Schools Open Tuesday; BHS Hires New Coach

Readin', Ritin', and 'Rithmetic will be the order of the day Sept. 3 as both Mt. Vernon Middle and High Schools and county grade and high school students return to the classrooms.

Students will report at 8 a. m. (CST). School officials at Mt. Vernon expect about 750 to enroll, about the same as last year.

There'll be few changes in curriculum and personnel. As reported, Mrs. Mary Menting will be librarian. Mrs. Mollie Bryant is scheduled to replace Mrs. Betsy Page Allen in the combination fourth and fifth grades.

Bill Norton will continue as agriculture teacher. He replaced Wayne Stewart during the last school term.

Larry Travis will continue to teach industrial arts, but will have an additional job—six-man football coach.

Teachers at Mt. Vernon will meet to discuss the school opening on Sept. 2.

County

County schools are expected to enroll about 2,800 students. Teachers work-up is scheduled for Sept. 2.

Biggest change in personnel will be at Brodhead where Vespey Singleton, of Hindman, and a recent graduate of Eastern State College, will take over as basketball coach.

Singleton replaces Joe Harper, who will coach at Monticello. Singleton played basketball with a Carr Creek State Tournament team during high school.

Mrs. Singleton, has also been hired. She will teach commercial at Brodhead. She replaces Charles E. Hurt, who has taken over as finance officer for the Rockcastle County School system.

At Livingston, Barbara Faulkner will be the home economics teacher. Miss Faulkner was a student teacher at Brodhead last year.

Canfield Stays Zion Minister; Council Meets

The Rev. Roy E. Canfield, a second-year student at the Clear Creek Baptist School, was ordained on Sunday to the full work of the gospel ministry by the Mt. Zion Baptist Church, Brodhead.

The ordaining council was composed of messengers from nine churches of the Rockcastle Baptist Association and neighboring associations.

The Rev. W. A. Stokes served as moderator of the council. Interrogation of the candidate was conducted by the Rev. Eugene Bradley, pastor of the Pine Hill Baptist Church, Mt. Vernon.

The ordination sermon was delivered by the Rev. William L. Reynolds, associational missionary for Rockcastle Association. A Bible was presented by Mr. G. H. Berry, a deacon of the Mt. Zion Church.

The new-ordained minister has served as pastor of the Mt. Zion Baptist Church since the first day of May. He will continue his ministerial studies at the Clear Creek School this year while serving the church for the regular services before coming to Clear Creek last year, the Rev. Canfield and his family made their home in Evansville, Indiana.

Youth Held In Shooting

According to county officials, police were called to Thomason's parent's home about 1:30 a. m., Tuesday. The youth had reportedly shot the headlights out of his father's truck and a bullet had struck his mother in the leg.

Bond was set at \$1,000 on the shooting charge and \$500 on the private property charge.

NO FLU VACCINE AVAILABLE YET

No definite notice has been received which indicates when the vaccine for Asian Flu will be available to Rockcastle residents.

Dr. Walker Owens, county Health Department director, believes there will be vaccine available here, but just when, is uncertain.

National health officials are hoping that at least 25 million shots can be made available in the United States, to at least cut down the number expected to be stricken by the disease in either mild or severe form.

As yet no epidemic has developed in this country, and those cases so far reported have been relatively mild. However, the health officials believe the disease will become more severe as winter develops.

Last year, Asian Flu raged over Asia and Europe, claiming thousands of lives and striking hundreds of thousands of others. It is hoped with the new vaccine, Asian Flu will not be as severe or take as many lives as the flu epidemic that followed World War I.

He also reported the local department will resume its Friday clinic, Sept. 6.

He will teach in the Department of Economics and Business. Mr. Crawford holds a Bachelor of Science degree in business education from Berea, and a Master of Business Administration degree from Indiana University.

He has been an associate teacher in the Department of Business Education at Indiana University during the past two years while working toward an Ed. D. degree. He plans to return to Indiana University next summer to complete course work toward a doctorate.

Time Changes

Most residents of Mt. Vernon and Livingston will set their clocks and watches back an hour at midnight Saturday as Daylight Saving Time comes to an end.

Although the city council has not set a date for the end of Daylight Time at Mt. Vernon, most residents will want to be on Central Standard Time when schools open, Tuesday.

Some areas of the state, including Louisville, Lexington, Newport and Covington, will continue on Daylight Time until Sept. 30.

