

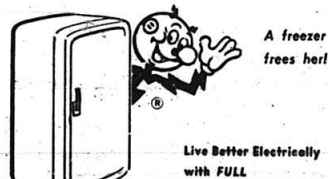

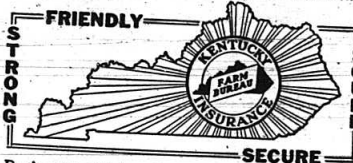

ORDINANCE NO. 248 AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF MT. VERNON KENTUCKY REPORTING THE BOUNDARY OF THE CITY OF MT. VERNON, KENTUCKY, IN COMPLIANCE WITH KENTUCKY REVISED STATUTE (1902). THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MT. VERNON, KENTUCKY, DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS: Section I. That in compliance with KRS 136.190(2) requiring the City Clerk of cities of the fifth class to notify the County Clerk and the Department of Revenue of the boundary of said city, the following boundary of the City of Mt. Vernon is herewith reported: Beginning at a point marked "A" on map, one half (1/2) mile west of USMB marker Number 147 located on the West corner Rockcastle County Courthouse, thence one half (1/2) miles North to a corner, thence West one (1) mile to a corner, thence South one (1) mile to a corner, thence East one (1) mile to a corner, thence North one (1) mile to beginning point "A". It is the intent of this traverse to include one (1) square mile area. Section II. All ordinances, or parts of ordinances, in conflict herewith are hereby repealed to the extent of the conflict. Section III. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its adoption, approval, attestation and publication as required by law. THE MOUNT VERNON CITY COUNCIL DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS: That there be and there is hereby a tax of 75 cent per hundred dollar valuation of all property situated in Mt. Vernon the proceeds from which shall be used for the payment of general expenses and purposes, and shall be deposited in the Bank of Mt. Vernon, in what is known as the General Fund. There is further levied a tax of 5 cents on each hundred dollar valuation situated in said city to be appropriated to the Bond Sinking Fund, and said funds shall be used for no other purpose. There is further levied against all male voters, between the ages of twenty-one and sixty-five years, living within said City limits, a poll tax of \$1.50. All levies herein mentioned are for the taxable year of 1957 and shall be subject to 2% discount if paid before November 1st, 1957. All unpaid tax on and after January 1st, 1958 shall be subject to a penalty of 6%. All taxes, real, personal and franchise, covered by this levy, become due September 1st, 1957. 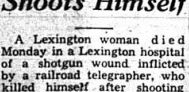

4 Injured When Trucks Crash



A truck crash at Proctor's Crossing last Thursday night, so loud it was heard in most parts of Mt. Vernon, resulted in four persons to Rockcastle County Baptist Hospital suffering from injuries.

Treated at the hospital and later released were: Will "Bud" Rowe, 72, of Mt. Vernon, who was standing on U. S. 150; Leo Hunt of Broaddus, driver of one truck; C. M. Harwell of Decatur, Ga., driver of another truck, and his passenger, W. E. Goldberry, of Atlanta, Ga.

The early evening accident sent hundreds of residents to the scene. The crash was so loud and prolonged that residents in the opposite end of town heard it.

According to State Police, Hunt, alone in his truck, was making a left turn over the railroad tracks. The Georgia truck apparently tried to pass and the vehicles collided.

Hunt's truck came to a stop about 25 feet from the point of impact and against a tree. The Georgia truck proceeded about 25 feet down the highway, jackknifed and overturned in Tuck Baker's yard, about two feet from Baker's front porch. No one on the porch was injured.

During the crash, Mr. Rowe, who was talking to his grand daughter from across the highway, was injured. How he received his injuries has not officially been determined. He suffered lacerations. Hunt received body contusions. Harwell, received a hand cut, and Goldberry's head cut.

The Georgia truck was loaded with dressed chickens. The crowd was told the truck contained lettuce.

Traffic on U. S. 150 was removed over the tracks into Mt. Vernon until the debris was removed.

No charges have been filed by police in the accident.

2 Barleys Rank High In Production Test

Dayton and Kenbar barley varieties were always in the highest-yielding groups of 25 barley-varieties tested this year at four Kentucky locations, says Verne Finkner, Kentucky Agricultural Experiment Station plant breeder.

Kenbar and Dayton are the recommended varieties for Kentucky, Finkner said, being the best adapted for state use. Producers should use Kentucky-certified seed of these varieties, he said; good seed stocks of both are being maintained.

In the four tests run at Lexington, Murray, Princeton and Hopkinsville, Kenbar was second highest, yielding an average of 46.9 bushels an acre for the four locations. An experimental variety, known as KY 55-83, was the top yielder, with 47.7 bushels an acre.

Persons interested in dairy-farm are urged to attend the meeting. Included in the program are a farm and feed program, inspection of milk house and two judging times. A dairy specialist from the University of Kentucky will be on hand to answer questions.

Traffic Timer Demonstration

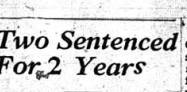
Livingston City Councilmen, always mindful of traffic problems, are going to have a "traffic timer" demonstration.

