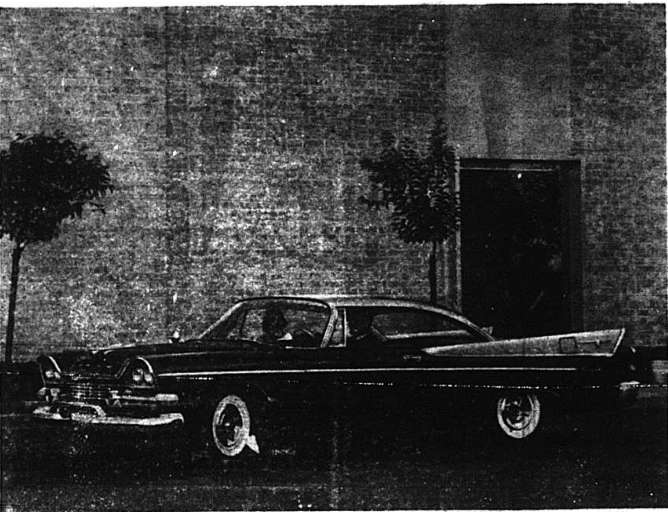

He pointed out the importance of credit to our country, and said that the Ford Motor Co., General Motors, Banks and the Government, along with many other important organizations and businesses, would have to close, were there no credit.

Improper use of electricity can kill you—properly used, life is enhanced. However, Mr. Johnstone said he would advise no one to use credit, if it could possibly be avoided.

Auxiliary Plans 2 New Projects

An auxiliary room, and a Christmas Party for patients and personnel of the Rockcastle County Baptist Hospital, are new projects voted at the last regular meeting of the Women's Hospital Auxiliary, according to an announcement by Mrs. Arthur Johnson, president.

A storage room in the hospital basement will be converted into the auxiliary room, by erecting a partition, painting, decorating, adding tables, chairs and a desk.

Mrs. Johnson said the room will be used as a chapel, in Chaplain's office, and as a meeting place for the auxiliary and Grey Ladies.

The project is one of the largest attempted by the organization Mrs. Johnson reports. Completed projects include: 230 Testaments bought and given to mothers of each baby born at the hospital; 24 Bibles bought and placed in each patient's room; drapes made for each room, including large drapes for lobby; small tables bought for delivery room; fernery purchased for lobby; ten robes made for patients; 14 pair of bedroom slippers made for patients; baby clothes contributed by the privileged children; toy cards made for patients; scrap books made for children.

Incomplete projects include robes and pajamas being made for male patients. The auxiliary has 83 members.

FIRE DISCOVERED FROM AIRPLANE

Airplanes are so handy in ways other than transportation, Dan Krueger, 38, son of Mrs. Carrie Krueger, former resident of Mt. Vernon, discovered last week.

FHA Loans Available From Private Sources

O. M. Howard, State Director of the Federal Housing Administration, announced today that to date 30,000 American families have obtained approximately 270 million dollars in mortgage loans from private lenders through the facilities of the Voluntary Home Mortgage Credit Program.

This program exists for the purpose of channeling mortgage credit from areas of plenty into areas where mortgage credit is scarce. In Kentucky mortgage credit is scarce in almost all small communities and, in fact all counties in Kentucky are eligible for VHMC services except those in Fayette, Jefferson, Kenton and McCracken Counties.

Persons who are unable to obtain FHA loans locally for buying or building homes may get the assistance of the Voluntary Home Mortgage Credit Committee by writing: Executive Secretary, VHMC Regional Office, Room 404, U. S. Courthouse, Nashville 3, Tennessee.

The Executive Secretary, Mr. Benjamin Ernst, will then take the assistance of the prospective home owner and refer it to one of the banks or insurance companies who have agreed to participate in the program. The bank or insurance company will then forward the application to the FHA for processing.

After FHA has processed the loan, the deal can be closed and the applicant moves into his new home.

While this process takes longer than the usual mortgage transaction it is a method of obtaining financing in areas where none exists.

Mr. Howard stated that this is a private enterprise approach to mortgage lending. All of the participating lenders are privately owned.

PSC Gets Phone Tariff

In order to allow the Rockcastle Telephone Co. to provide to residents who need and demand telephones, the company filed a petition with the Public Service Commission at Frankfort, Thursday, to establish a tariff effective Jan. 1.

The new tariff designates officially and for the first time, two-party, four-party and multi-party tariff service.

The petition to the PSC points out that the establishment of the new types of service in Rockcastle would mean the company can use existing facilities that have been available but not in use. It also points out that all parties desiring this service would have to agree to be on a line with another person.

The petition also states that persons in the county who have been using two or more party service on a single line will now have a lower rate.

The new tariff is as follows: In the base rate area—that is, a one mile radius beginning at the exchanges at Mt. Vernon and Brodhead, and a similar area in Livingston, an individual business line will be \$4.25; extension phone, same building, \$1.75; two-party line, \$4.15. Residential—individual line, \$3.25; two-party line, \$3.15; four-party line, \$3; extension phone, same building, \$1.25.

Outside the base rate area, a business multi-party phone will be \$4; and residential a multi-party phone \$3.

Other rates on mileage and miscellaneous equipment will be found in an advertisement on another page in this issue.

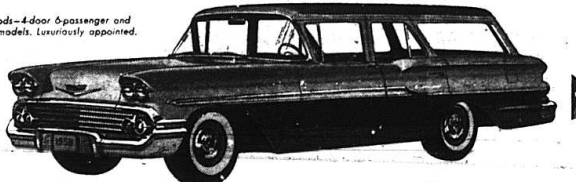
