## Cummins Takes Early Lead; Carl Brown Elected Mayor

### New faces.

That sums up the 1957 election at Mt. Vernon as voters chose a mayor, six city councilmen and a police judge.

The election saw the election of Carl Brown as mayor and Larney Durham, police judge. Councilmen—all of them new—are: Floyd Owens, Charles Shivel, Warren Ferguson, Dr. Rudolph Burdette, Cledis Baker and Clyde Payne.

Going down in defeat were the following candidates: Jesse Cummins, Roy Winstead, Jack St. Clair, Everett Cheney and Bob Jasper. Bill Bailey was also defeated.

In the police judge race Larney Durham defeated his nearest rival, Millie Swinney by 124 votes. The police judge race is as follows: Durham, 237; Swinney, 113; W. W. Anglin, 77; William Southard, 8, and W. R. Gott.

In the mayor race, Brown defeated Conrad Parrett, 233 to 177.

It was an apparent "no confidence" vote for the incumbent council, who for the past year had been plagued with such issues as "fast time," a curfew, and tourist arrest problems.

The election brought into the limelight six councilmen and a mayor dedicated to "city progress."

There seemed to be little question that the new council would hasten the city's annexation of territory immediately adjoining the city limits. Most of them are Jaycees and the Jaycees have endorsed annexation.

In the city election at Brodhead, five councilmen were chosen. They are, and the vote they received: Preston Parrett, 6; John Sowder, 8; W. E. Dillingham, 6; W. S. Cass, 6, and Millard Robbins, 6. Losing was C. B. Russell with 4 votes, and Willie Wallin with 5 votes.

At Livingston, all candidates were unopposed. They are: Courteney, Dr. R. G. Webb, Sam Halcomb, Gilbert Bates, Harry Lee Holland and Henry Mason. Dewey Bingham was unopposed as police judge.

The 1957 election in Rockcastle County started out as a "same as usual" election, with Republicans taking an early lead.

In the more-exciting-than-usual county judge race, Republican money Ed Cummins went out in front of his opponent, Democrat Amos Owens. With five precincts reporting, Cummins had 908 votes, and Owens 613 votes.

In another race that got exciting as, election day drew closer—the sheriff—Walter Sowder piled up a heavy lead over his write-in opponent, Ivory Anglin. With seven precincts reporting Sowder had 938 and Anglin 340.

In another contested race, that of Magistrate of the Third District, Republican F. Robbins is leading Democrat R. H. Haman 49 to 21. In the magistrate's race in the Fourth District Bill Green—a write-in candidate—is leading J. S. Swinford 157 votes to 117 votes.

Other candidates are unopposed. Their totals will be reported as soon as election returns are complete.

In the state race for clerk of the Court of Appeals, in the county Charles Malcolm Green had 791 votes and Miss Doris Owens has 370 votes.

In the two constitutional amendments, both were losing in Rockcastle. Amendment 1, Yes, 123; no, 191. Amendment 2, Yes, 121; no, 238.

Though Rockcastle is headed for the Republican column, in other parts of the state the picture was somewhat different. Miss Owens is piling up a huge majority over her opponent, Green. At 5 p. m., Wednesday her lead was 119,000 votes. Statewide, the constitutional amendments appeared headed for defeat.

In areas of the nation, the picture was also almost completely on the Democratic side. Democrats swept most of the top races indicating an apparent dissatisfaction with the Eisenhower administration's military domestic program.

The Democrats won the big ones—with victories in New Jersey and Virginia, as well as the reelection of Robert Wagner, mayor of New York City. Although Wagner was expected to win, the nearly a million vote majority was a surprise.

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### Ada Stella Sexton, 72; Dies At Climax

Ada Stella Sexton, 72, of Climax, died Nov. 2, after an illness of two years.

Mrs. Sexton was a native of Rockcastle County, the daughter of Johnny and Martha Phillips. She married James Sexton who preceded her in death. She was a member of Sychmore Christian Church.

She is survived by three sons, one daughter, several grandchildren, three great-grandchildren, two brothers and two sisters.

Funeral services were conducted Nov. 4, at Climax Christian Church, with Bro. Clifford Dean officiating. She was buried in Climax Cemetery. Sparks Funeral Home had charge of arrangements.

