

#### Feed Out Or Dry 'Soft" Corn Crop

Feed out or artifically dry the best efforts to improve sales soft corn crop marking corn materially between now and the end of the year, thus helping Kentucky over the top.

Soft corn crop marking corn production this season in the Western Kentucky areas, says S. H. Phillips, Kentucky Agricultural Extenson Servce agronomist.

Most corn was seeded late in Western Kentucky due to rainy weather, he noted. Much western Kentucky corn right now is in the dent stage, he said.

This and other factors caused soft-corn production in the western area. Unless this corn unexpectedly matures, much of the 1957 crop will be soft, i. e., of high moisture content. This corn probably will run about 30 percent moisture, consider-ably above the 16-18 percent moisture content recommended for proper storage.

Feed it out or dry it artifically, he advises. The grain might keep satisfactorily until next spring, but warm weather then would cause it to deteriorate rapidly.

Generally, eastern and south-ern Kentucky corn crops were not affected this year.




