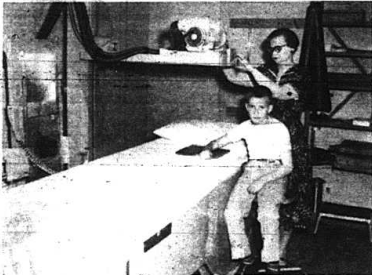




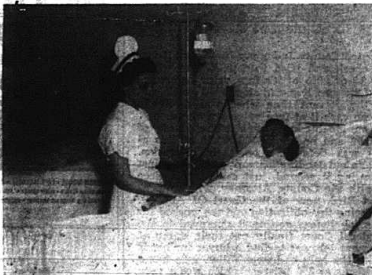

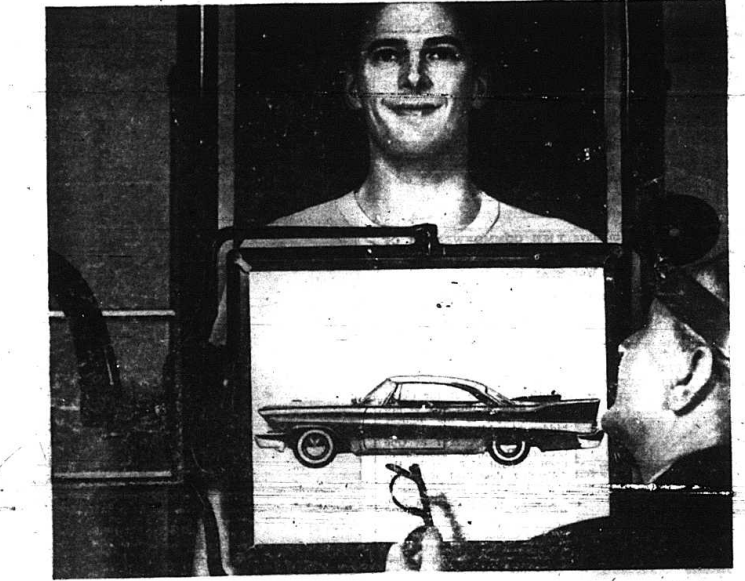

## Earlier Decision On Phone Case Given Court OK

The Court of Appeals at Frankfort last week left the Public Service Commission-Mt. Vernon Telephone Co., case about where it has been for the past year.

The action, the Court re-affirmed a previous court decision which advised the Rockcastle Co-Operative to re-apply in more detail for permit to operate a telephone company in Rockcastle.

At the same time, it told the Mt. Vernon Telephone Co. to go on and operate as it has been doing in the past.

The decision was handed down Friday following an application to the Court for a re-hearing of the case by J. P. DeW, president of the company. The Court rejected a re-hearing and wrote its findings. The Court's decision is as follows:

The Court being sufficiently advised it seems to them the judgment herein is erroneous. It is therefore considered that so far as the judgment set aside the order granting a certificate to the co-op and re-manding the case to the Commission for further consideration, it is affirmed, with directions, however, that the re-consideration be as specified in this opinion, and in so far as the judgment sets aside the order of the Commission denying the certificate to the co-op, it is reversed, with directions to enter judgment affirming that order, which is affirmed to be certified by the court. It is further considered that the appellants recover of the appellee costs herein expended.

Concerning costs, the decision means the Public Service Commission will collect costs of court actions from the Telephone Company.

In a measure the decision is in favor of the co-op in that it authorizes the co-op to seek federal funds for construction of a telephone company.

Following the court action, the co-op members held a meeting and decided to continue their efforts to procure a re-commitment of federal funds and to have an additional hearing before the Public Service Commission to supply certain details of construction and a plan of operation.

## Mt. Vernon, Livingston On 'Fast Time'; Court Slow Fiscal Court City Council

The Rockcastle Fiscal Court took a hands-off-temporarily attitude on Daylight Saving Time at its meeting Tuesday and delayed action on fast time until its June meeting. Failure to act on Daylight Time left Rockcastle on both Daylight Saving Time and Central Standard Time. The Mt. Vernon City Council passed a resolution last Thursday putting the city on Daylight Time.

The Livingston City Council followed Mt. Vernon's lead Monday night at its meeting. Daylight Saving Time will become effective at Livingston midnight Sunday and will continue until Sept.

Neither Council passed an ordinance on Daylight Saving Time. Governing bodies ordinarily pass a resolution since Daylight Time is illegal in Kentucky. A resolution merely suggests that Daylight Time would be in order.

By postponing its decision, the Fiscal Court will not be faced with action on fast time until after the May 28 election. All members of the Fiscal Court are up for reelection. They are: Matt Jones, R. H. Hamm, Henry Cromer, J. S. Swinford and Robert Griffin. Walter Sowder, who heads the court as county judge, is a candidate for sheriff.

All members were on hand for the meeting. As soon as the issue of Daylight Time was approached, Mr. Griffin made a motion opposing fast time. The court then decided to discuss it further. Generally, the members felt, as Mayor Roy Cummins of Mt. Vernon felt when the Fiscal Court discussed fast time, that a council or court can't tell a resident how to set his watch. No matter which time is on the record, a resident will live and work on the time he desires.

