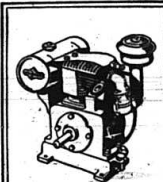

## Man Dies In Boone Plane Crash

A student pilot was killed early Sunday when his light plane crashed into a wooded hillside on the Madison-Rockcastle counties line south of Berea.

The dead man was identified as Edward Franz Jr. of Cincinnati, Ohio. He was taken to Britton Funeral Home at Berea. The accident occurred on the Johnny Willis farm about a mile and a half off U. S. 25. The plane had passed over Mt. Vernon a short time before the accident and was in no apparent trouble.

An eyewitness to the crash, Herman Sparkman, said he saw the plane coming from the south "very low." He declared as the plane approached a patch of clouds it went into a stiff climb, then seemed to balk and come straight down.

At the time of the crash, about 9:45 a. m., Sparkman was reported working on an electric fence at his farm. He and his son went to the hillside where the plane crashed. The woodland covered several acres.

Searchers found the plane about an hour later when they smelled gasoline. The plane hit the ground nose first. Only two or three trees were damaged. The engine dug a hole a foot deep in the ground. The plane, a Cessna 140, was demolished. Franz's wife reported her husband was flying from Knoxville to Cincinnati. She was traveling the distance by car and was to have met him at the London airport should weather conditions become too severe to continue the flight. She received word of the crash when she arrived at London, and later came to Berea.

## KU Wants Rate Increase

Kentucky Utilities Company asked the Public Service Commission Tuesday for authority to make electric rate adjustments that will add about two cents a day to the average residential customer's electric bill beginning July 1.

It is the company's first rate increase in 37 years. KU President R. M. Watt pointed out that increased costs for fuel, equipment, and labor since World War II have more than offset the savings from operating efficiencies. He said it is the company's first rate increase in 37 years.

"We have held the line against rising prices until now," Watt said, "but we can't stretch our dollars any farther if we are to continue to provide the quality of service our customers demand and are entitled to."

Watt said the total increase from the proposed rate adjustments—about \$2,505,000 a year—will be used to provide additional and better service to the company's customers, to improve facilities, and to insure continued efficient service in the future.

Percentage-wise, he pointed out, the proposed new rate schedules put the average rate back to where it was in 1942 before the last reduction was made.

KU's history has been one of repeated rate reductions, Watt said, all of which have stemmed from greater use of electricity by KU customers, and better operating efficiencies by the company. The nine rate reductions since 1935 have cut customers' average kilowatt hour cost more than 40 per cent.

# Dees On Trial

### COURT DENIES CHANGE OF VENUE

J. F. Dees, president of the Mt. Vernon Telephone Co., is scheduled to go on trial in Rockcastle Circuit Court this afternoon on a charge of "failure to provide efficient and reasonable telephone service."

Judge R. C. Tartar over-ruled a motion of the defense for a change of venue that is a change to another court. The change was asked on grounds made by the defense that Dees could not get a fair and impartial trial in Rockcastle County.

In quick, one-two-three-action, Judge Tartar over-ruled the motion by Dees' attorney, Calvert Little of London, for the change of venue to another court, probably Pulaski Circuit Court.

Then, at the request of Attorney Little, four indictments returned by the Grand Jury in the last regular session of Circuit Court, were quashed.

Commonwealth Attorney Russell Jones then made a motion that the court try Dees on an indictment returned by a special session of the Grand Jury this week. Judge Tartar agreed, and set the trial for this afternoon. The first move this afternoon will be a selection of a jury.

The judge apparently over-ruled the change of venue when the prosecution introduced affidavits signed by leading Rockcastle citizens that they believed Dees could get a fair trial.

Dees, through his attorney, asked for the change to the other court. He stated in his petition to the court for a trial scene change that "he is informed and believes, and it is true, that the publicity and notoriety and within prosecution has been spread throughout Rockcastle County, Kentucky, by the local newspaper and by word of the general and that publicity given the within action has so inflamed the minds of the citizens and residents and prospective jurors of Rockcastle County, so as to make it impossible for the defendant to have a fair and impartial trial."

An earlier Grand Jury indicted Dees and the telephone company. That Grand Jury returned two indictments against Dees and two against the telephone company. The special Grand Jury called this week returned one indictment. That indictment was against Dees only and charged him with failure to furnish efficient and reasonable telephone service to the people of the county general and the Rockcastle County Baptist Hospital in particular.

While Dees was in court, the Northeastern Telephone Corp. of Chicago and its affiliate, the Rockcastle Telephone Co., went ahead with plans to move into Rockcastle as soon as the Public Service Commission at Frankfort issues a franchise. The PSC will sit the last week of June, and is expected to act on the application at that time.

Shortly, employees of the telephone company at London will come to Rockcastle to knock into the telephone company headquarters and to begin a survey of persons interested in a new telephone.

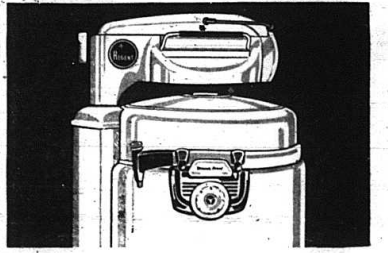

## Reconciled

AT THE heart and beginning of the Christian life there is not a theory, or a set of propositions, but an experience. It is the experience of a supernatural called healing, for the broken tissues of life are made whole again. It is sometimes called conversion, but more often called re-conversion. It is the direction and course of life is changed. The changes are not in the things themselves, but in the way we view them. We are reconciled to God. There are two meanings (and that is the word Reconciliation, and at the risk of insulting some reader's intelligence the difference between these meanings must be pointed out). The Bible sense: True reconciliation means restoring a lost harmony. It means making with God in such a way that all the enmities, all the hostility and fear in our hearts is burned away by his presence. It is the reconciliation of a man with himself. It is what happened, essentially, to Jacob at the brook where he wrestled with the angel. He said: "What ever we make of that story, it is plain what Jacob thought about it. "I have seen the face of God," he said. Before that day, Jacob had had only the reflection of a man's smile. After that day, he was God's man. He had really born purposes with God. He was reconciled. God's will was his will. Thinking correct thoughts about God will never enough. One must personally meet him; he personally yield to him; be personally reconciled.

## PRECAUTIONS URGED IN TOBACCO SETTING

When tobacco setting time arrives about the end of May, farmers should follow several simple, proved practices, says Russell Hunt, Agricultural Extension Service tobacco specialist. Hunt said this year's tobacco beds are in excellent shape, with a good prospect for plenty of plants. The beds are almost entirely free of the usual diseases that plague farmers. 1. Insure a good stand in the field by spraying or dusting plants (before pulling) in the beds with the recommended concentrations of DDT to control flea-beetles, which will give protection from 5 to 10 days in the field (depending on the weather) to the newly transplanted plants. 2.
