**Feed Out Or Dry  
"Soft" Corn Crop**

Feed out or artificially dry the soft corn crop marking corn production this season in the Western Kentucky areas, says S. H. Phillips, Kentucky Agricultural Extension Service agronomist.

Most corn was seeded late in Western Kentucky due to rainy weather, he noted. Much western Kentucky corn right now is in the dent stage, he said.

This and other factors caused soft-corn production in the western area. Unless this corn unexpectedly matures, much of the 1957 crop will be soft, i. e., of high moisture content. This corn probably will run about 30 percent moisture, considerably above the 16-18 percent moisture content recommended for proper storage.

Feed it out or dry it artificially, he advises. The grain might keep satisfactorily until next spring, but warm weather then would cause it to deteriorate rapidly.

Generally, eastern and southern Kentucky corn crops were not affected this year.

### Commerce Secretary Weeks Discusses Road Program

A closer look at the proposed interstate highway network planned for Kentucky in the near future was taken this week by Secretary of Commerce Sinclair Weeks.

The department listed nearly all of the proposed highways in the nation. The highway of interest to Rockcastle will be Interstate 75, or the new U. S. 25. Actually, Interstate 75 will not be U. S. 25 but it is nearly parallel with the older route, and is generally identified with 25.

Interstate will run from Covington to the Tennessee line and will be limited access as reported previously. That is, motorists can get on the highway at only a few points. The highway will be fenced. Access so far on the route are at Lexington, at Blue Grass Ordnance Depot at Richmond and at the section between Lexington and Richmond. No report has yet been made on whether there will be an access to the highway at Route 80 at London.

Mr. Weeks apparently fares better than most of the communities since the proposed interstate will come closest to the town. It is estimated that it will cross U. S. 150 between 2 and 3 miles west of the town.

Contracts are being let on the first section near Covington, and the section between Richmond and Lexington. Rumor has it this will be the last to be constructed because of the great number of bridges (Continued on page 5)

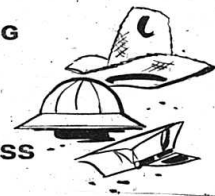

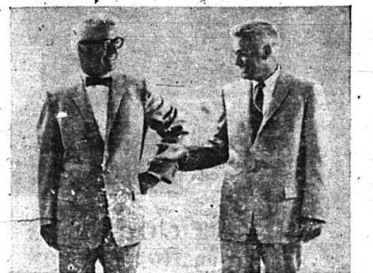

Below is the report from Secretary Weeks on Interstate 75:

One of Kentucky's two north-south superhighways, Interstate 75, will generally parallel U. S. 25, from Cincinnati to Jellico, Tenn.
