Northeastern Phone Company To Apply For Permit Friday

A permit to operate a telephone system in Rockcastle County, consistent with the Mt. Vernon Telephone Co., will be applied for Friday, to the Public Service Commission at Frankfort by the Northeastern Telephone Co. of Chicago.

The company had expected to apply for the permit last Friday but a postponement was made on the advice of Northeastern attorneys.

The new company gave the indication is planned to move into Rockcastle when Perry D. Woodward, executive vice president, visited Mt. Vernon more than a week ago to discuss company plans. Up until that time the public had no inkling that Northeastern had plans to go into business in the county.

Following a discussion with several businessmen at Mt. Vernon, Woodward agreed to a public meeting last Thursday at Renfro Valley at which time he explained assurances of some 100 persons present that the company could count on county-wide support if it decided to come to Rockcastle.

Whether the delay means the PSC will not be able to act on the permit at the May meeting is not certain in all probability. It will be the last week of June before the PSC gets around to the telephone company's application. All interested persons must be notified of the company's intentions before the case comes to a hearing before the commission.

The company will ask for a permit to operate side by side with the Mt. Vernon company, but Northeastern is expected to provide more service in rural areas.

Mt. Vernon-Broadhead Highway Bid Awarded

A contract for construction on the Mt. Vernon-Broadhead road has been awarded the Cantrell Construction Co., of Lexington according to an announcement by Robert Humphreys, Commissioner of Highways.

The company submitted a bid of \$41,888.20. The contract calls for Mt. Vernon-Stanford Road from U. S. 26 in Mt. Vernon to southwest city limits of Mt. Vernon, 0.514 mile. Bituminous Concrete Surface Class I. Mt. Vernon-Stanford Road from southwest city limits of Mt. Vernon to end of concrete 2.175 miles southeast of city limits of Broedhead, 3.331 miles.

SCI ACCEPTS WITHDRAWALS OF FOUR TOWNS

Scene Cumberlanders Inc. has decided to move its office to Monticello from Somerset. The organization's Board of Directors voted last week to make the move.

The board also voted to accept the withdrawal of four towns from the organization—Mt. Vernon, Berea, Corbin and London. Secretary Edwin H. Roberts read letters from the Chambers of Commerce from London, Corbin and Berea withdrawing from the tourist promotion organization. These withdrawals, along with one received earlier from Mt. Vernon were accepted on a motion from Carl Shearer, Monticello.

Mt. Vernon withdrew after officials decided the heart of scenic Cumberlanders efforts were in the Lake Cumberland region.

Judge R. C. Tartar today called a special grand jury and a Special Session of Rockcastle Circuit Court beginning June 3 and continuing through June 8 to investigate what he called "some lawlessness in Rockcastle County that demands an immediate investigation."

What that "some lawlessness" is was not disclosed by Judge Tartar. There was speculation among public officials, but none would be quoted.

The Grand Jury move came as a surprise. Most residents expected a special session on June 6 to hear four indictments—two against J. F. Dees, president of the Mt. Vernon Telephone Co., and two against the Mt. Vernon Telephone Co., on charges of failure to render reasonable telephone service to the people of Rockcastle County in general and the Rockcastle County Baptist Hospital in particular—but almost no one was prepared for the Grand Jury Call.

Judge Tartar's order summoning the Grand Jury into session stated:

"It appearing to the court that there is urgent unfinished business pending in Rockcastle Circuit Court which demands immediate trial and litigation; it further appearing to the court that there has been some lawlessness in Rockcastle County that demands an immediate investigation by a Grand Jury and indictments therefor; it is therefore ordered that a special term of Rockcastle Circuit Court be called to convene in the City of Mt. Vernon Monday June 3, at the hour of 10 o'clock a. m. Daylight Saving Time, and to continue six judicial days."

The order then enumerated the four cases to be heard involving the telephone company and Mr. Dees.

