State Men Paint Gloomy Industrial Picture

County Needs Many Things

Natural Gas Sewage Disposal, More Water Recreation Housing Clean-Up

These six items are needed in Rockcastle County and its cities if the county expects to woo industry.

Such was the findings of two representatives of the Industrial Development Division of the State Department of Economic Development, Frankfort, after a survey of the county last week.

The two men were E. Thomas Wheat and William Wiesman. They were guests of the Rockcastle County Junior Chamber of Commerce, and the Jaycees accompanied them on their all-day tour.

Though the visitors held out little hope for heavy industry in Rockcastle, the visitors believe there is a possibility for some small industry, such as sewing or food processing. They advised local property owners to remodel likely buildings to show to prospective clients.

But generally, the visitors could find little that would indicate significant growth of the county in the near future.

Not all of Rockcastle was found lacking by the state men. The visitors were impressed by what they called the "excellent school system." They commented favorably on churches in the county, were impressed by the Rockcastle County Baptist Hospital, as well as the progress being made toward a new telephone system.

Broadhead was complimented for its attractive store fronts and the representatives suggested Mt. Vernon and Livingston follow suit with a general beautification program. They found Livingston showed possibilities for industrial development because of the railroad facilities and its location on the Rockcastle River.

The two state men suggested that several civic organizations in the county request and sponsor an industrial resources survey to be made by the Department of Economic Development. They want such information about Rockcastle to request should the prospective clients become available. The work of the survey would be made by the department. Printing costs would be left to the civic organizations requesting the project.

Since the visit of the two men, Dr. Rudolph Burdette and Wayne Stewart checked on the possibility of vegetable and food processing plant and have been corresponding with a prospective company interested in such a project. They have not yet received a report on their respondents.

How did the men get to Rockcastle? Sometimes, says George H. Hubley Jr., commissioner of the Department of Economic Development, became ill on an
