

The petition is expected to call on the Council to instruct city police to use discretion in making traffic arrests—to consider the type of offense and where the offense occurs before nailing a motorist and fining him.

Below is that we found on the record for the past three months: "In April, total fines and costs in Mt. Vergon Police Court totaled \$1,281. Of this amount, the city treasury got \$654; City Attorney John Allen got \$285; Police Chief Waldo Wilson and Policeman McKinley. Arnold got \$171 each. A total of \$1 arrests were made. 35 of these were for traffic violations. The remainder were for such violations as drunk and breach of peace. In May, there was \$90 lin total fines and costs. Of this, the city treasury got \$461; Attorney Allen, \$200; Chief Wilson and Policeman Arnold, \$120 each. A total of \$1 arrests were made. 24 of the 41 were for traffic reloations. In June, a total of \$1,302 was taken in through fines and costs. the town got \$719; Attorney Allen, \$265; Wisson and Arnold, \$159 each. There were \$4 arrests in June. 19 of these were for traffic violations.

On the basis of these figures, and considering the number of autos, trucks and vehicles which travel through Mt. Vernon during a month's time, by no stretch of the imagination could decision.
