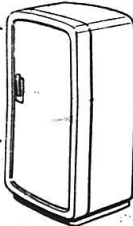

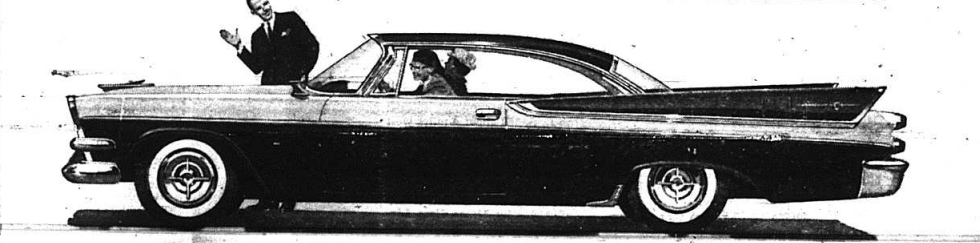

Poll Of Mt. Vernon Residents Shows Fast Time Favored 4 - 1

Mt. Vernon residents indicated in a poll this week they want Daylight Saving Time by a vote of 4 to 1 majority. It was an actual vote, it would probably be the most unanimous vote ever taken in the city on a local issue, and more than likely, on a national issue.

The final tabulation showed 20 favored Daylight Saving Time, 5 opposed it and 21 said they didn't care or had no opinion.

Persons quizzed in the poll were all of voting age, or said they were (18 years or older). Persons quizzed were residents of the city or persons steadily employed within the city limits.

The poll is not a complete tabulation of all citizens, but persons who follow trends of voting and thought, believe the majority "for" Daylight Saving Time would increase with further questioning. A member of nearly every family in the city was questioned.

The question asked the public was:

"Since surrounding towns are on Daylight Saving Time as well as most tourists who visit the area, do you think it is a good idea Mt. Vernon go on Daylight Saving Time?"

The question asked is known as a conditional question. This means, "as conditions now exist." The conditional question was asked since it is apparent that residents probably wouldn't favor fast time if other towns in the area were on slow time.

Towns now on fast time are: Stanford, Danville, Lancaster, Richmond, Berea, Somerset, London and Lexington.

Most persons questioned in the poll said they thought all towns in one area should be on the same time. Most said they didn't particularly like fast time, but it is too inconvenient to be on slow time.

One woman voted "no" and said "I'm used on fast time I'll miss Tennessee Ernie Ford's television show."

Another resident summed it up as follows: "I think it's easier to get up an hour earlier than to try to keep up with the time." Basically, answers were: "Let's set with the other towns around us."

HOME AGENT SET TO TEACH SKILLS

What kind of homemaking courses would residents like to learn? Such is the question being asked county residents by the Rockcastle County Homemakers Advisory Council as it prepares a program for next year.

Since the county will have the services of a Home Demonstration Agent beginning July 1, it is vital that the people have an opportunity to express their needs and interests which the agent might be able to fill, the council believes.

The Council has prepared a ballot of various skills which are to be taught. The ballot appears on another page in this issue. Residents interested are asked to mark the ballot and return it to the Extension Office, at the County School Administration Building at Mt. Vernon.

Some of the skills listed on the ballot include: slip covers, taught over a period of three to four days; hooked rugs, taught for four days; caning chairs, for four days; upholstery, taught from one to two days; sewing of chairs with Hong Kong grass, taught one day.

The Council officials point out that the work of the agent is not limited to members of the Homemakers Clubs and 4-H Clubs, but all persons interested in any phase of home economic education.

A rabies clinic to vaccinate dogs in Rockcastle County will be held in five communities during May, according to Dr. Walker Owens, Rockcastle County Health Officer, who is in charge of the clinics.

The clinics are sponsored by the Rockcastle County Health Department.

Dr. Owens reported that the present time eight people in the county are receiving rabies shots as a result of contacting mad dogs.

"Rabies is a virus disease, which is transmitted through the saliva of an infected animal. The saliva, to infect, must get into a break in the skin. The virus then attacks the central nervous system resulting in convulsions and death. There is no cure for rabies after it gains headway."

The best preventative against rabies is to have your pets vaccinated against rabies. Keep your pet in a pen or on a leash when you hear of rabies in your neighborhood. If bitten or scratched see your family doctor at once and tell him the facts, Dr. Owens said.

The Health Department stresses that persons should not kill suspicious stray dogs or animals if they can be captured. Hold them for 10 days in a pen and notify authorities. Do not shoot a suspected animal by shooting it in the head. Do not destroy the head. Take it to the local city or county health department, and officials will tell you what to do.

Your dogs can be vaccinated for \$1.50 by Veterinarian Rudolph Burdette at the following places:

May 6, Brodhead depot, from 1 p. m. to 2 p. m.; May 6, at the Willalla Post Office from 3 p. m. to 4 p. m.; May 8, Lexington, in the empty lot opposite the Livingston High School from 1 p. m. to 2 p. m.; May 8, at Conway Post Office from 3 p. m. to 4 p. m., and at the Court House at Mt. Vernon, May 10 from 1 p. m. to 2 p. m.

The Health Department stresses the importance of having pets, especially dogs, vaccinated against rabies.

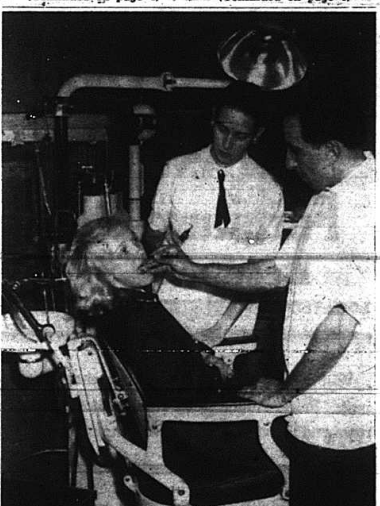
