"There's a real ball club." Those were the words of Coach Preston Parrett after his Livingston Blue Devils had just won the Berea Foundation School Invitational Tournament. The Blue Devils defeated Tyler for the Championship by the score of 46 to 38. It was their sixth victory in the last nine days.

Besides winning the championship, the Livingston quintet also placed two men, Paul Sturgill and Tilton Owens on the all star tournament team, and contributed the most valuable man in the tournament, Paul Sturgill. Livingston was picked to win the tournament by Berea Coach C. H. Wyatt immediately following the tourney playings. The ten point championship victory was the narrowest margin of the three games won by Livingston in the tournament. Tyler jumped out in front of Livingston in the first few minutes of the game and threw up a tight 1-2-2 zone defense that stopped the Blue Devils in the first quarter. Capitalizing on Livingston's miscues and employing the fast break, the Tyler Cardinals looked as though they were out to win the title as they held a 13 to 8 first quarter rest margin.

In the second quarter, Tyler kept right on rolling, but Paul Sturgill finally found the range and kept the Blue Devils within scoring distance as he poured in ten points in the second quarter. Sturgill scored all but two of Livingston's points in the second quarter which wound up 21 - 20 in favor of Tyler.

After the intermission the Livingston quintet broke the game wide open as Walter Ballinger stole the ball twice and scored. From this point on the Blue Devils were never in trouble. Putting on an all court press and getting their fast break to working, the victors rolled to a 35 - 30 third quarter advantage.

At the start of the final quarter, the Livingston boys began to see victory within their grasp and played heads up ball as they capitalized on Tyler's mistakes and lack of bench strength. Tyler's Roy King fouled out with three minutes to go in the game, and from here on it was Livingston's game all the way. Tyler's Coach, Jack Powell, felt seeing that the game was lost, showed his coaching ability as he substituted freely in the last minute and a half. Coach Parrett, of Livingston, considered the victory a team (Continued on page 4)

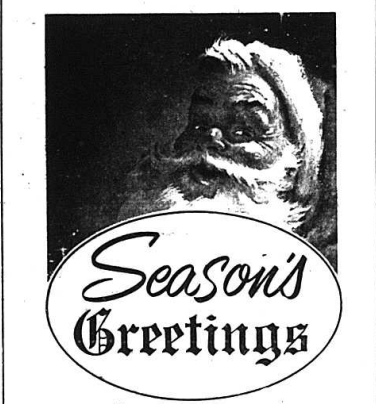

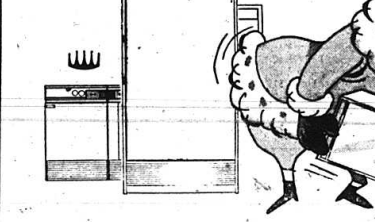

New Uses Sought For Tobacco

When the 1958 General Assembly convenes a bill will be introduced to set up a project at the University of Kentucky to do research into new uses for tobacco grown in the state.

The measure will be offered by Representative Gilbert W. Kingsbury and Senator James C. Ware, both of Kenton Co.

They cited the increase in foreign tobacco imports, the decrease in the use of Kentucky-grown tobacco, the use of processed leaf and the ever-present threat of added cuts in tobacco acreage.

"It is imperative that something be done to avoid a possible tobacco depression which would hurt every citizen of the state-city or rural," both men said.

They cited experiments in other states where research developed uses for major crops. One state, it was pointed out, found ways to use wheat straw for wall board. Another used surplus milk in plastic production.

The cost of such research could be charged as insurance against a depression or recession," Ware and Kingsbury said.

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
