The first break in the long telephone stalemate in Rockcastle County came Friday when Northwestern Telephone Corp. of Chicago, Ill., reported it will ask for a permit to operate a telephone system in Rockcastle County right side of a. In the Mt. Vernon Telephone Co.

The information from the company was released by Perry D. Woodward, vice president of the company at its district office at London.

Mr. Woodward discussed his company's plans with about 12 businessmen at Mt. Vernon. He declared his company has been trying to purchase the Mt. Vernon Telephone Co. from its owner, J. F. Dees, for about 15 months and that the company has "exhausted its patience" in trying to make a deal.

An application for a permit to operate the company will be filed for consideration with the Public Service Commission at Frankfort when it meets the last week of June, he stated. If plans progress rapidly enough, there is a possibility the company will ask for the permit when the commission sits the last week of May.

(An editorial on the telephone system is on page 4 of this issue.)

Apparently, the company has its plans formulated and the money to establish service. It is estimated a dial telephone system in Rockcastle would cost an estimated \$300,000. The new move in the telephone situation has no immediate effect of the efforts of the Rockcastle County Co-operative which applied over a year ago to the PSC for a permit of convenience and necessity to establish a telephone system. The co-op will continue with its plans to establish a telephone system, a co-op official reported. It is doubtful, though, that the co-op would go ahead with plans should the PSC award a permit to North-eastern.

Only last week the Court of Appeals ruled that the co-op should re-apply to the PSC for a permit and told the Mt. Vernon company to go ahead and operate as it has been doing. This was, in effect, a ruling against the Mt. Vernon company since the court did not designate legally who should operate in the county through a permit or franchise.

Woodward told those at the meeting, the most important thing for his company is to establish that the people of the county want Northeastern in the county and will support the company after it moves here. He suggested a meeting tonight at 7:30 at the Renfro Valley Lodge for all interested per- (Continued on page 4)

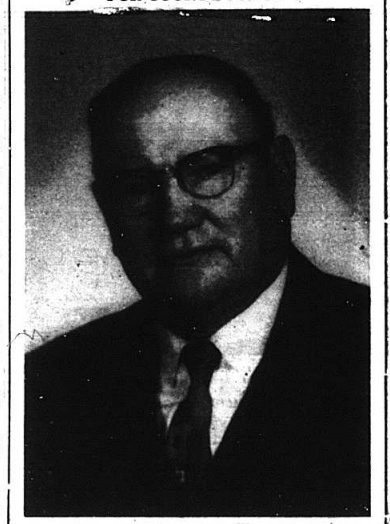

The Signal Says--

We Welcome A New Telephone Company

For many years the Signal has sat idly while Rockcastle organizations have fought the "Battle of the Telephones" through the courts.

We have never commented editorially on the Mt. Vernon Telephone Co., or the service it renders. We have reported, as it is our duty as a newspaper, the many ups and downs of the company as objectively as possible. We were not the cause of the indictments against J. F. Dees, owner, or the company. We were not the cause of any verbal battle that has involved the company. We have not even complained of telephone service, and we had none three days this week.

To the contrary. For years we have maintained the hope that the company, a local company, would grow and expand its facilities and services through rural Rockcastle. We have hoped that as modern telephone facilities came into being, the Mt. Vernon company would gradually replace its box and crank system with something at least a little more up to date. This has not been the case.

We have never editorially spoken for the Rockcastle County Co-Operative. We have not always - that is, on every point - agreed with the co-op. Perhaps we have been lagging, or we have failed to understand the urgency of the situation, or we have not been fully informed. Regardless of the reasons, we did not, so to speak, put all our eggs in the co-op basket.

But within the last two years the cry for better telephone service has been echoed from every corner in the county. It reached its greatest pitch recently when a Rockcastle County Grand Jury indicted Mr. Dees and the company for failure to render reasonable telephone service to the people of Rockcastle in general and the Rockcastle County Baptist Hospital in particular.

This indictment and the evidence seems to us to emphasize beyond reasonable doubt that the telephone company will not, nor does it intend, ever to improve or expand its facilities. We also feel the indictment of a public utility is, in effect, sounding the death-knell of its usefulness to the county.

We believe the public has found a substitute in the Northeastern Telephone Corp., of Chicago. Perry D. Woodward, vice president, has been at Mt. Vernon and discussed the situation. While here he explained his company's position at a meeting attended by several businessmen.

The result of the meeting is reported on Page 1 of this issue. The result: Northeastern is willing to establish here if the people of the county want it; it has the money; the know-how; and will operate side by side with the Mt. Vernon Telephone Co. It will even, Mr. Woodward says, establish more service than the co-op, should the co-op be awarded a permit. This is a "good deal." The best deal that has been advanced.

Mr. Woodward is scheduled to visit the area and speak at a meeting of the Lion's Club, as well as all other interested persons, tonight at 7:30 at Renfro Valley Lodge. He will tell the group virtually the same thing as we have reported. He hopes for good attendance, and he also hopes for assurances his company will have countywide support at Frankfort when the time comes.

There is no doubt the new company will have to fight a way into Rockcastle by the courts. But with the citizens of the county on its side, it has won the battle already. We welcome Northeastern to Rockcastle County.

 sons to discuss it further. At the Friday meeting he received assurances from businessmen present that county residents want another telephone system and that Northeastern could depend on county-wide support from residents and organizations.

Currently, Northeastern operates telephone systems in Laurel, Pulaski and Knox counties in this vicinity. One of the reasons it desires to come to Rockcastle is that the company can link its telephone direct with Laurel and Pulaski and at the same time service the Rockcastle area. Northeastern is primarily a company which supplies telephone service to small towns and rural areas, and through a private company, works closely with the Rural Electrification Association (REA).

Woodward explained to the some 15 persons at the meeting the company would move into Mt. Vernon within a matter of hours after a permit is issued by the PSC and set up line on a switchboard on a temporary basis. He said plans for a dial system would be presented to the PSC in its application, but that it would take about six months to install. The company would work on a magnet system until the dial system is complete.

The vice president stressed to those present that not every family in Rockcastle would be able to have a telephone, but that in all areas where it is financially practical there would be telephone service. First lines to be built would probably be with Vernon with general expansion into Brodhead, Livingston and rural areas taking place as the company consolidated its position and built more lines.

The decision by Northeastern broke the telephone problem wide open. All efforts of the co-op to date have resulted in court entanglements with the Mt. Vernon company. At present Dees is scheduled to appear in Rockcastle Circuit Court on June 6 to answer two indict-

ments and two against the company on charges of failure to render reasonable telephone service to the citizens of Rockcastle in general and the Rockcastle County Baptist Hospital in particular. Woodward indicated his company is ready and willing to do battle to get the franchise for the cities and remainder of Rockcastle. Representing Northeastern at Frankfort in its efforts will be Joseph Leary and his law firm associates. Woodward expressed the desire to have as many business, professional and residents of Rockcastle to attend the meeting tonight, and reiterated his company's need to have the people of the county behind the company.
