From Renfro Valley Bugle

Next season when quail hunters around the Valley get their bag limit in unusually short time and start praising their dog, their gun, or the marksmanship they should probably include a kind word for Bob Reedy and Roy Davidson.

On a recent secret visit to different farms in the vicinity they released a number of Bob White quail furnished them by Kentucky Fish and Game Division and in addition to that the boys have been conducting a restocking project of their own.

Open the door—if you can get it open—to almost any outdoor sport and you'll find incubators and feeding pens for the hatching out and raising of Japanese quail, a new import to this country said to multiply at several times the rate of our native Bob White.

You're going to have to hunt for these birds, though. You'll get exactly nowhere asking either Bob or Roy where they were released. They have no intention of letting the information out in the first place, besides which they have by now forgotten half of the many points of release themselves.

One condition imposed upon owners of the farms on which these young birds are released is that they will not allow any hunting whatsoever for a period of two years, which should provide sufficient time for good coveys to become established. A possible war between fox hunters and bird hunters looms in the offing as it has been found almost impossible to cater to both sports in the same area.

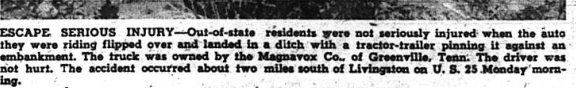

The supervisors of the Rockcastle County Soil Conservation District attended a district meeting of supervisors in the Seventh Congressional District at Burnside, Wednesday, Sept.

Mr. W. O. Gilreath, Pine Knot, was elected chairman of the Soil Conservation District Supervisors, for the Seventh Congressional District for one year. Mr. Gilreath is a McCreary County farmer and a member of the state A. S. C. Committee.

Fred Pace, Columbia, and C. V. Weddle, Somerset, were nominated as state conservation committee members. The governor will choose and appoint one of these men to serve a year. The state conservation committee directs and determines policy for the division of Soil and Water Resources.

The men attending this meeting were: W. E. Proctor, Chairman; Bradley Saylor, Secy.; W. S. Stevart, John Houston, W. L. Coffey, supervisors and Clay Colson, Soil Conservationist.

Before the luncheon meeting, all supervisors were conducted through the Cumberland Corporation Charcoal Plant by Ben Hornbeck, timber buyer of the plant.

The theme for the meeting was "Timber Utilization for Kentucky." C. L. Collins, U. S. Forest Service and Harry Weddle, Kentucky Division of Forestry, discussed these topics at the luncheon meeting.

Veteran's Benefits Increased 10 Percent

A new federal law authorizes increase to all veterans drawing compensation for service-connected disabilities, Director R. R. Thomas of the Kentucky Disabled Ex-Service Men's Board has reported.

He added: Increased will be the special allowances for dependents paid to veterans whose surviving dependents' disabilities are rated at 50 per cent or more.

The increase will be approximately 10 per cent, except to those totally disabled veterans rated at 100 per cent, whose increase will be from \$181.00 to \$225.00 per month.

There will be no effect on the amounts received by veterans drawing non-service-connected pensions or survivors of veterans drawing death compensation or pension.

Veterans who are receiving compensation need take no action to receive the raise; it will be paid automatically.

Rockcastle Assistance \$31,385 In August

Residents of Rockcastle County received \$31,385 in August under Kentucky's four public assistance programs—old age assistance, aid to dependent children, aid to needy blind, and aid to permanently and totally disabled. Commissioner of Economic Security V. E. Barnes reported today.

These payments were listed for the county: Old age assistance, \$18,785; aid to dependent children, \$12,483; aid to needy blind, \$649; and aid to needy disabled, \$1,488.

Total outlay in the state for August was \$3,087,969 with old age payments totaling \$2,268,393; dependent children's allowances, \$1,402,455; needy blind grants aggregating \$129,152; and payments to disabled needy people, \$187,969.

Bronco Winter Oats Tested At Lexington

Bronco variety of winter oats, released last year from Texas sources, was the top yielder in a winter-out variety trial this year at the Kentucky Agricultural Experiment Station in Lexington.