In all probability, the Court will ask the Mt. Vernon Council to join in at its next meeting to discuss the Daylight Saving Time issue.

Mrs. Jack Henderson, chairman of the drive, made the announcement in her first report on the current Easter Seal campaign.

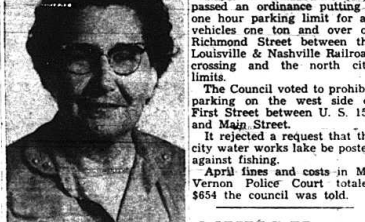
Funds are contributions for Easter Seals received in the mail, and from a campaign at schools.

The Signal Says--

Let's Give Fast Time A Fair Trial

Once again folks in Rockcastle County are faced with the annual confusion of Daylight Saving Time.

For the past few years, towns around Mt. Vernon have operated on the so-called "fast time" and Mt. Vernon has remained a kind of island in a sea of confused time.

Last week, the Mt. Vernon City Council took a look at Daylight Saving Time. It found residents favored fast time through a poll taken by the Signal, and in a unanimous vote passed a resolution saying in effect: Since surrounding towns are on fast time as well as tourists who visit the area, we think it would clarify the time problem if we were all on Daylight Saving Time.

Of the city's governing family, only Mayor Roy Cummins opposed fast time enough to do battle. He opposed it, he said, on personal grounds, and though we disagree with him, we defend his right to his opinion.

Mayor Cummins pointed out that very little can be gained by fast time. He also pointed out that Daylight Time is illegal in Kentucky. In a measure, the mayor is right, but in a measure we believe he is wrong. The whole point of Daylight time is not to actually save an hour, but merely to go to work an hour earlier and thereby get off an hour earlier during the long summer days. In short, you are out in the sunshine an hour longer after your work is finished. Many people like this, and we point to the hundred million people who abide by it each year in this country.

Yes, Daylight Time is illegal in Kentucky. But no council or court passed a law compelling residents to advance their watch. Daylight time is a co-operative venture, and something that council or court merely suggests.

There are a great number of persons in Rockcastle who will or believe they will, benefit from fast time. They are the professional people or persons who work inside all day long. We do not think farmers will be too inconvenienced. They ordinarily work from sun to sun. Most of those who did complain about Daylight Time said they just didn't want to get up an hour earlier. We venture to say, the majority of those who did complain for this reason are not regularly employed on a daily or hourly schedule.

We are positive Daylight Saving Time will not completely solve the work-play problem, since it is not permanent. But we do believe, for the time being, we should go along with neighboring towns and counties until the problem is finally resolved. We hear, by the way, the Department of Commerce might include this area west to Louisville in the Eastern Standard Time Zone, which would put us two hours ahead. There are rumors the Department is surveying the situation.

About all we can ask residents to do is at least give Daylight Saving Time a fair trial for one summer season.

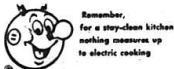

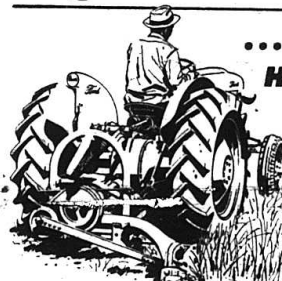

## TO THE VOTERS OF ROCKCASTLE COUNTY

For the past two or three weeks I have been stressing the importance of qualifications in the County Judge's Race.

Now, let's talk about some of the things that confront a County Judge and see a little more about who is best qualified.

When I was elected County Judge my first term, if you received a county check and tried to cash it, you would have to discount it 15 or 20% of its face value before receiving cash for it. I stopped that and stopped it quick, and from that day to the present when you receive a county check, you can cash it at face value anywhere.

Then we had an indebtedness against the county of more than \$240,000.00 and on over \$125,000.00 of this amount the county was defaulting on their obligation.

Everybody that had an outstanding warrant or bond against the county was carrying it around, just a worthless piece of paper. I, along with the County Attorney, who happens to be Judge, Robert Bird, now of the Court of Appeals, went to work refinancing this obligation and we worked for over a year on this job before getting it approved in the Courts, but the Federal Court finally put their stamp of approval on it. Our next job was to find a buyer for bonds and we did that with the help of Lewis Miller, who found us a buyer for the bonds at 3% interest which was a very cheap interest rate, so we got out of another hole for the county.

About that time the state set up what is called the primary or rural road system. They ask us to go along with them and furnish the county road tools so they could start working the roads. I ask them specifically if this would be a political set-up and was assured that it would not, but as soon as they started to work, word was passed to the foreman here not work anyone but a Democrat or at least make them register as a Democrat. I don't think the foreman approved of this, but there was nothing else he could do but say, we can't use you.

There was something I could do and I did it. I ordered all our tools returned and sent and got them, not the next month or week but that very day. I know that met the approval of all the people, both Republicans and Democrats as well as all people on an equal, regardless of politics.

The above facts can be verified by the court records or any of the people that were residents of the county at that time.

I didn't have to ask anyone or see somebody to know what to do in cases of this kind. These kinds of things confront a Judge sometimes and he must act and act at once.

I am very happy to have my official record examined as to qualifications, but also ask that the other candidates, records be examined too.

Vote for the best interest of the County, regardless of who you vote for.