This is the first year Mt. Vernon and Livingston have been on Daylight Saving Time. Daylight Time is unofficial. A City council merely suggests the area go on fast time.

The Northeastern Telephone Corp., agents for the Mt. Vernon Telephone Co., made plans today to install a common battery telephone system in Rockcastle instead of keeping the present magneto system.

The company had planned to repair the present system to use until a dial system is installed in about 18 months, but apparently the improvements were not so difficult.

A common battery switchboard was brought to Mt. Vernon Wednesday and will be installed as soon as other necessary equipment arrives, company officials reported.

The telephone instrument system does away with the crank. When the receiver is lifted, the telephone automatically rings the operator. Berea has such a system at this time.

According to Alvin Adams, manager at Mt. Vernon, the telephone instrument will have to have some changes made. It is not reported when the change-over will be completed.

It was first announced by the company that few changes would be made in the present system until the Public Service Commission approved a change of ownership from J. E. Dees to Northeastern. The company did not think it would be financially practical to install a large amount of equipment and then have to abandon it within 18 months in favor of dial equipment.

In announcing the change to common battery, it was also announced that a commercial survey of the county has been completed by the company. A commercial survey notes the number of possible telephone customers in the county. Rural Electrification Association officials were also at Mt. Vernon, Tuesday, to look over the physical plant and make recommendations leading toward a loan from the REA.

After a loan is made and approved by the REA, engineering plans will be drawn up and presented to the Public Service Commission. Following their approval, a switchboard will be ordered for Rockcastle.

Mr. Adams also said that collect calls will be accepted by the company, and credit cards will be honored.

In Jail At Last--

Father Surrenders Al Wren To Local Police

If it were a movie, you could call it "The Big Chase" starring Alfred Wren.

And if you'd saw the entire picture you'd know that the "Big Chase" came to a close Monday, when Wren, who lives at Boone, surrendered to county and State Police at Mt. Vernon, where he was charged with "escaping custody of arresting officers, reckless driving, no operator's license and failure to yield right of way." He also was charged with "driving and no operator's license charge to be a habitual offender."

County and State Police officials report the case of Alfred Wren, 20, began in April or May, 1957. Wren wrecked his auto on Sigmon Hill and was arrested for "drunk driving" and "no operator's license."

At the County Jail, Wren pleaded guilty to the two charges, it is reported, and when officers were not looking, he slipped out a rear door and escaped.

About three weeks later, officers reported, Wren was chased by police on Fairview Road. He finally jumped from

his auto and let it go driverless down the road. He escaped. About a month later, officers closed in on the slippery young man at the home of Mrs. Georgia Clark, at Boone. While officers were breaking down the door, Wren broke a window and escaped, police said.

Wren was reported then went to Ohio, where he was employed. Saturday, Wren returned to Boone with a co-worker, Robert Edwards, in Edward's auto. Sunday, it was reported he was with a group of men and youths near the Boone Post Office, including Edwards and Billy Wren. Several police cars descended on the group which scattered.

Some of the group headed for the woods beyond the railroad at Boone. During the chase, officers said, gunshots were exchanged. It was not reported who fired the shots.

On the highway, a State Trooper spotted Alfred Wren going by in Edwards' auto and gave chase along B-Branch Road. Wren wrecked the auto and fled on foot, leaving his passengers, Mrs. Ann Hollingsworth, Mrs. Ann Hollingsworth, and her young child.

Wren's father, declared he brought his son to jail because "that's where he ought to be," and also because he believed people around Boone were planning to kill his son. Some people had rifles, Mr. Wren said, and he wanted his son safe in jail.

Mrs. Hollingsworth was not injured, nor was she held by police. Wren escaped to the woods.

A road block was set up. It was reported Wren was picked up by Mrs. Ada Snowden of Boone in her auto. Mrs. Snowden tried to run a road block and hit a state police car. She was held to the Grand Jury later on a charge of "helping a fugitive to escape." Wren escaped on foot.

When he surrendered the next day at Mt. Vernon, he was accompanied by his father, George Wren.

The young man was placed under \$700 bond, reduced from \$5,000. He was returned to jail. His case will be heard at 9 a. m. Wednesday.

Billy Wren is wanted by police for questioning. Edwards was fined \$10 in county court Wednesday, on a drunk charge.
