## To Survey Needs Of Post-Polio Patients

A countywide survey to discover the current rehabilitation needs of all post-polio patients will be conducted this month by the Rockcastle County Chapter of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis. Mrs. E. H. Hammons, chapter chairman, announced today.

The local survey is part of a nationwide project by the National Foundation to compile a roster of polio cases of all ages and degree of disability, regardless of date of onset. The canvass here is to be completed by Sept. 1.

The handling of surplus food commodities in Rockcastle County is being probed by the State Dept. A. Lewis, director of the Surplus Commodity Division of the State Department of Agriculture, confirmed Tuesday.

The probe is being made to learn whether there is an actual shortage of food commodities in Rockcastle, or just "loose handling of records," Lewis said.

Lewis reported that a field investigator for the division discovered the apparent error in the matter of handling foodstuffs that are made available to needy people in Rockcastle County.

Commodities are foodstuffs such as meal, flour, rice, beans and other food. This food is allocated to the State by the Federal Government. The State in turn allocates the food to the counties. Under the supervision of the county judge and the Fiscal Court, the food is then allocated to needy persons in the county to the state.

Although Lewis did not state the actual amount unaccounted for, sources who declined to be quoted, said some 30,000 pounds, valued at about \$2,700 cannot be accounted for on the record.

What happened to the foodstuff (about 75 percent meal) is yet to be determined. "It may develop that some foodstuffs have been lost, that food transfer papers are in the possession of the county which may clear up the entire matter," Lewis said. "We are hopeful that this will be so."

Commodities are sent by train and truck to the various counties accompanied by a transfer. The transfer is usually given to the county judge. "Sometimes a reasonable delay is made in the final accounting until all transfers have been received," Lewis said.

Lewis said that upon the "face of the record as it now exists, there is an apparent shortage of meal, flour and rice inventory showed more beans and cheese on hand than there should be, if transfer reports are to be believed."

"We expect our investigation to require a week or 10 days yet," Lewis said. "But we are having a time making the records of the local officials conform with inventories on hand."

He said the situation has been called to the attention of officials at Mt. Vernon "with the expectation the entire matter will be cleared soon."

The first inkling that something was apparently amiss in the commodity transfer in Rockcastle, came Aug. 6 in the regular Fiscal Court meeting, when a State official appeared and made a preliminary check. Figures and county commodity figures didn't match. The official left the court little doubt that the county should have to make up the difference in cash, or a clerical error would have to be found and remedied.

Higher county taxpayers would have to foot the bill from the county's general fund if a shortage exists is uncertain. Some officials believe the reason why the commodities are not accounted for would have to first be established. These officials (Continued on page 4)

### UNTIL RECENTLY

#### WE HAD ESCAPED THE JET AGE

How much Rockcastle County has been spared the many loud and strange sounds of the Atomic Age, was brought home to residents two weeks ago when a super-sonic jet bomber cracked the sound barrier over Central Kentucky.

Though we have our trucks and auto mufflers, rock quarry blasting and train whistles, we had been spared the many unpleasant sounds such as super-sonic booms, jet air armadas, coastal gun exercises, missile and atom bomb testing, and other earth-shaking sounds of this century.

For that matter, we have even been spared the hundreds of more familiar sounds that accompany everyday labors in heavy industry.

So severe and strange was the shock waves that accompanied the B58 "Hustler's" crash through the sound barrier, that literally thousands of persons streamed out of doors and expressed their concern. One Lexingtonian thought the Russians had come. Others thought of train and auto wrecks.

Though we heard the sound and felt the shake of the earth, there was something comforting about the boom when we discovered the source. We were comforted by the fact that we are progressing and moving ahead steadily in our national defense program. There was also the feeling that, though the sound was unpleasant, it was protection from the more violent evils of our day.

Perhaps that is why people in other sections of the nation learn to live in the jet age with a measure of contentment. They have learned to look on the jet age with the same feeling that Evelyn Adams felt when she wrote her poem "Jet Pilot."

Across the transitory face  
of cumulus cloud his engine roars  
into absolute space;  
strange that the air which he explores  
is still—that he can hear no sound  
except his speed-engendered wind,  
while miles behind him on the ground  
we slowly become disciplined  
in finding him with car and eye,  
to look ahead by half the sky!

