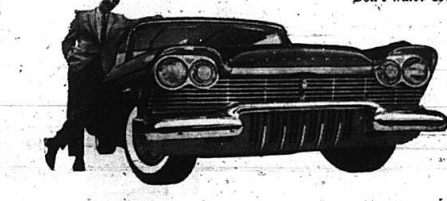

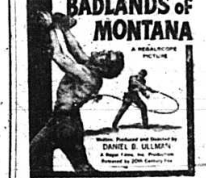

Dates For Deer Season Announced By State

An eight-day deer shooting season in Kentucky, beginning Nov. 23 and extending through Nov. 30, has been announced by the Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources.
 The 27 counties open for hunting last year will be open this year. They are:
 Christian, Caldwell, Livingston, Metcalfe, Breathitt, Perry, Knott, Carter, Fleming, Greenup, Lewis, McCreary, Pulaski, and part of Rowan, north of U. S. 60.
 The special deer hunting license fee has been increased from \$5 to \$10 to cover added cost to the department in extending the season. Description of antlers on legal buck deer now reads, "visible antlers," instead of "at least two points on one antler," as last year. Only European red and white-tail bucks are considered legal.
 Bow and arrow deer hunters will have a split season 15 days prior to Nov. 23 and 15 days after Nov. 20. Bow shooting will not be permitted during the gun season.
 Department officials will announce soon counties and areas for bow hunters. The Fish and Wildlife Resources Commission recently authorized a bow hunting area in the middle section of Kentucky. Last year areas were in eastern and west-central Kentucky.
 The State's deer hunting regulations allow deer to be taken only during the daylight hours and never while swimming or in water where the deer's body is submerged except for the neck and head.
 The annual limit for each hunter is one deer whether taken by gun or bow. Use of dogs is prohibited.

Kenbar, Dayton Varieties Tops In Burley Tests

Two recommended varieties of burley, Kenbar and Dayton, were in the highest yielding groups of 25 varieties tested this year at the Murray State College farm, Murray, says Verne Finkner, Kentucky Experiment Station plant breeder.
 Yields were lower than registered in three other out-of-state locations. Finkner said, due to the land on which the varieties were tested. The plot was a test at Lexington, due to the inadequate ground drainage.
 However, he said, the test showed that the recommended varieties could do under less-than-ideal conditions.
 Kenbar was the highest in the whole test, yielding 36.2 bushels an acre. Dayton yielded 29.8 bushels and Ky. 1, an old standard variety, 28 bushels. Some experiment varieties were in the highest yielding group, he noted, averaging about 30 bushels per acre.
 Yields of all varieties at Murray were about half the yield of the same varieties in a test at Lexington, due to the inadequate ground drainage.
 The varieties averaged about 25 bushels an acre for the total group, Finkner said, showing a gain that Kenbar and Dayton are better than any other burley varieties available. "Producers should capitalize on this," Finkner said, by using Kentucky certified seed of Kenbar and Dayton.

higher fuel, equipment and labor costs. He compared KU's earnings with those of 17 other comparable utilities throughout the country and said KU earnings were "considerably below the average of the group."
 William A. Duncan Jr., vice-president in charge of the company's system operations, said it expects to spend \$37,319,000 on new and expanded facilities to meet demands from customers. He said the major expenses for 1957-58 as including the E. W. Brown generating station at Dix Dam, the Green River pier, Hart Central City and large scale transmission and distribution lines.
 After the company had presented its evidence the commission set another hearing for Sept. 24 to give its staff and protesting consumers an opportunity to cross-examine KU witnesses.
 Petitions to intervene and oppose the proposed raise, all of which the PSC granted, came from Frankfort, Bardston, Madisonville and Corbin which operate municipal plants and have their own current rates wholesale from KU. The Green River Rural Electric Co-op of Barbourville which also buys from KU also intervened.
 The cities of Harlan, Glasgow, Falmouth and Cumberland which KU sells at retail intervened and protests also came from the Harlan County Coal Operators Association, Coleman Mill at Burgin, Climax Roller Mills at Shelbyville, D. B. Sutherland and Son, Bloomfield, Sandusky Milling Company, Harrodsburg; Smithfield Milling Company, Smithfield, Schenck Industries and its subsidiaries and affiliates, and the East Kentucky Rural Electric Co-op Corporation.
 Studies based on the present rates and the rates proposed by the company were presented by William H. Skinner, KU vice-president in charge of rates. They showed an increase of 62 percent in revenue to the company under the proposed rates for 1957-58. Skinner also explained the proposed fuel, labor and tax adjustment clauses applicable to the new schedule of rates.
 Other KU witnesses, A. C. Andersen, assistant auditor, and Jay Samuel Hart, president of Middle West Service Company, Chicago, presented material concerning the rate base which the PSC will use in determining whether the company's return is adequate and the rate proposals justified.

With the abundance of fresh peaches coming in from the south, why not capture some of that fresh flavor in your peach jam. Yes, peach jam with the flavor of fresh peaches, and made in comfort whatever the temperature, is a dream come true, because of the experiments made by home economists at the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

As the peaches are uncooked, the jam has the full rich flavor of the fresh fruit. Here's how to make it:

UNCOOKED PEACH JAM
Sort and wash about 2 1/2 pounds of fully ripe peaches. Remove pits and skins and crush the fruit.

Measure 3 cups of the crushed fruit into a large mixing bowl. Add 5 cups of granulated sugar, mix well and let stand about 20 minutes, stirring occasionally. Dissolve 1 package of powdered pectin solution in the fruit and sugar mixture, and stir for 2 minutes.

Ladle the jam into jelly glasses or into suitable freezer containers, leaving 1/2-inch head space. Cover the containers and let stand 24 to 48 hours, or until the jam has set. Then cover
