Wheat Profits and Yields Boosted by Plant Food Use



Costs per bushel go down and profits go up when wheat crop is properly fertilized. FERTILIZER can help boost wheat yields at least 9 1/2 bushels per acre, reports the

Middle West Soil Improvement Committee, in citing a recent statement by Floyd W. Smith, Kansas State College agronomist.

Smith reports that wheat responds more profitably to fertilizer use than any other crop. The 9 1/2 bushel increase, he said, could be accomplished by the use of only 25 pounds of nitrogen per acre, plus necessary phosphate and potash fertilizer.

An extra four bushels per acre, he said, can be added to the wheat yield by doubling the nitrogen application.

Smith says that fertilizer can increase wheat yields in dry years as well as wet ones.

Farm experience in some other Midwestern states indicates that it often pays to use 20 to 300 pounds of a complete fertilizer containing nitrogen, phosphate and potash, such as 10-10-10, reports the Middle West Soil Improvement Committee.

County Agents Notes

Variety of Crops On Hand For Horticulture Field Day
Commercial vegetable producers and home gardeners alike will get a complete run-down on production methods when the annual Horticulture Field Day of the UK Agricultural Experiment Station horticulture department is held at Lexington, July 16.

Plastic greenhouses work fruit-setting hormone sprays, vegetable variety trials, chemical weed control of strawberries, seed-bed preparation and culture of forest tree seedlings, strawberry mulching tests, and fruit orchard work—all these will be demonstrated.

The horticulturists set the field day two weeks earlier this year, to let visitors see crops in actual production rather than after their harvest.

The plastic greenhouse work—attracting national attention—includes growing tomatoes and lettuce, and vegetables and flower transplants. Greenhouses with permanent-type plastics will be inspected, and improved heating and ventilating methods shown.

Farmers will see the stimulation of growth and yield of several different vegetables, including tomatoes, potatoes, sweet corn, beans and others. Fruit-setting hormones, announced last year, will be explained. These materials increase the yield and size of tomatoes; an addition to the need of fertilizers in relation to hormone-set fruit will be demonstrated.

The session opens at 10:00 a. m. (CDDT) and concludes at 3:00 p. m. Lunch will be available at the plots.

Tomato Late Blight Hitting State Crops
Keep a close watch on tomato and potato fields for the disease "late blight," the Kentucky Agricultural Experiment Station pathology department advises.

R. A. Chapman, pathologist, said the disease has been found in Caldwell and Whitley counties. In Caldwell county, he said, a two-acre field, set with plants from southern sources, has been plowed under because of loss from the disease.

Commercial growers and home gardeners are urged to keep a close watch on their tomato and potato plantings for the first signs of the disease. Samples should be sent to him, Chapman said, for inspection and analysis, at the agronomy department of the Experiment Station, Lexington.

Spray tomatoes and potatoes with either zineb or Maneb, according to manufacturers' directions, Chapman noted, at weekly intervals during rainy weather, or periods of cool weather with heavy dews.

In dry weather, an interval between sprayings may be lengthened to 10 days to two weeks. These sprayings will control other diseases as well as later blight, he said.

Control Measures Given On Tobacco Field Insects
A number of insect pests that damage field burley stands

must be controlled for a successful crop, says the UK Agricultural Experiment Station entomology department.
"Here they are: Flea-beetles: Most important pest year in and out; control with DDT, Endrin, or Dieldrin, either spray or dust form. Use as a spray, 1 to 2 pounds of a 50 percent wettable powder in 50 gallons of water to cover one acre.

No Dieldrin SPRAY is recommended; use 1 1/2 percent Dieldrin dust at 15 to 20 pounds per acre.

Endrin should be used as a spray at the rate of 0.2 to 0.4 pounds (emulsion concentrate) actual per acre; this figures out to 1 to 2 pints in 5 to 15 gallons of water per acre.

Cutworms: A pest just transplanting, can be controlled with DDT dust or spray, or Endrin dust or spray. The same rates apply here as for use against fleabeetles. Treat soil about the plant, the specialists note.
