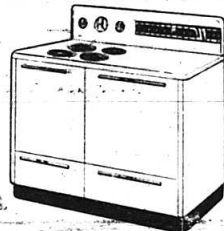

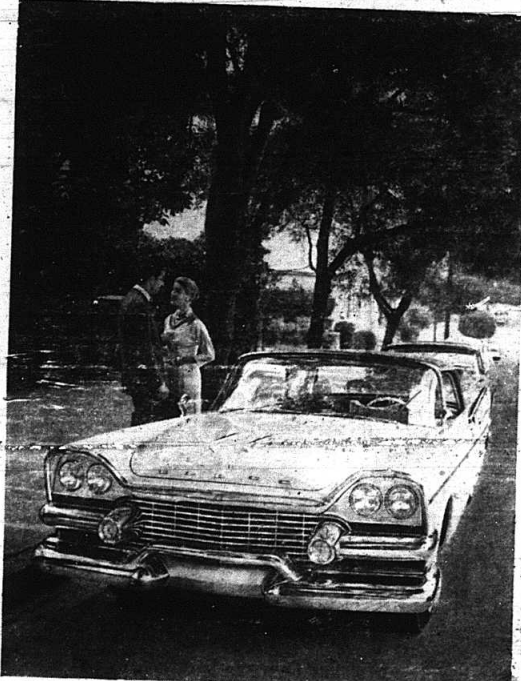

ORDINANCE NO. 51

At a special meeting of the Chairman and Board of Trustees of the City of Livingston, Kentucky, duly and legally held in said city on the 12th day of November, 1957, the following members were present: R. G. Webb, Sam Hancock, Harry L. Holland, Gilbert Bales and H. R. Mason. Absent: None.

The following ordinance was introduced by R. G. Webb and publicly read by James W. Lambert:

AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR THE SALE OF A FRANCHISE OR A PRIVILEGE TO CONSTRUCT, OPERATE AND MAINTAIN LINES OF TELEPHONE, INCLUDING NECESSARY POLES, FIXTURES AND ELECTRICAL COMMUNICATION CONDUCTORS UPON, ALONG, OVER AND UNDER THE PUBLIC ROADS AND STREETS, ALLEYS AND HIGHWAYS OF THE CITY OF LIVINGSTON, KENTUCKY FOR A PERIOD OF TWENTY (20) YEARS.

The Board of Trustees of the City of Livingston does ordain as follows:

Section 1. That there is hereby created and established a franchise or privilege for a term of twenty (20) years from the date of the ratification of the sale hereof, to construct, operate and maintain lines of telephone, including the necessary poles, fixtures and electrical communication conductors upon, along, over and under the public roads, streets, alleys and highways of the city of Livingston, Kentucky...

Section 2. That the work of erecting poles and fixtures shall be done under the supervision of qualified personnel provided by the purchaser and shall be done at the expense of said purchaser...

Section 3. In consideration of such rights and privileges, the said purchaser shall demand provide space on one cross-arm on each pole on which the city of Livingston may desire to attach any of its police or fire alarm telegraph wires...

Section 4. Said purchaser shall at all times be subject to the city ordinances now in existence or which may hereafter be passed relative to the use of the public streets by telephone companies.

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF BRODHEAD, KENTUCKY PROHIBITING THE BUILDING OF FIRES AND THE BURNING OF COMBUSTIBLE MATERIAL IN DITCHES AND DITCH LINES WITHIN THE CITY LIMITS OF BRODHEAD, KENTUCKY.

Section 1. That it shall be unlawful for any person or persons to build a fire or burn any combustible material, including leaves and trash, in any ditch line or street line within the city limits of the City of Brodhead, Kentucky.

Section II. Violation of section I of this ordinance shall constitute a misdemeanor, with a penalty, upon conviction, of a fine of not less than Five (\$5.00) Dollars or more than Fifty (\$50.00) Dollars, for each offense.

Rockcastle Hit By Strong Wind And Rain



When it rains, it pours, and pour it did in Rockcastle and Kentucky from Saturday through Monday night, dropping nearly three inches of water over the area.

