At a special meeting of the Chairman and Board of Trustees of the City of Livingston, Kentucky, duly and legally held in said city on the 23rd day of November, 1957, the following members were present: W. E. Dillingham, Chairman, Harry L. Holland, Gilbert Bales and H. R. Mason. Absent: None...

Section 1. That there is hereby created and established a franchise or privilege, for the term of twenty (20) years from the date of the ratification of the sale hereof, to construct, operate and maintain lines of telephone system in the city of Livingston, Kentucky.

Section 2. That the work of erecting poles by virtue hereof shall be done under the supervision of qualified personnel provided by the purchaser and shall be properly protected by the purchaser...

Section 3. If consideration of such rights and privileges of the said purchaser shall demand provide space on one cross-arm on each pole on which the city of Livingston may desire to attach...

Section 7. The purchaser, its successors and assigns, shall proceed with diligence to obtain the necessary approvals of federal and or state agencies and shall begin the exercise of said franchise and privilege within two years from the date of confirmation of the sale...

Section 8. Within five days after passage and publication of this ordinance, the Chairman of the Board of Trustees, through the Clerk or other designated official, who is hereby commissioned to make due advertisement of said sale...

Section 9. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and publication as required by law.

Section 10. The foregoing ordinance was read at length and on motion of Gilbert Bales, seconded by Harry L. Holland, and was adopted by the following vote: All members voting in favor.

Section 11. That the work of erecting poles by virtue hereof shall be done under the supervision of qualified personnel provided by the purchaser and shall be properly protected by the purchaser...

ORDINANCE: AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF BRODHEAD, KENTUCKY, PROHIBITING THE BUILDING OF FIRES AND BURNING OF COMBUSTIBLE MATERIAL IN DITCHES AND CREEKS WITHIN THE CITY LIMITS OF BRODHEAD, KENTUCKY. THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE CITY OF BRODHEAD, KENTUCKY, DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

Election Returns Reported

Final returns in the Nov. 5 election for officials in Rockcastle County, its three cities and the State turned out about as expected.

The county has a new judge—Money Ed Cummins. It also has a new sheriff—Walter Sowder, and a new representative of the 79th District—Murphy Whitehead. The State has a new clerk of the Court of Appeals—Miss Doris Owens.

In the city election at Mt. Vernon, as reported last week, all councilmen, as well as the mayor are new. At Brodhead and Livingston, the "favorites" also won.

The total votes cast in the election in the various races are as follows, most of whom were unopposed:

Circuit Court Clerk: George Murphy, 2,432. County Court Clerk: Clarence Carter, 2,521. County Attorney: James Lambert, 2,414. Jailor: Lovell Clouse, 2,438. Coroner: Fred Murrell, 2,382. Surveyor: Aster Durham, 2,261. Tax Commissioner: Homer Hale, 2,416.

Magistrate, First District: G. H. Griffin, 668; Constable, First District: Cecil Chiles, 652. Magistrate, Second District, J. R. Pettit was a driver for the American Red Ball Transit Co. of Indianapolis, Ind. He parked his truck near the Farmers Feed and Supply Co., to take a nap and left the motor running to keep the cab warm.

The truck was seen parked in front of the feed mill about 1 p. m. Saturday. Ruel Thomas, manager of the mill, noticed it Sunday morning and notified Sunday morning and notified Sunday night, but apparently thought the truck was broken down. He did not investigate.

Johnny Brown, an employee of the mill, found Pettit early Monday morning and called police. A truck window had been broken in order to reach the victim.

A coroner's jury was called by Alfred Sparks and the man was pronounced dead from asphyxiation. It was estimated he had been dead about 35 hours. The body was frozen.

Mr. Pettit was wrapped in blankets. The car ignition was on, the heater was on, and all the gas was gone from one tank. It would have been necessary to turn the other tank on before it could have been used. The body was taken to Sparks Funeral Home and later shipped to Calina, Texas, where funeral services will be held today. He is survived by his wife and parents.

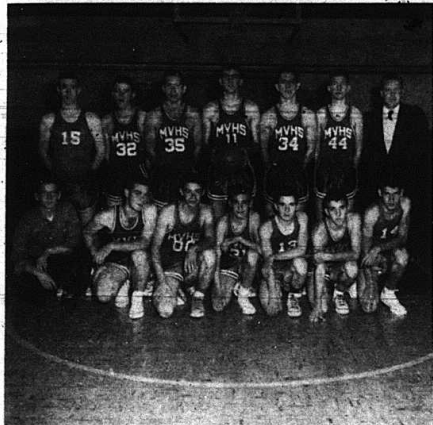

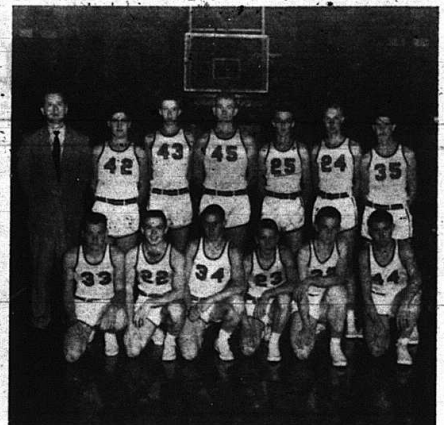

The Signal Says...

"A DAM FOR THE ROCKCASTLE RIVER

The announcement recently that a dam is being planned across the Rockcastle River near Livingston no doubt will be met, generally, with approval.