## Flu Epidemic Closes Schools

Reporting that Asian influenza has reached epidemic stage in Kentucky, Dr. Russell E. Teague, State health commissioner, is advising persons caring for flu patients to observe certain procedure.

Isolate patient from rest of family to protect them and to prevent patient from coming in contact with complicating germs.

Keep patient's personal articles— toothbrush, wash clothes, and dishes—separate from those of other family members.

Provide patient with disposable tissues and a paper bag in which to discard them. Burn used tissues. Person caring for patient should wash hands after each service to the flu victim.

Keep record of patient's temperature morning and night. Refresh patient with sponge baths. Heat in the form of a heating pad or hot water bottle comforts muscular aches and pain.

Keep room aired but free of drafts and maintain a temperature of 68 to 74 degrees.

During acute stage of illness, appetite, serve fruit juices, cereals cooked with milk, toast, creamed soup, custards and other simple nourishing foods. Limit patient to fluids as tolerated if stomach upset occurs. Have enough food of this type on hand to last a week in case all the adult members of the family get sick simultaneously.

Give convalescing patient time to regain strength. The flu is debilitating and leaves one liable to possible complications if exposed to other infectious or fatigues.

A safeguard in any illness is to call the physician. In order to prevent the Asian flu ask (Continued on page 4)

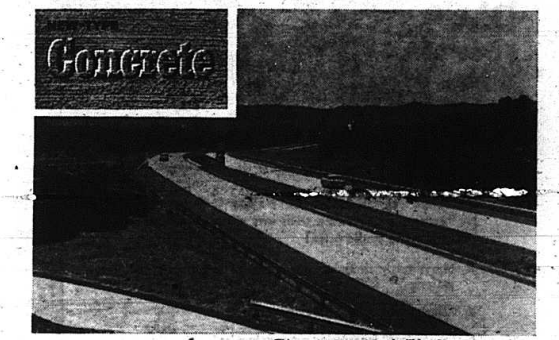

### Roads in County To Be Blacktopped

Gov. A. B. Chandler has announced plans to blacktop about 4,600 miles of state-maintained county roads.

Cost of blacktopping these roads, now mainly gravel or rock surfaced, was estimated by the governor at \$37,000,000.

The new plan calls for completion of the blacktopping, if possible, before the governor leaves office in December, 1959. Chandler said the plan is a continuation of the rural highway program he launched in 1936 during his first term as governor.

The governor directed Rural Highway Commissioner J. B. Wells to handle the new program and push it toward completion.

The governor said no estimate had been made of funds that might be available for the program from the federal government but added "we will take any we can get."

Wells said most of the money

would come from rural secondary road funds, collected at the rate of two cents a gallon on motor fuel sold in Kentucky, and from departmental funds expected to be freed by sale of state bonds to help Kentucky match federal road aid.

Chandler commented on the blacktopping plan that "this is one of the blessings we promised the people they could expect from passage of the road bonds, Kentuckians in November, 1956, approved issuance of \$100,000,000 worth of road bonds by a margin of about 6-1."

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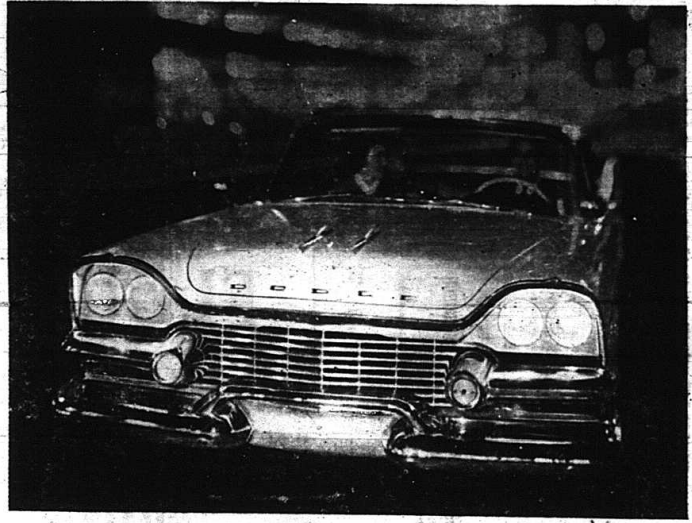