The "Traffic Timer," sometimes called a "Speedometer," registers the speed of an auto when the auto crosses a rubber hose stretched across the street. 33 feet from the first hose is a second hose which also registers the auto's speed.

The "Traffic Timer" is electrically operated and reads directly in miles per hour. If a car is exceeding the speed limit, the operator has sufficient time to flag down the offender.

So acutely timed is the machine, it can pick out a certain auto, and in a manner, "watch" the auto as it moves along.

Wilderness Road Seldom Rained Out



The rain in Spain falls mainly in the plains, so goes the song, and in Kentucky it must be the same way because in the foothills and mountains the outdoor play at Berea, "Wilderness Road," was rained out only three times in 116 performances during the first two seasons.

Actually there were 23 days of rain (days, not evenings) during July and August, the drama season, last year, but this did not stop the performance which does not begin until 8:15 p. m. (C.D.T.). The plastic and aluminum chairs are tucked dry in a second so if there are daytime showers no harm is done as far as the drama is concerned.

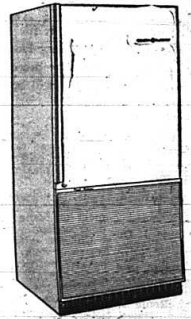

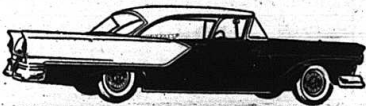

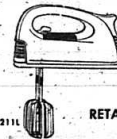

The Signal Says--

NEW STOP STREETS SHOULD HELP

Although in the experimental stage, we venture a guess the new stop street in Mt. Vernon will prove to the advantage of all.

As changed by the State Highway Department, the new stops are east and west on U. S. 150 at the intersection of U. S. 25, and on Main Street going west at the intersection of Richmond Street. There is no longer a stop for southbound U. S. 25 traffic at the U. S. 150 intersection or for U. S. 25 northbound traffic at the Main Street corner.

The object of the change is to give traffic on U. S. 25 free passage through the town and thereby prevent a bottleneck at the two corners. Working as it should work, it will also help prevent trucks from stalling at the U. S. 25-U. S. 150 intersection on the steep hill.

The new setup will undoubtedly help traffic going south and north if tourists use the same route. It will not however speed up northbound traffic which decides to use Main Street. Northbound traffic is routed north on Main Street at the "Y" south of town.

Regardless of the possible tieup of traffic late Sunday on Main Street, we believe the stops are not located where they should be located, and with a few more prominent markings, the traffic problem at the two corners will be decreased considerably.

HOME AGENTS NOTES

Take The Easy Way Out

Do beforehand cooking before it gets hot in the middle of the day.

That's the recommendation of Miss Elizabeth Helton, Extension food specialist at the University of Kentucky. She suggests that you plan the kind of cooking that can be done at night before, early in the morning or even two or three days in advance.

Any kind of salad or cold plate is ideal for preparing ahead of time. A good starter would be a mixed green salad of lettuce, celery, onions and green pepper. Then for a more hearty salad, protein foods such as sliced hard boiled eggs, slices of ham, cheese or chicken may be added.

A long time favorite is potato salad moistened with a

from fruit and mellow balls with mint garnish, peach halves filled with berries, or try cantaloupe halves filled with lime sherbet.

Sum foods add variety to summer meals whether the fish be shrimp, salmon or tuna. The perfect companions for serving are tomato, cucumber, a bit of onion and a wedge of lemon.

So beat the heat by trying some of these suggestions.

On God's Side

Merely being aware of God is not the whole of faith—not the whole of the rugged faith of Caleb. It is quite clear from what Caleb said that he wanted to die. He believed he was, on God's side, and carrying out God's purposes. He believed that he was on God's side in his situations, faith lines up with God, so far as God's will can be seen. There is a great deal of difference, for example between faith which we find in Luther and as we find it in Hitler. Both of them were men of strong faith. They believed themselves to be men of destiny. But then why were they so different? The difference was in this: Luther wished nothing higher than to follow the will of God wherever it might lead him; Hitler if he believed in God at all, expected God to support his own ambition. A Hitler cracks up at the last; but a Luther does not. So Caleb outlived his entire generation, for his hope and his faith were planted in God, not in himself.

Without Fear, Without Pride

Faith in God like all good things can be turned into a sort of mockery of itself, a cheap or grotesque imitation of reality. Faith can be a cover-up for fear. It can be used as a retreat to get out of attempting hard things. Once a young man was standing in one of the gatherings of Christian leaders, for a moment to go out as Christian missionaries, this in a day when missionaries were very few. An older minister rose and told the young man to sit down: "When God is ready to convert the heathen, he will do it without your help!" That minister was using his faith to conceal his own unwillingness to risk the dangers of a missionary. Some parents are so much afraid of vaccination that they refuse to let their children be vaccinated. True faith in God, they say, True faith is a rugged thing, as Caleb's was. It asks for the hardest tasks, it is not afraid of work or danger. Then faith can be twisted into pride; Hitler is an example of that, so was Napoleon. So was the Grand Inquisitor; so have been a number of tyrants in the church and out of it. True faith creates confidence, not conceit. When a man of faith begins to confuse himself with God, rugged faith has changed to brittle arrogance.