The dam is being considered near "River Bend" and would back water nearly to McKee. The dam would produce a shoreline about 200 miles, and would stand water an estimated 40 feet over the highway-bridge at Lamerco.

We are told by officials the dam is for conservation, and for flood control of the Cumberland River. Both these reasons are logical. But Rockcastle has a third "stake" in the dam. It could open up a tourist attraction for Rockcastle by producing fishing, boating and swimming areas, similar to Lake Cumberland.

The dam could have another good result. The county has always been low on water. Perhaps the new dam and water supply will attract industry to the area. If not Rockcastle, at least near Rockcastle.

Some persons will no doubt lose their homes and land with the construction of the dam. This is unfortunate. But one good point, of the land that will be underwater, at least 85 percent of it is already owned by the government. Undoubtedly, the remaining will be purchased.

The "ball is rolling" for the dam. Committees have been set up and Sen. John Sherman Cooper is taking care of many of the details in Washington. U. S. engineers are making their technical investigation.

The road to final completion of the dam will be a long and rocky road. But perhaps the "gold" at the end of the road might make the trip worthwhile.

Early results in experiments at Princeton Experiment Station to measure effect of different rates of nitrogen and potassium on yield and quality of tobacco, have indicated tobacco dicot "not-too-favorable" results.

That's the report this week from the Princeton Experiment Station's agronomy department. "A three-year rotation of tobacco, oats, grass and legume hay, in home grass and legume hay, is being followed," the researchers said. "The experiment has not progressed far enough to draw definite conclusions as to the effect of the different rates of fertilization on the yield and quality of the tobacco."

Early results indicate that very high rates of potassium fertilization tend to make the leaf too thin for the best quality tobacco.

Commissioners J. E. Luckett, general and James W. Martin, tax collector, reported that the general fund receipts for the first quarter of the fiscal year were 3 percent greater than had been estimated.

They warned that recent economic developments make a continuation of this trend appear doubtful. Comparisons for a single quarter are not indicative of what may happen during the entire fiscal year.

General fund tax receipts were \$26,139,347, or 22 percent over last year, but only 2.7 percent more than the estimate of \$25,451,445. Individual income tax receipts for the quarter were \$11,469,135 or 6.2 percent over last year, but only 0.4 percent more than the estimate of \$10,800,000. All the selected sales taxes, except cigarette, were a head of the estimates. They were all ahead of last year except for amusement taxes which had a rate reduction. Distilled spirits production and import taxes continue above expectations—25 percent above the estimate and 9.5 percent over last year.

The corporation income tax was the principal soft spot, down 13 percent from last year and \$617,175 off the \$2,000,000 estimate. Part of this is due to processing, but much of it appears to be the result of lower profits for some corporations filing on a fiscal year basis.

Road fund tax receipts were 13.3 percent ahead of last year, but only 3.5 percent above the \$18,585,851 in the estimate. Motor fuels taxes were 2 percent greater than the estimate. September sales pulled the motor vehicle usage tax ahead of last year for the quarter and nearly 15 percent ahead of the estimate of \$1,800,000.

Check Requirements

The U. S. Post Office will not accept overseas gift parcels that do not conform to the export control regulations and the regulations of the country of destination governing the contents of the package and other requirements.

Farm Bureau Reports Recommendations For Burley

The Kentucky Farm Bureau Federation has announced its recommendations to the U. S. Department of Agriculture on price supports for this year's Burley tobacco crops.

Officials of the Department in Washington have indicated that the price support for the 1957 crop will be increased more than \$3.00 per hundred weight, due to increased production costs and other factors.

After careful consideration by its State Tobacco Committee, the Farm Bureau Board of Directors has recommended that the new price support figures for the various grades reflect the market trend toward the

higher, darker grades. In a letter to all county Farm Bureau presidents, State President Burl S. St. Clair, outlines the organization's official position: "The Kentucky Farm Bureau Federation, by action of its Board of Directors, is taking the position that the buying pattern of the last two years should be reflected in this year's level of price supports. This, according to research and information available, will mean more money to growers for this year's crop of tobacco, for future years' crops, and will contribute to a long-term sound program."

Because it feels that two years may not be sufficient time to definitely assess the present market trend toward the heavier darker grades, the Farm Bureau is recommending the \$2.00 per hundred weight be applied equally to all grades, (sometimes referred to as a across-the-board), and will remain the increase to be placed on the darker grades.

"It does not appear realistic," St. Clair continues, "to disregard completely the greatly increased demand for these more

aromatic grades, which are needed in filter tip cigarettes. We feel that this recommendation is to the best interests of Burley producers, will give us more money for our Burley tobacco, will preserve our tobacco program, and keep it sound."

State School Lunches Reported On Increase

Almost five and a half million more school lunches were served last year to Kentucky school children than were served in 1955, according to records of the USDA. In the nation as a whole, there was a gain of nine and a half percent when nearly a half billion noon lunches were served.

The value to the school child in stronger bodies, in better health and in improved study habits would be difficult to over-estimate, say nutritionists at the University of Kentucky.

A part of the food for the lunches is purchased locally, the national total cost being \$97,923,344. In addition, a considerable quantity is received from the USDA for use in the program.

For example, nearly a third of the cases caused by diphtheria bought by the government this year will be used in the South-eastern states, Kentucky receive-
