55 Criminal Cases Docketed Monday For Judge Tartar

Some 55 cases, ranging from child desecration to murder, will be on the criminal docket when Rockcastle Circuit Court opens Monday, at Mt. Vernon.

Probably the most important case on the agenda will be the retrial of the Ole Martin murder case. The trial ended in a hung jury in the last term of court. Martin is on trial for the pond party in the Three Links area of the county last year. The trial is scheduled for July 18.

Another retrial, a civil case, is scheduled during this term of court. A suit against George Wren of Boone, the outgrowth of a truck-suit, wreck, is scheduled for July 24.

Other cases scheduled during this term of court are: Eugene Smith, assault and battery; Siegel Hall, untaxed whiskey in possession; Hayes Allen, grand larceny; Warrick Scott, flourishing deadly weapon; Carl Ramsey, concealed weapon.

Mail Rates Upped For Few Items

As most residents already know, the Post Office Department has increased some mailing rates.

The fees on new insured rates are 10 cents up to \$10; 20 cents from \$10 to \$50; 30 cents from \$50 to \$100, and 40 cents from \$100 to \$200.

Certified mail is up from 15 cents to 20 cents.

Money order fees are: 15 cents for a money order valued up to \$5; 20 cents for a money order valued from \$5 to \$10, and 30 cents for an order from \$10 to \$100.

Return receipts showing to whom and when delivered are 10 cents. Return receipts after mailing showing to whom, and where delivered are 35 cents. Request after mailing showing to whom and when delivered are 25 cents.

Restricted delivery applicable to registered mail, certified mail, and insured mail for more than \$10, a fee of 50 cents. Special delivery mail, including air parcel post, not more than two pounds, 30 cents; two pounds, but not more than 10 pounds, 60 cents.

Business reply mail; business reply cards, 4 cents; business reply envelope, 5 cents; other business reply mail, 2 cents per piece plus postage. Special handling fees: not over 2 pounds, 35 cents; from 2 to 10 pounds, 35 cents; over 10 pounds, 50 cents.

The listed increases in rates are not all that went into effect, but they constitute those which are used most at Mt. Vernon. Brothead and Livingston.

Regular letter post and air mail letters did not change.

Woman Shot At Richmond

A bullet wound suffered by Mrs. M. M. (Nancy) Robinson Rice, proved fatal Friday afternoon.

Council Hears Traffic Arrest Complaints

About 15 persons complained to the Mt. Vernon City Council Friday night of police activities in the city and got a pledge from the Council to study the question.

The Council was presented a petition signed by some 100 persons, part of them residents and part from the county, complaining of arrests and fines levied against tourists using U. S. 25 and U. S. 150. The petitioners also complained that police are spending too much time in certain areas of the town. It asked the Council to instruct police to use discretion in making an arrest and to consider the seriousness of the offense.

To complicate matters for the Council, some residents were at the meeting to complain there is not enough police protection in the city, especially between 4 a. m. and 6 a. m.

One of the spokesmen for the petitioners, service station owner Tom Coffey, declared he would not accuse police of operating a speed trap but that Mt. Vernon is getting the worst name in the "S. C." for traffic arrests.

"I was threatened and abused by a resident of the town of Tenn., when I visited there recently because of a fine levied against the persons when he was in Mt. Vernon. Many of my customers are going elsewhere. I don't know whether they are being fined or not, but do know they are scared to come through Mt. Vernon," Coffey said. He also stated after a 4 a. m. police stop at his service station, "you could carry the town off."

Mt. Vernon has one police car and two policemen. A report by Police Judge Leonard Langford shows 94 persons were fined in June. Of the 54 fined, 16 were fined for traffic offenses of various kinds.

Mayor Roy Cummins told the group he could tell a policeman who to arrest and who not to arrest. He also noted Judge Langford's report and said he did not see a speed trap in 19 arrests and fines in a 30-day period.

Chief Waldo Wilson told the Council all persons stopped are not fined.

He said only about one-fourth of those stopped were fined. He stressed to the visitors he would continue to do his duty and that he was already giving many motorists the benefit of the doubt.

