# Farm And Home News

## MAKE IT A SAFE CHRISTMAS

During Christmas holidays, your home probably contains more fire hazards than at any other time of the year. Here are some precautions from the University of Kentucky Extension Service to avoid fire:

Select a freshly cut tree just a few days before Christmas; cut the base diagonally and then set the tree in a can of water, refilling it every day; place the tree away from the fireplace, powerful electric lights, radiators and other sources of heat, use approved lights for the tree, and check them carefully for frayed cords and damaged sockets.

Underwriters Laboratories approved lights for the tree, and check them carefully for frayed cords and damaged sockets; use only additional lights, toys and appliances; use only nonflammable decorations on the tree; turn the tree lights off when retiring or leaving the house; discard the tree when the needles become dry and fall off; take Christmas wrappings from the room as soon as packages are unwrapped.

## Carbon Monoxide Danger To Motorists

The death of a truck driver from carbon monoxide, in Rockcastle County recently points up the importance of watching for inadequate ventilation and faulty exhausts.

Cold weather brings increasing danger of death from carbon monoxide poisoning in inadequate ventilation and faulty exhausts and heating equipment usually are responsible.

Last year in Kentucky four persons accidentally lost their lives from automobile exhaust fumes and twelve were victims of gas fumes from heaters and the like. An undetermined number died or were involved in automobile accidents as a result of sleepiness or illness caused by carbon monoxide fumes.

## FARMER'S TAX GUIDE

County Extension agents have just received a supply of the Internal Revenue Service Publication No. 225, "Farmer's Tax Guide" (1958 edition). It is well indexed so that farmers can find answers to their specific questions on income tax and social security. County agents think this booklet will help a farmer to understand the expense, depreciation, and other deductions he may claim, thus avoiding more than his share of income taxes. Ask for a copy at the County Extension Office. The supply is limited—get a copy while they are available.

Normally, the carbon monoxide given off by the motor of an automobile, escapes harmlessly through the exhaust. However, if it enters a closed vehicle or garage, it can cause headache, drowsiness, eventual coma and death. To eliminate this danger, a vehicle's exhaust system should be thoroughly checked.

Drivers also should avoid remaining too close to the exhaust of a preceding car, especially in traffic, although danger from this source is less marked. Another safety measure is to see that there is adequate ventilation at all times. Gas water heaters need to be checked frequently for proper operation. They should always be vented to the outside air and flues should be equipped with a draft hood in order to prevent a back draft from extinguishing the flame. For automatic heaters, safety devices which will shut off the gas supply to the main burner if the pilot is extinguished, are recommended. Coal burning heaters can also produce carbon monoxide. Thus, flue piping, chimneys and dampers need to be checked regularly.

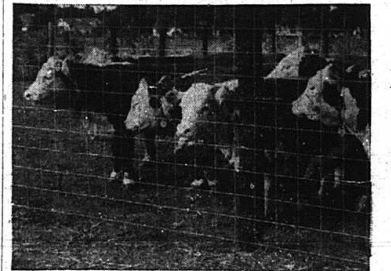