Some county officials are inclined to believe the commodities are actually missing and were stolen; that is, carried away at night by truck or some other method. They believe this, due to the large amount unaccounted for. For this reason, state and federal law enforcement officers have been asked to investigate the case.

The Signal learned the investigation of the unaccounted-for commodities began by the State in October, 1956. In that month, it is reported, a whopping figure of 6,000 pounds were unaccounted for. It was also reported, since October 1956, every month has shown a shortage with the exception of June 1957. The State apparently did not inform the county of the shortage until the Fiscal Court met on August 6. Why they did not come forward with such information was not reported.

It was also learned that an investigation of the unaccounted-for commodities started at Mt. Vernon. Ten days later, Aug. 9, another inventory was taken. It was discovered on the Aug. 9 inventory that 80 bales (20 ten-pounds) were missing. These bales turned up when it was found a checker misunderstood the amount called verbally by a truck driver. An inventory Tuesday morning showed nothing missing. This is one example where an error was cleared up. More errors of this kind may be found as the investigation continues. Since the investigation has started, state and local officials have checked the storage ware-

doubt the county could legally pay the state \$2,700 if investigation proves the reason for the loss resulted from loose handling of records, or was the fault of one person or group of persons. Payments are usually made by the court only for official acts.

house, located directly behind the former Bus Station Building. It was found that it is possible to get into the warehouse by reaching between the door and a door facing door and knocking aside a bolt holding the door.

On the matter of direct theft by breaking and entering, Mt. Vernon city police have not reported unusual night activity around the warehouse.

Lewis reported last month (July) about 2,800 persons received commodities in Rockcastle (one-fourth of the county population). One county official said he believed the figure to be nearer 3,500. In dollars, this means Rockcastle County gets about \$10,000 worth of commodities a month, or \$120,000 a year. A person desiring commodities may receive them by being certified by the county judge or a member of the Fiscal Court.

County officials would not speculate on whether the Grand Jury would investigate the apparent shortages, or what steps would be taken to clear up the situation in the county.

### LETTER TO THE EDITOR

As a resident taxpayer of Mt. Vernon, I wish to make a few comments on the subject of traffic on Richmond Street.

For two years the residents of this street have endeavored to get the Mt. Vernon City Council and the Mayor to take necessary steps to eliminate the excessive noise caused by large trucks with straight exhausts or cut-outs. This excessive noise occurs principally between 6 p. m. and 8 a. m.

The night policeman cannot drive a car, and as a consequence, he patrols ONE BLOCK ON ONE STREET and that is Main Street. Strange to say, recent robberies occurred in this particular block. For his services, I am informed he draws a salary of \$150 per month, plus \$6 for each arrest and conviction.

Very seldom do I get a full night's rest as a consequence. I have appeared before the Council three times and asked that another man, one who could drive, be put on at night. On one occasion, when I was asked what my grievance was, and told them it was excessive exhausts or cut-outs on trucks and cars, the mayor replied, "You know what you can do," I replied, "I think I know what you mean, but do not intend to be run out of my house for lack of law enforcement. Then he said, "You could go to Ground Hog Sinks." The last meeting of the Council was Aug. 1, I again asked for another man to be put on at night. The mayor said the money was not available. He then pulled the four councilmen present. One said he would like to think

it over. Two said if the money is not available, they didn't see how they could pay another man. The fourth councilman remained silent.

I contend it is the duty of the council to give residents of the town protection at all times. I further contend, if the town is financially able to pay a man \$150 a month to patrol ONE BLOCK ON ONE STREET, the town is financially able to give protection to residents who are deprived of necessary sleep.

Now, if this was something the mayor was interested in I feel sure necessary funds could be found. I recall a few years past the Kentucky Stone Co. the mayor's employer, did not want to avail themselves of the flat crossing west of northwest of the Quarry, but wanted a crossing of the railroad just west of Williams Street Crossing. As a result an ordinance was passed authorizing this crossing be constructed at a cost of \$580 to the taxpayers of Mt. Vernon. Since the construction of this crossing, it has a gate across it which is kept locked, not accessible to anyone except the Quarry, but sometimes only two offenses you may be cited or arrested for and they are drunkenness or meter violations. Speed violations, improper mufflers, disturbing the peace, disorderly conduct, parking on yellow curbing, parking on sidewalks, one hour parking for trucks one ton and over on Richmond Street, all are completely ignored.

