New Phone Company Applies For Permit; Charter Granted

Mt. Vernon's new telephone system came closer to reality Wednesday when Northeastern Telephone Corp. of Chicago, applied for a permit to the Public Service Commission at Frankfort to operate a telephone system in Rockcastle County.

The application came close on the heels of an announcement by the Secretary of State at Frankfort that a company known as the Rockcastle Telephone Co. has been granted a charter of incorporation. Doing the incorporating were T. T. Carlson, B. T. Malmquist and P. D. Woodward, all of Chicago.

The new company was capitalized at \$10,000. In the request for the charter to form a company the group stated the \$10,000 would be used to install two common-battery switchboards—one for Mt. Vernon and one for Brodhead and to purchase about 500 telephones and 75 miles of wire.

A common-battery is the closest to a dial system that can be installed. There is an exchange operator. The operator answers when the receiver is picked up. It eliminates the crank system. The telephone operates from a battery, but the battery is located at the exchange and not attached to the telephone instrument. Berea has such a system at this time.

In its application to the PSC the Rockcastle Telephone Co. indicated it would install a dial system within the next 18 months. The first installation is temporary.

According to Mr. Woodward, a 20 day notice will be given before a hearing is held before the PSC. The notice period begins either Wednesday or Friday. He declared the Commission will set a hearing promptly and will take up the technicalities connected with issuing a franchise probably when the PSC sits the last week of June.

Woodward also reported the company will have prompt service when the temporary system is installed. He said Bell Telephone Co. has indicated it would furnish service.

The company also plans a prospective customer survey within the next two weeks. The company hopes to receive a piece in the area to talk about the telephone company with residents and to make plans within the next three weeks.

The Rockcastle Telephone Co. has indicated it will give rural service, and will give rural service, than the Rockcastle County Co-Operative, which applied to the PSC several months ago for a permit to operate a telephone company.

The co-op plans to continue its efforts to get a permit, but if they would continue if the Rockcastle company is awarded the franchise.

The new company will operate side by side with the Mt. Vernon Telephone Co. By Kentucky Statutes, a franchise is not exclusive. Several can be granted and all to different companies.

McClure Strikes Out; Collect Calls Stopped

Ray McClure, news editor of the Mt. Vernon Signal, got the going from J. P. Dees, president of the Mt. Vernon Telephone Co. today when he ordered his operator not to accept collect calls.

The operator did not say why the order had been given. When a call was put in to the Lexington Leader, the operator informed McClure. Mr. Dees had ordered from now on no collect calls would be accepted.

Cummins, Sowder Take Lead

Sen. Cooper Says 'Time' Investigated

Sen. John Sherman Cooper, in a letter to the Signal this week declared Congress is making an effort to eliminate the confusion existing between Daylight Time and Standard Time.

Senator Cooper also reported he has heard nothing in regards to an extension westward of the Eastern Standard Time Zone. Some rumors have had it that the Eastern Standard Time Zone line at Corbin might be extended westward to include Louisville.

The Senator declared Congressmen Staggers and O'Hara have both introduced measures into the House of Representatives for the standard time of each zone of the United States to be the time measure for all purposes, and further stated, he had heard no mention of legislation that would make Daylight Time a uniform time for all areas.

If this bill passes, it will mean only that basic time would be Standard Time, and this area would have Central Standard Time.

Congressman Staggers has also introduced a second bill that would permit either Standard Time or Daylight Time in a given area or areas by resolution of Congress.

Passage of this measure would mean that if an area—say an area largely industrialized—wanted Daylight Time, officials would have to consult Congress before Daylight Time became effective.

Senator Cooper reported all legislation of time has been referred to the House Committee on Interstate and Foreign Commerce, and as yet, no action has been taken.

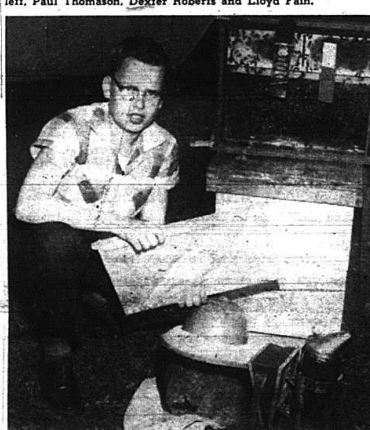

In the race for Representative of the 79th District, Murphy Whitehead, another newcomer, is leading former jailer, Wallie Phillips, 200 votes. Mt. Vernon Police Judge Leonard Langford is running third. The vote is: Whitehead, 870; Phillips, 670; Langford, 558.

