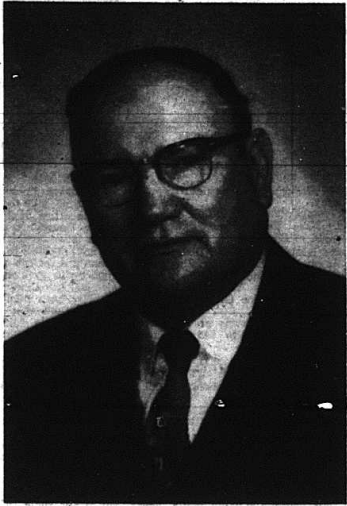

12 Miles Of Rockcastle Roads To Get Blacktop This Summer

A total of 12.5 miles of Rockcastle County roads estimated to cost about \$119,000, will be blacktopped during the summer, the Signal learned this week.

Contracts for most of the construction will be let May 25 and work will begin about July.

Probably the most important blacktopping project will be four miles of the Mt. Vernon-Broadhead road (U. S. 150), beginning at the intersection of U. S. 25 at Mt. Vernon and running to a point approximately in the area of Houston's Dairy about two miles southeast of Broadhead.

This project will take in all of the highway that has raised concrete siding used for drainage. The cost is estimated at \$35,000.

Bids on this section of U. S. 150 will be opened May 10 at Frankfort. The new pavement will be Class B bituminous surface.

U. S. 150 is eventually to be four-lane, but it will have to be re-surfaced for use until the new highway is constructed.

Several other Rockcastle roads are scheduled to be blacktopped, according to the State plan. Below is the list:

Brush Creek Road, 1.3 miles, beginning where the blacktop ends and running to the railroad crossing at Brush Creek.

Wide Road, 1.7 miles, beginning where the present blacktop ends.

Fairview Cemetery Road, half-a-mile, beginning at U. S. 25 in the area of Snyder.

Gaudy Branch Road, also known as the Red Hill Road, one mile, beginning at Livingstone.

Sand Springs Road, 1.5 miles, beginning at the Mt. Vernon city limits.

Crawford Road, one mile, beginning at U. S. 70.

Scalford Cane Road, 1.5 miles, beginning at U. S. 25 at Roundstone.

This year's road projects in Rockcastle have nothing to do with the \$5 million dollars in state and federal road funds which are scheduled to be spent during the next 14 months on Kentucky highways.

Some of these state and federal funds will be spent in Rockcastle in the 14 months U. S. 25, scheduled to be a four-lane interstate highway from Covington to Jellico, Tenn., will be started in the Covington area and run to Richmond.

Another section will start at Corbin and run to Jellico. U. S. 25 is generally in better condition between Richmond and Corbin than any other section and this section is expected to be the last to become four-lane.

U. S. 150 as a four-lane highway is expected to be started between Danville and Stanford as soon as rights of ways have been purchased.

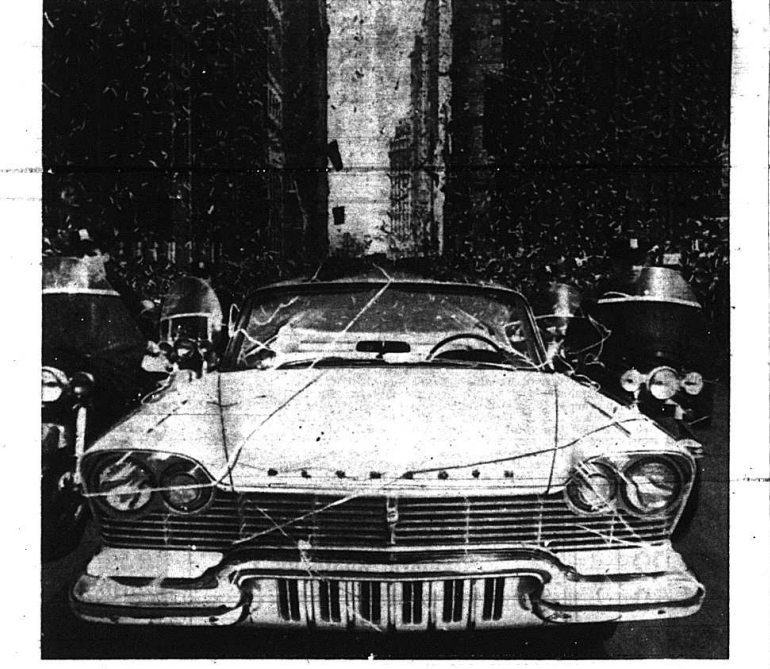

- are listed below:
 1. Construction or purchase of right of way on the 78.8 miles of new expressway that will link Covington with Lexington at an initial cost of \$20,000,000.
 2. Construction, engineering, or right-of-way acquisition of 95.6 miles of the new super-highway that will link Lexington with Catlettsburg and Huntington, W. Va., at an initial cost of \$7,215,000.
 3. The start of work, including construction of a 42.5-mile new expressway, State Highway Louisville-Wentz Frankfort at a starting cost of \$6,545,000.
 4. Engineering, engineering, or right of way, and construction of part of 43.2 miles of new expressway to link Lexington with Knoxville at an initial cost of \$2,410,000.
 5. Construction of 13.8 miles costing \$8,200,000 of new expressway linking Louisville and Lexington by way of the Kentucky Turnpike with Nashville.
 6. Engineering, right of way, and construction of part of 24.4 miles at an initial cost of \$7,037,000 that includes Louisville's Watterson Expressway, its North-South Expressway, and the Louisville-Lexington Road.

Forty-four of the designated projects involve work on the federal-aid primary State Highway system, embracing 142 miles and costing \$18,300,000. Extensions of the primary system in cities are scheduled for work in 17 more projects, totaling 10.7 miles and costing an additional \$6,150,000.

Federal-aid secondary roads scheduled for reworking total 170 miles at a cost of \$9,774,000. According to the State officials, Kentucky's construction money—made up of State taxes and federal-aid grants—available between now and June 30, 1958, is as follows: Available the rest of this fiscal year is \$1,700,000, plus the \$78,500,000 estimated in the Revenue next year. State funds total \$80,200,000. Of this, \$32,962,000 will be used for such nonconstruction needs as engineering, maintenance, administration, and the like, leaving \$47,238,000 available for new construction. The State proposes to use \$30,254,000 of this to match fed-

eral-aid funds. The remainder will be used for nonfederal-aid State secondary and rural secondary roads.

Federal-aid funds available in the period total \$76,111,000, which \$23,619,000 is allotted for interstate roads mostly at 9 U. S. dollars for each State dollar.

with the paltry of a non-profit hospital, he pointed out.

As a general rule most hospitals have few patients in the summer months, but the operating expenses go on.

Since the hospital opened last September there have been 554 bed patients admitted and 664 emergency room patients cared for which, makes a total of 1,519 patients. In addition, there have been 804 laboratory examinations made and 285 x-ray examinations.

77 babies have been born, and over 9,000 meals have been served to patients, guests and personnel.

In this "Mothers Day" offering, the hospital hopes to receive enough money to run the hospital through the summer and into next winter when it is believed the hospital can then be run on its own. All churches of the county have been asked to help in this drive also including local organizations.
