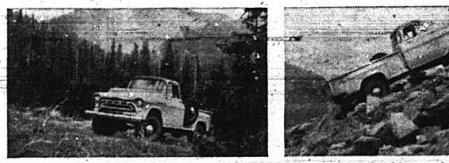

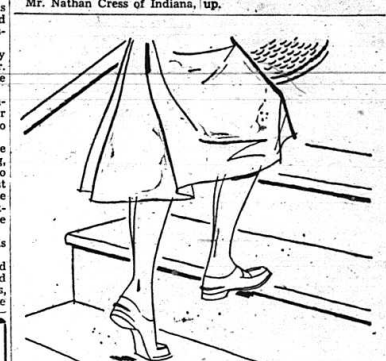

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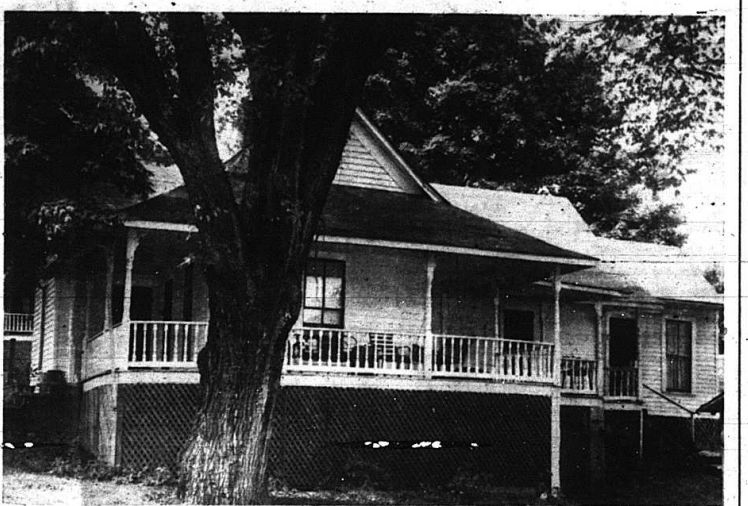

Annexation Is Heading Our Way

The Mt. Vernon City Council Thursday night voted unanimously to hire a surveyor to define the boundaries of areas immediately adjoining the city for purposes of bringing the areas within the city limits. This is called, annexation.

The Council acted after it was presented with resolutions from the Lion's Club and the Junior Chamber of Commerce, which stated, that if Mt. Vernon hoped to attract industry, it would have to have a larger population.

Between now and the time when annexation is finally decided one way or the other, many words will be spoken "pro" and "con" on the subject. Though the Council defined no exact area to be annexed, it is generally believed to be property in Jones Addition, Fairground Hill and areas between. It would more than likely extend the city limits north to Hill View Tourist Court, or even beyond. One suggestion was to annex land as far West, and to include, the city's water, works lake. Some areas on Town Hill also are being studied.

In an editorial about two months ago, the Signal went on record as believing annexation of some territory was necessary if the city wanted industry to locate here. State men visiting Mt. Vernon on a later date emphasized that the lack of population discourages industry from the city.

Though no one has come forth as yet to protest annexation, no doubt as soon as the city passes its annexation ordinance there will be protests. If the protests come, and if the Council rejects them, the courts are still available to settle the issue. The resident, or residents, may file suit against the city.

It was fairly obvious at the Council meeting Thursday night that the Council expects a suit, and from their conversation it also was apparent the city is ready for a court fight. Such a court battle could turn into a long and very expensive adventure since it would probably go through Circuit Court and the Court of Appeals. There is also reason to believe that after it's all over the Court of Appeals would allow annexation since the high court has been inclined recently to look upon annexation with some favor.

It is a little early yet to determine whether annexation would be profitable or unprofitable for the city, since we do not know where the new boundaries are to be drawn. One thing is certain, annexation could prove so costly to the city in the services it must render to areas annexed that it would not be to its advantage to annex very much territory.

We will look forward with much interest to some kind of report from the city which will answer a few questions. Where are the new boundaries? What services can the city offer to new residents, and when will these services be available? Will the insurance rate on newly annexed property be lower? How much lower? What about the tax rate? What does annexation mean to the city's future? Why is there a need for annexation other than to attract industry?

All of us should listen and become informed on the points of annexation, be they good points or bad points. We should ignore the gossip. It may be that annexation is the answer to many of the city's present problems and future problems. If this turns out to be the case, then annexation should take place with great haste.

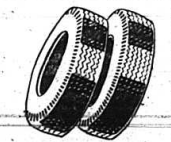

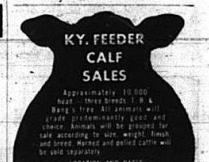