In the 7-way race for coroner, Fred Murrell, another political newcomer, is in the lead over

More Cooperation On Mosquito Control

Agriculture Commissioner Ben Butler has stressed the necessity for local cooperation in the State's aerial spraying campaign against mosquitoes. Individuals in infested areas must employ certain control measures on their own property, Butler said.

They must organize on a community-wide basis to combat the mosquito threat, the commissioner added. He recommended:

Development of a community organization to perfect a concerted control program.

Clean-up of all refuse around the home and drainage of standing water.

Our State Parks will look more beautiful and visitors will derive more enjoyment from them, if we keep the parks clean and safe.

When visitors come to our Commonwealth, let's be sure they get a fine impression. One way is for campers to make sure their fires are completely out and their sites uncluttered when they leave the area," she added.

Many other states have inaugurated such clean-up drives and have met with much success.

He said these are either seeking appropriations from local government, conducting a campaign of door-to-door persuasion, or planning and carrying out drainage measures.

Butler stated that after conferring with field personnel in charge of the State program, he could assure county officials that every effort will be made to provide suitable control measures when weather conditions permit within the limitations of the department's budget.

If additional services are required, he added, private aircraft can be used to supplement the agency's facilities to re-spray areas where rain had washed off the larvicide.

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Chemical treatment of all stagnant pools.

Covering all water containers around the home.

Elimination or spraying of all mosquito harboring places, such as weeds, shrubs and bushes.

Butler commended certain rural and urban groups such as the Calvert City Kiwanis promoting local control measures.

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maggot and seed rot are obtained by use of commercial preparations containing an insecticide-in fungicide combination. Treatment costs only a few cents per bushel of seed; much protection is obtained, and this all corn seed. However, flood rigners points out, it does NOT take the place of soil treatment. The southern corn root-worm by tunneling toward the bud in the seedling, kills the bud. The corn-root aphids hit seedlings, causing them sometimes to turn a purplish color often mistakenly believed to be a zinc deficiency. Check such plants, he says, for aphid presence.

Although the station agronomy department does not advocate use of fertilizer-insecticide mixtures, farmers using it should observe certain practices. For instance, confine fertilizer-insecticide mixtures to the 2-1-1 or 1-4-4 mixtures; do not place this mixture in contact with the seed; and, subsequent fertilizer applications should be broadcast and should NOT contain insecticides.

Extension leaflet 190, available at county agents' offices or the bulletin room, Experiment Station, Lexington, will give full details on such corn treatment, as well as on strawberries and tobacco. White Lawn Grubs Hit Residence Grass Plots.

White lawn grubs, an insect pest that can feed on lawn roots to such an extent that the lawn sometimes can be rolled back just like a carpet, should be controlled now. Richard Thurston, UK Agricultural Experiment Station entomologist, says the grubs feed close to the grass surface, which makes it easier to control them. They are about an inch below the surface.

Four materials will control grubs, plus other soil insects such as wireworms and ants which are annoying or damaging. The materials are Heptachlor, Aldrin, Chlordane and Dieldrin.

The rates per 1,000 square feet: Aldrin and Heptachlor, 2 1/2 pounds of a 5 percent granular or dust; Dieldrin, 1.25 lbs. and Chlordane, 5 pounds.

Don't put the dust or granular materials recommended here Aldrin or Heptachlor, both at two-thirds to 1 and one-third pounds actual material per acre. Emulsion concentrate sprays, granular insecticides, or fertilizer-insecticide mixtures can be used.

Limited observations here indicates that seed corn maggot also may be controlled by soil insecticides applied during planting. However, excellent control of both the seed corn

larvae on when the ground is wet. For safety's sake, especially the treated area with a garden hose to get the dust down into the sod. This will reduce the possibility of harm to animals of small children.

Spittlebug Spray Program Can Be Started Right Now. Spray alfalfa fields now to control the spittlebug pest, says the UK agricultural Experiment Station Entomology Department. Fields treated against this pest may produce as much as double the amount of forage they would produce if not treated.

Use Heptachlor insecticide, says Kenneth Starks, entomologist, the spray rate is 1 and one-half pints of the 25 percent emulsion concentrate in 10 to 20 gallons of water per acre. Fields can be pastured 10 days later.

Granular insecticides (which look like fertilizer) are recommended. Granulars penetrate the grass to the grubs, and possess a residual problem to children or pets who might come in contact with it.

Methoxychlor also can be used, at the rate of a half gallon of emulsion concentrate in 10 to 20 gallons of water per acre. Pasture or cut for forage after 10 days. Starks advises. Spittlebugs surround themselves with a mass of foamy

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material on the stems and leaves of alfalfa. They inject poisons into the plants during feeding which can stunt plant growth considerably. Starks said spraying should be done immediately.