The mayor then polled the Council on their feelings in the matter.

Jack St. Clair: "I think Wilson is doing a good job. I think he should continue to do his job as he is doing it."

"Bob Jasper: "I think he has done a good job. But we do hear complaints that too many motorists are being fined. I guess those fined are guilty, but there are still these complaints."

Jess Cummins: "There's an awful lot of criticism. I don't know according to what." (Continued on page 4)

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No Free Salk Vaccine For First Series Shots

There is no more free Salk polio vaccine for first inoculations at the Rockcastle County Health Department, Dr. Walker Owens reported this week.

He reported persons who have already had the first shot may get the other two shots free due to the lack of vaccine, but new series of shots can be started.

Immunization day at the local department is Friday. The clinic is open from 8 a. m. to 4 p. m.

In a memorandum to all health departments, William F. Lamb, director of the State Division of Local Health Services said:

The Federal Polio Program which has provided funds for the purchase of polio vaccine, medical supplies, and payment of part-time polio employees expires as of June 30, 1937.

For First Series Shots

(0-19 years of age and pregnant women) but limit the vaccine to the second and third injections.

A small quantity of vaccine may be purchased by health departments to complete the series in those individuals who have received the first dose of polio vaccine prior to June 30, 1937, so long as vaccine is available.

Available polio vaccine will be equally distributed among the counties according to the number of eligible children who have received polio vaccine from the health department may use up the vaccine which is on hand in their office for the eligible age group; however, additional vaccine must be purchased by the physician through normal drug channels for private use.

Although the polio program was not terminated as of June 30, 1937, first injections of polio vaccine are not to be started after June 30; however, continue to use the polio vaccine that is on hand in the local health department for the eligible age group has been in the past.

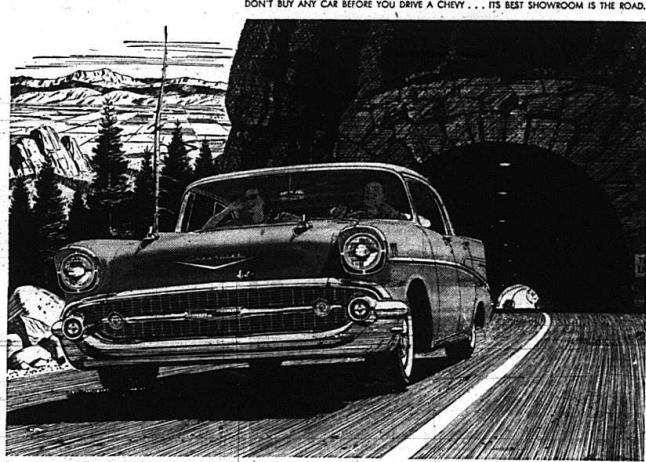

Weed Control Helps Pasture Efficiency

Mow pastures during July, says H. H. Pierce, Kentucky Agricultural Extension Service pasture specialist, to control weeds.

Weeds are robbers, taking plant food and water that grass and forage could use. They should not be allowed to go to seed as this helps spread the weeds and heavy infestations crowd out desirable plants.

Don't forget—some weeds are poisonous to livestock.

Another reason for mowing is that some grasses change in nutritive quality when they go to seed.

Farm Machines Cause Many Farm Deaths

A rundown of safety statistics for the period 1949-1953 on causes of accidental deaths on farms shows that machinery accounted for 31.1 percent.

This was the highest percentage of 10 accident categories, the Kentucky Agricultural Extension Service says.

Closest category to machinery as death causers was drowning, which accounted for 12.9 percent of the fatalities.

Such figures as these, says the Extension Service, accent the necessity for safety on the farm. The week of July 21, 1957 has been designated Farm Safety Week.

Here's the rundown on accidental deaths by category:
Drownings 12.9 percent; firearms, 12.7 percent; falls, 11 percent; animals, 6.3 percent; burns, 6.2 percent; blows (falling objects, etc.), 6 percent; electric current, 3.2 percent; lightning, 3.1 percent; and others, 7.5 percent. These totals are exclusive of airplane or highway accidents.
