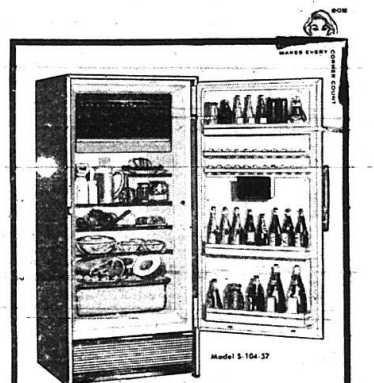

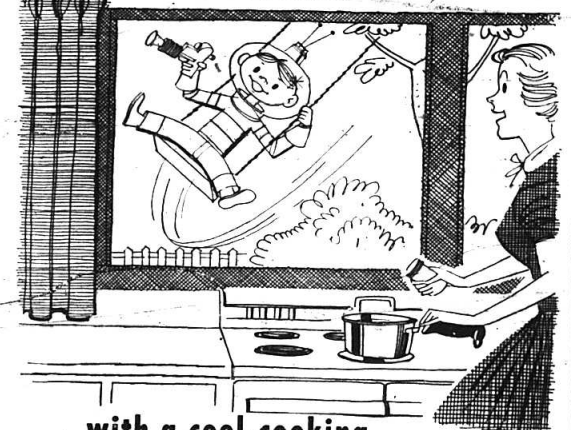

Brodhead Home Ec Girls Learning About Living

Time was in high school home economics when work was strictly pots, pans and needles. But today home economics has branched into almost every phase of home life. This is well illustrated at Brodhead High School where home economics is one of the most popular and productive classes at the school. According to Mrs. Mary Sue Thompson, home economics teacher, home ec as taught in high schools today includes more than cooking and sewing. The goal of the Vocational Home Economics Program is to improve personal, home and family living through providing instruction in homemaking prospective and established homemakers. Mrs. Thompson said:

Today there are seven areas which are included in home economics. They are: Child care, clothing, foods, health, housing, management and personal and family relations. Experiences include more than classroom instruction. Today, the high school home ec teacher visits her students in their homes. She guides them in planning and carrying out home projects related to classroom learning and often sponsors a club for home economics girls called "Future Homemakers of America."

In many cases, schools have planned program of adult education including classes for adult homemakers along with home visitation.

A look at various subjects covered in the seven areas of the Brodhead home ec program best shows how detailed home ec is these days. In the area of clothing are such topics as: Looking my best; sewing can be fun; making simple clothing. Housing includes such topics as: Helping at home; making the most of my room; home repairs, and planning the home. In personal relations the topics are: Getting off to a good start; growing up; enjoying family and friends; looking toward marriage; and choosing and making a success of a vocation.

The recent flood in Eastern Kentucky had unfortunate results for many of the people affected by it, but for Brodhead home economics students, it brought them good luck.

When Prestonsburg High School had heavy flood damage, Eastern State College at Richmond had to find another place for two senior home ec students to continue their practice teaching. Miss Barbara Faulkner of Williamsburg, and Mrs. Barbara Scott of Cumberland College officials decided the two girls could spend 12 weeks at Brodhead in final preparation for becoming teachers next

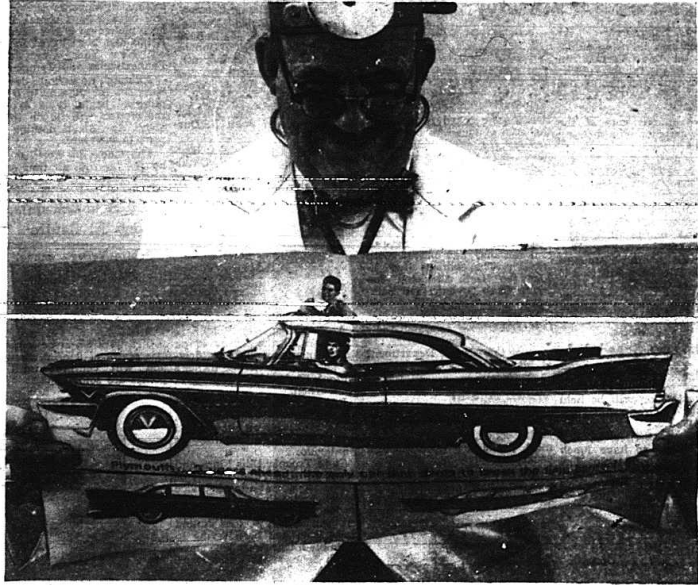

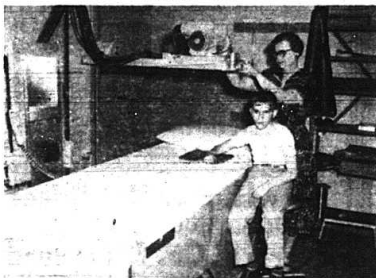