A total of 2.97 inches fell in Mt. Vernon between 7:30 a. m. Monday and 7:30 a. m. Tuesday, with most of it coming between 3 p. m. and 8 p. m. Monday. Water was highest since 1948. Total November rainfall in Mt. Vernon stands at 4.21 inches.

The down pour sent streams out of their banks. Water covered U. S. 25 in low areas between Roundstone and Conway. Highway department crews put up markers so motorists could find the highway.

Downtown Brodhead, was caught in the middle of the deluge with water over the curbs. Water was over the bridges at Brodhead. Wildlife was cut off from Roundstone. Water poured down from the surrounding hills. Mr. and Mrs. Glenn Miller of Barfield, worked to save outside furniture as water crept around their trailer home.

The Rockcastle River, freed by Roundstone and other creeks was within three feet of New U. S. 25, about a half mile south of Roundstone. Two people were drowned when their car plunged into a ditch flooded by eight feet of water.

Mrs. Viola Reynolds McPherin of Bandy, near Somerset, was electrocuted while stripping tobacco leaves.

Another mother saw her 10-year-old daughter killed by lightning which leaped from a wall plug and struck her while she slept.

A 38-tornado passed through Danville destroying a tobacco house containing tobacco. Damage at Danville was estimated at \$120,000.

Hazard braced for a flood. State Police reported that the North Fork of the Kentucky River above normal, but there is no immediate danger.

Some 40 residents of Corbin have been evacuated. Water has flooded some houses. Highway 28 near Corbin, is covered with water in some low areas.

Farm Housing Loans Again Available Construction and repair of farm houses and other farm buildings financed by Farmers Home Administration loans this year, just as was done last year.

A total of \$21,300,000 was borrowed by American farmers last year for the building, improvement or financing of houses or other farm buildings, or to provide water for farmstead or household use.

The Farm Administration does not compete with conventional or cooperative lenders, explained Mrs. Gladys Lickers, UK Extension home management specialist, but it does supplement the credit services supplied by other services.

Loans are provided by FHA only when a bank or other lender cannot adequately serve the farm owner's credit needs at the present time.

A routine inspection of the restaurants, motels, grocery stores and other public places was conducted by William E. Montgomery, State Supervisor of Sanitation, and Robert D. Hayes, Rockcastle County Sanitarian last week.

The majority of these public places received "good" ratings.

A total of 280 inspections of public places was made in Rockcastle County last week.

Restaurants are inspected at least four times yearly, grocery stores and motels—once a year.

Sanitarian complaints—anything that may be a menace to the health of the community—may be examined by the State and local sanitarians.

It is the duty of the sanitarian to help Rockcastle maintain a healthful standard of living, by working with community groups for clean homes, clean farms, clean businesses and industry, a clean neighborhood and a clean community.

The sanitarian is trained to be aware of the potential health dangers which may exist such as: unsafe water and milk supply, polluted streams, garbage or trash dump that is a menace and uncontrolled rats, flies and mosquitoes.

By being sure that the local and state laws relating to sanitation are carried out, the sanitarian is working out the interest of the community.

600,000 Kentuckians will receive the TB Seal in the next few days, said John W. Woods Jr., president of the Keyhole Tuberculosis Association, in announcing the opening of the annual fund-raising drive.

"Modern drugs and surgery are giving a new lease on life to many who formerly were doomed to die of TB," Woods said optimistically.

The first shipment of books under the Regional Library Plan have arrived and are in circulation. The program is made possible by new Federal and State aid.

fore, and more people are under treatment for the disease.

"None of the so-called 'miracle drugs' have been able to kill the TB germs and the search for a preventive vaccine continues. In the meantime, tuberculosis continues to spread in Kentucky. With 12,000 of our citizens suffering from active TB, our state has the second worst tuberculosis problem in the nation. About 2,000 new TB cases are reported each year, and 422 Kentuckians died of the disease last year."

Christmas Seal funds provide the only means of support for the year 'round work of tuberculosis associations. Ninety-four percent of the money raised in Kentucky remains here to fight TB on local and statewide levels. Six percent is sent to the National Tuberculosis Association to help support the nationwide program of research and education.

County Needy Received \$31,101 During October