I extend a cordial invitation to all drag racers, hot rods, scratch starters, straight exhaust and cut-out enthusiasts to visit Richmond Street. I am sure you will have a hearty welcome and am sure the Police Department will be your most ardent fans.

Tom Nelson, assistant director of state parks, stated besides this attractive 62½ foot by 40-foot swimming pool, which has the AAU meet requirements, there will also be a filtration system, a bathhouse, a 40-foot by 20-foot wading pool for children, ample parking facilities and a picnic area nearby.

"The swimming pool will also have surface and underwater lighting for night-time use," Mrs. Kilgore added. Levi Jackson State Park is a beautiful 815-acre tract located on U. S. 25, two miles south of London and 11 miles north of Corbin in southeastern Kentucky.

### Legumes in Grass Sod Raise Herbage Quality

Legumes in a grass sod can increase the quantity and quality of pasture herbage, says the Kentucky Agricultural Experiment Service, but certain practices are necessary to maintain the legume in the sod.

They are: Plant a legume with grass on a prepared seed bed; establish legumes; be sure that legumes have adequate minerals; remember that nitrogen fertilizer will stimulate grass and may crowd out legumes; apply phosphorus as grasses use plenty of this element; tillage plus adequate plant food are the secret of re-establishing legumes in an old grass sod; and remember that grazing and clipping management depend on the plants in the mixture.

### 27% Rate Increase For State Farm Firm

A 27.9 percent rate increase has been approved by the Kentucky Department of Insurance for bodily injury and property damage liability policies written in Kentucky by the State Mutual Automobile Insurance Co.

C. P. Thurman, commissioner, said the rates, effective Aug. 7, were necessary because the Farm Mutual, Bloomington, Ill., company reported an overall loss in four of the last five years. It showed a loss of \$1,017,291 in 1956, he said.

State Farm initially requested a 42.4 increase, Thurman said. After discussions with the department here, the company agreed to reduce its request to the 27.9 percent figure, he said. The Commissioner explained it was the objective of the Insurance Department to see that rates are neither excessive, inadequate nor unfairly discriminatory.

Although State Farm's rates have been adjusted in previous years, the rate level continued to lag behind increasing claim cost and frequency. For instance, the company showed the average paid claim on automobile bodily injury insurance to be \$728 in 1956 compared to \$633 in 1955 and property damage insurance average paid claim to be \$11 in 1956 and \$99 in 1955.

Not only have the average claim costs been increasing but the frequency or number of losses has been increasing, too, Thurman said. When both claim cost figures rise, the company has only one course and that is to raise rates, he added.

The Commissioner emphasized that all requests for increase in rates are weighed carefully by him and his department. The public is entitled to adequate coverage at a rate which is not excessive, but com-

mensurate with the risk assumed by the company," he said.

### Bronco Winter Oats Top Yielder In Tests

Bronco, a new variety of winter oats developed by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station in 1956 and tried out this year in Kentucky, was the top yielder in tests run at four locations in the state.

Object was to test for vigor, winter hardiness, yield, etc., says Verne Finkner and S. H. Phillips, agronomists, of the Kentucky Agricultural Experiment Station.

Bronco's average yield for the all-state locations was 44.8 bushels per acre. Second place went to Atlantic, 42.8 bushels; third to LeConte, 40.2 bushels an acre; fourth to Forkedeer, 38 bushels; and fifth to DuBois, 38.7 bushels an acre.

Finkner and Phillips said Atlantic, Forkedeer and DuBois, the recommended variety for Kentucky, "performed well." DuBois was lower yielding "probably because of rust damage" they said.

LeConte performed well but was not superior to the recommended varieties; LeConte has been considered too winter-unhardy for general Kentucky use.

Varieties used in more southern states, such as Mustang, Arlington, Lee, Fulgram, Victor, Arkwin, and Fulwood, as they are not sufficiently winter-hardy to survive, the agronomists noted.

One experimental winter-oat variety was "outstanding" in the test and is being increased for more complete testing prior to releasing for farmer use.