In the order Judge Tartar stated: "It is further ordered by the court that a Special Grand Jury be empaneled and clothed with full power to indict on all criminal charges and the Clerk of the court is directed to open the envelope that contains the list of the jurors drawn from the jury wheel for the regular July term, 1957."

The jurors and their precinct numbers are: Holt, Wilbur, 14; Ponder, Fred, 13; Wadley, Bert, 23; Richards, George, 27; Mobley, Daniel, 12; Mahaffey, James, 23; Holt, C. F., 28; secretary and Mrs. Sam Jones, second vice president, were not available for the picture.

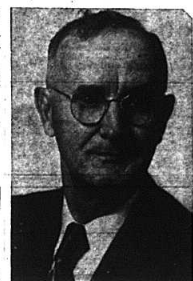

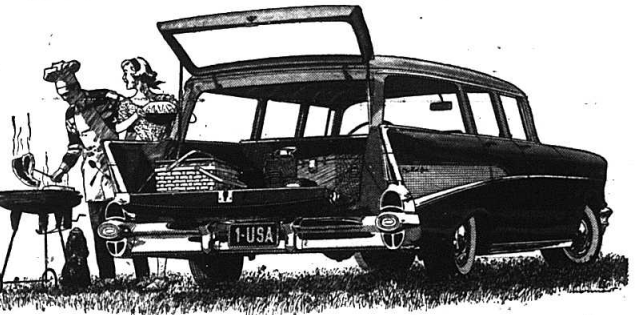

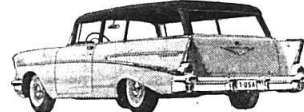

Board Adopts New Stockyard Regulation

The Kentucky State Board of Agriculture has adopted a regulation requiring that all bulls and female cattle over six months of age and milking goats being taken to the farm from a stockyard or any other place of sale must first be tested and found free of brucellosis. The Board, which met in Lexington, Ky., July 1, effective date of the regulation.

The regulation will mean that every stockyard and sales place must provide an accredited veterinarian to test and inspect bulls, cows, and milking goats purchased to be taken back to the farm. A fee of \$1 a head is charged to the seller for this service. Animals accompanied by an official health certificate issued within the past 30 days are exempted from the test. Also exempted are officially vaccinated animals under 30 months of age, spayed heifers, steers, and cattle designated for immediate slaughter.

The Board also adopted a resolution of appreciation for services by its late member John G. Bettram Jr., Vanceburg, and expressed deep regret for his death. Bettram, 44, was drowned April 10, when his car plunged into the Mill Creek stream in Lewis County.

The UK Scholarship committee recommended Frith for the 4-year grant of \$500 per year using funds furnished by the Keeneland Foundation.

Mrs. Amy Frith Veterinary Plan Saves Public Money

Substantial savings in the taxpayer's dollars have been realized from adequately insured, state-owned property, according to Cad P. Thurman, commissioner of the Department of Insurance.

The State Farm and Tornado Insurance Fund is the agency within the Insurance Department charged with the responsibility of insuring state-owned property. Thurman said the State, in effect, is a self-insurer which doesn't insure the public with an average value in excess of \$200,000 any one risk.

Present value placed on State property is approximately \$180,000,000 of which \$102,000,000 is reinsured in commercial companies, he said. This amount has been first used during the first term of Gov. Albert B. Chandler, Thurman said.

Government paid since Jan. 1 by the Fund to state agencies, due to losses incurred by wind storm and fire, total \$7,173,000. The State Insurance Fund, the largest single claim, \$56,427.91, was paid to the University of Kentucky and does not include the \$193,000 paid for the fire in Frazier Hill, he said.

Jobless Pay Down In State In March

A total of 13,246 initial claims for unemployment benefits were filed during March at local offices of the State Economic Security Department, the agency reported.

Of these, 536 were by Korean veterans and 129 by released federal employees, the department said. The unemployment rate presents a drop of 19.7 percent from February and was practically at the same level of 10.1 percent last year, the agency added. It also reported.