Bronco yielded 43.9 bushels per acre at Lexington, 40 other varieties grown in the Lexington test, says Verne Finkner, UK Experiment Station agronomist.

Other varieties and their yields were: LeConte, 38.7 bushels; DuBois, 36.5; Forkeeder, 34.5; and Atlantic, 34.2.

Bronco, DuBois, Forkeeder and Atlantic all are recommended for Kentucky use. Kentucky certified seed should be used in planting.

Seedstocks of Bronco variety will be limited this year.

Winter Oat Information Collected Over 7 Years

Seven years of testing winter oats for winter-hardness, yield and vigor by the Kentucky Agricultural Experiment Station have resulted in considerable data of interest to state farmers, says Verne Finkner and S. H. Phillips, agronomists and small-grain specialists.

Recommended varieties for Kentucky use are all in the top yield groups, the data shows. One of them, Bronco, has the highest yield of all.

The varieties and their bushels-per-acre average on the seven years of testing:

Bronco, 63; DuBois, 61; Atlantic, 56.2; Forkeeder, 55.9; LeConte, 55.4 (not considered winter-hardy under Kentucky conditions); Cox, 54.4; Winkler, 54.5; Lee, 52.2; and Cimmaron, 50.9.

Biologist Assigned To Rockcastle County

A former Federal biologist with the soil conservation service, has been appointed Sixth District Wildlife Biologist by the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources. Rockcastle is in the Sixth District.

Robert Eversole, a Columbus, Ohio native, and graduate of Ohio State University, will assume district biological duties immediately. Eversole has a degree in game management and four years field experience in wildlife biology.

He replaces Jim Durrell, Frankfort, who has been appointed assistant director of the Kentucky Division of Game.

Eversole's territory embraces 17 counties, mostly in central Kentucky. They are: Anderson, Bourbon, Boyle, Casey, Clark, Estill, Fayette, Franklin, Garrard, Lee, Lincoln, Jessamine, Madison; Mercer, Rockcastle, Scott, and Woodford.

Paid State Income Tax? They're Going To Check

A project to strengthen enforcement against delinquent income taxpayers has been launched by the Kentucky Revenue Department. It was announced by Commissioner J. E. Luckett.

The project began in border areas of the state where Kentucky residents work for out-of-state employers, who, in many cases, do not withhold Kentucky income tax from wages.

Also included in the program are individuals who are self-employed or have other sources of income. The department has a special field staff operating from the Covington office, since that area is adjacent to the largest out-of-state metropolitan district.

This special field staff will use all available sources of information to discover delinquent taxpayers, Luckett said.

He emphasized that the program is aimed at delinquents only. Taxpayers who have filed returns properly and paid their tax have no need for concern. IT IS RUMORED THAT A PERSON CANNOT SERVE IF ELECTED ON A WRITE-IN BALLOT. ACCORDING TO THE KY. STATUTE, HE CAN.

The following is a portion of Chapter 118-280 of Ky. Statute concerning Voting of a ballot..

If a cross mark is made in the circle under the device of the party, and a cross mark is made in the square after the name of one or more candidates of different party, the vote shall be counted for the candidates so marked, and not for the candidates for the same office of the party so marked, but the vote shall be counted for the other candidates under the party device. If the voter marks more names than there are persons to be elected to an office, or if for any reason it is impossible to determine the voters choice for an office to be filled, his ballot shall not be counted for that office.

No ballot shall be rejected for any technical error that does not make it impossible to determine the voters choice. Any voter may, in a general election or special election, vote for any qualified person other than those whose names are printed on the ballots, for any office to be filled, by writing the name of that person under the designation of the office and placing a cross (x) mark to the right of the name. All marking upon the ballots shall be done with black ink stencil, except the writing in of names as provided in the preceding sentence, which shall be done with black lead pencil. There shall be kept in each booth the necessary stencils and pencils, securely fastened by a cord of sufficient length to enable voters to use them.
