We have had normal rain in September but there is still time to get into trouble unless we get an occasional rain. People start most forest fires by carelessness. More than 250,000 acres of woods and fields are burned by wildfire in Kentucky each year. In the dry fall of 1952 one and a half million acres were burned in just two weeks.

If the forests of Kentucky are to maintain their economic importance every acre of forest land must be protected from wildfire.

Do Window Repair Now

If painted window sills and crossbars between window panes are in need of refinishing due to "sweating" or rain, a repair job should be done before cold weather sets in, suggests Miss Marion Bartlett, UK Extension home furnishings specialist.

A first step is the removal of the old paint with fine sandpaper or steel wool, special attention being given the corners and removing all dust. A slightly roughened surface, rather than glossy smoothness, will give a better paint foundation. If the wood pores appear to be open, a base coat is advisable, followed by the finishing coat of paint or enamel.

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

The Signal Says--

"WE HAVE FIDDLER WHILE ROME BURNS"

In this world of ours we have become accustomed to the unpredictable and fantastic. We have safely weathered two world wars, the atom bomb, the flapper, the buck-'n'-wing, and the craze for swallowing goldfish. Of late, we have withstood Elvis Presley, rock-'n'-roll, pink jeans, and have even seen TV, CinemaScope, and the word "supper" become commonplace.

Now, to add to our nervous we have developed, we must become accustomed to a second "moon", more technically, an earth satellite, created by man and sent aloft to rotate in an orbit 560 miles above the earth at a speed of 18,000 miles an hour.

As in the past, we will eventually not give a second thought to the eerie little monster with its TV eyes watching our every move. We will in all probability let it join the other adventures in science in the realm of commonplace. Eventually, we will have our own satellite, or at least we hope we will have a "moon" of our own.

But the sad truth of the matter is that today we have literally been swept off our feet and left sitting by Soviet advances in science. The Communists have virtually conquered space while we have argued which branch of the armed forces will get the funds to experiment with earth satellites, intercontinental missiles and rockets.

Propaganda-wise, we are now on the defensive, and the Russian press has lost no time in capitalizing on Russian scientific accomplishments to convince the world that the leading nation militarily and scientifically is not the U. S. A., but the U. S. S. R. In itself, the earth satellite is not a threat to America's safety. It means very little as it rotates merrily along in its orbit, emitting its "beep, beep." Should it lose its momentum, it would explode into a cinder the second it reaches the earth's atmosphere.

The important thing is that it is the first step in the conquest of space. The "moon" was placed there by rockets from Soviet bases. It affirms Russian claims to a missile capable of hurling an atomic warhead to our continent. Even today, a Navy spokesman declared, we can be reasonably sure Russia also has a "controlled" missile capable of pin-pointing any base in Western Europe.

What do we have? That is a good question. As the Navy spokesman says, we are indeed in a "climate of urgency." This means, its time someone awakened to face the fact that we are not dealing with illiterate Russian peasants; that our man-flown bombers are obsolete; that a program of experimentation in space ships and weapons is necessary under central control; that a long and detailed examination should be made of our defense program; and that by necessity, our leadership must be strong and dedicated to increasing our strength militarily at home and diplomatically abroad.

We have indeed been "fiddling while Rome burns."

New Industry Directory Shows Business Increase

Kentucky has 3,069 individual manufacturing plants, nearly 400 more than in 1955. This is indicated in the 1957-58 Kentucky Industrial Directory recently published by the State Department of Industrial Development and the Kentucky Chamber of Commerce. The last directory was published in 1955. The new directory says manufacturing in Kentucky has reached its "highest level of development" and now provides

jobs for one of every six persons in the State's labor force and contributes nearly 20 per cent of all personal income.

Average monthly manufacturing employment in the State last year reached a high of 170,630, a gain of 29.7 per cent since 1947. The directory says this compares with employment of 12.3 per cent for the nation and 22 per cent for the southeast.

Economic Development Commissioner George Hubley said Kentucky had a 2.8 per cent increase in manufacturing employment between 1955 and 1956, the fourth largest gain in the 11-state southeastern region.

Corn Under Loans Earns By Cleanliness

Corn placed under loan in this State will earn a one-cent per bushel premium for cleanliness of low moisture content under the 1957 price support program, according to Roy C. Gray, chairman of the Agricultural Stabilization State Committee.

In order to qualify for the one-cent per bushel premium, corn must have a moisture content of the 1957 price support program, and foreign material of 2 per cent or less.

These premiums which are included in the corn support program for the first time this year were designed to encourage delivery of dryer and cleaner corn under the price support program.

In the case of farm-stored corn, the premiums will be paid

to producers when corn of this quality is delivered under the loan program. In the case of warehouse-stored corn, the premium will be added to the basic county support rate at the time the loan is made. Under previous programs no premiums were paid for cleaner or dryer corn. However, discounts ranging from one to five cents per bushel were made for corn with high moisture content. These discounts will continue in effect in 1957.

School Building Plans Increase In Kentucky
School building plans approved by the State Education Department's building and grounds division during August indicate real effort by school districts to meet the classroom shortage. Dr. Robert Martin, superintendent of public instruction, said:

Bids on a new elementary school at Roundstone, have been advertised for.

During the month, the division reported a new plan in Marshall County was approved and 13 additions in Breathitt, Ballard, Clark, Cumberland, Knox, Knott, Harlan, Mason and McCracken counties and in Ragland and Glasgow. Plans for maintenance and existing plants were approved for two projects in Lexington and one in Stanford.

The division estimated the cost of these new school facilities and improvements at \$957,278. The projects will provide 37 classrooms, six multipurpose rooms, 150 lockers, two band kitchens, five heating systems, one library, two lunchrooms and a number of other auxiliary facilities, such as toilets, a sewage disposal system and grading and paving, the agency said.

Superintendents, boards of education and communities are trying to provide the classrooms that Kentucky's children need," Dr. Martin said.

Berea Poultryman Tops In Egg Testing

A pen of 13 White Rock hens bred and owned by William Botkin, Berea, topped all other White Plymouth Rock hens in a 50-week laying test conducted at the New York State Egg Raising Test Farm, Long Island, the Kentucky Agricultural Experiment Station announced this week.

Botkin's hens averaged 248.5 eggs apiece in the 50-week test; the eggs averaged 25.37 ounces per dozen in the period.

Botkin is in the National Poultry Improvement Plan, a member of Kentucky Poultry Improvement Association, and is a Record of Performance breeder, says John Tuttle, KPJA manager.

The test started October 1, 1956 and concluded Sept. 15, 1957, Tuttle said. Botkin's hens were the highest producers of the breed in all tests conducted over the nation in similar fashion in the New York project.

Botkin is assisted in his operation by Kentucky Agricultural Extension Service and Experiment Station poultrymen. He will use the champion hens for breeding this year, Tuttle said.

Leafy Vegetable Insects Need Controlled Now

Aphids and cabbage worms are attacking certain leafy vegetables this time of year. Control measures should be taken now, says J. G. Rodriguez, Experiment Station entomologist.

Against aphids on kale, mustard, turnips and broccoli, home gardeners should use malathion insecticide. Dosage recommendation is one tablespoonful of the emulsion concentrate per gallon of water. Allow three days waiting period between application and harvesting. Rodriguez says, for broccoli, and seven days for the leafy vegetables. Repeat the application and waiting periods if re-infestation occurs.

To control aphids and cabbage worms on kale and broccoli, commercial truck gardeners should use 2 to 3 pints per acre of malathion emulsion concentrate in at least 75 gallons of water. Nozzles should be adjusted to spray upward from each side of the row as well as from above.