The February-March decline was primarily the result of usual seasonal factors.

Unemployment rates, which represent weeks of unemployment, totaled 169,975 during March with Korean veterans' unemployment claims were down by 10 percent from February but were up 65.70 percent over March of last year.

During March, 2,123 persons acquired the 26 weeks of benefit rights under the program with 1,932 of these exhausting benefit rights under the program. The Kentucky law exhaustion was 32.0 percent from the same month of last year.

The department paid \$3,472,057 to unemployed persons during March. Included was \$217,079 paid to Korean veterans and \$69,753 paid to federal employees. Payment from the Kentucky unemployment insurance trust fund amounted to \$2,785,225 in February and 34.4 percent above March, 1956.

The greater amount of payment in March than in February reflects the payment of high claims load during February and January. The March average payment for a week of total unemployment was \$23.78 which was \$17.9 greater than during the same month of 1956.

'57 Burley Production Requires Much Planting

Burley farmers ought to start this month planning their 1957 tobacco crop says Russell Hunt, UK Agricultural Extension Service burley specialist.

For instance, they should test soils for nitrogen, lime, phosphorus, and potash needs. Stalks also must be applied to cropland or sod if no uranium will or black shank was in the previous crop. Hunt notes Stalks should be applied early.

The 1956 crop was mild, thin bodied flavorful and ripe; this

kind of tobacco, Hunt says, has been in demand for making cigarettes. All these factors—soil nutrient needs, past cropping history, and market demand for burley—should be a guide to proper fertilization of the 1957 tobacco crop.

Dieldrin Works Well In Grubworm Control

Dieldrin insecticide applied six to eight weeks ahead of burley tobacco bed planting time works very well in controlling the grubworm pest. February is one month this can be done.

Best of all, says the UK Agricultural Experiment Station, One half-pint actual Dieldrin in a gallon or more of water (as spray) will control the burley grub. If granular Dieldrin is used it will control the grub even on the contemplated bed area. These rates are based on one square yard of bed surface.

17-Year Locusts Make Rockcastle Appearance

This is the year of the 17-year locust, and they're chipping away at Rockcastle wood, according to Matt Jones, Fifth District Magistrate.

Mr. Jones recalls a locust year in 1906, again in 1923 and in 1940. He said he recorded the dates each locust year. He also noted some in Rockcastle woods each year, but not nearly as many as on the 17-year dates.

Low-Cost Phosphorus Brings Extra Corn

A phosphorus fertilizer application costing the farmer only \$7.20 per acre brought him an additional 45 bushels of corn last year in a fertility test on Nelson County land by an experiment conducted by the University of Kentucky.

The experiment was conducted by E. C. Doll, UK Agricultural Experiment Station fertility specialist. Even smaller applications of phosphorus than the highest rate gave the farmer increased yields of from 24 to 37 bushels per acre.

Doll grew KY 163 hybrid on the test land. Fertilization other than the phosphorus application was normal for that area.

Pensioners Must Notify VA On Income Increase

Veterans and dependents who receive pension payments from the Veterans Administration should notify the VA promptly of an increase in income which raises their annual income above the statutory limit. The VA announced today.

Pensioners are payable to certain eligible veterans of World War I, World War II and the Korean conflict period who are permanently and totally disabled from causes not connected with their service in the Armed Forces, and to certain widows and children of veterans of these wars who are service-connected causes. In both cases, the annual income of those receiving pension must be below \$1,400 without dependents, or \$2,700 with dependents.

VA said the only dependents allowed for a living veteran are a wife and minor children and for a widow minor children.

Slugs Can Damage Burley Plant Beds

Slugs (commonly known as snails without shells) can damage burley plant beds, says a University of Kentucky Agricultural Experiment Station bulletin.

The slug is a very little in plant bed, but it will leave a hole in the soil and will leave

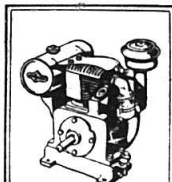
