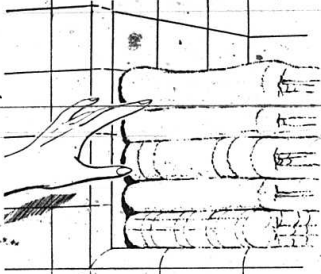

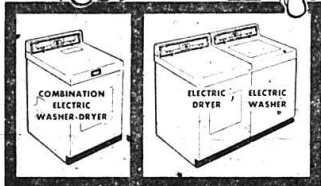

4-H Tractor Maintenance Course To Be Taught

Final plans were made Monday, by a committee for a Tractor Maintenance Course to be taught to 4-H and FFA members, beginning Feb. 8th, at the Mt. Vernon High School Farm Shop.

Harry Harmon, who is connected with the Southern States Agency, will be the instructor. Harry recently spent four days at the University of Kentucky, where he received instructions on how to conduct the course.

This course will consist of eight lessons on such things as safety, operator's manual, air cleaner's service, spark plug, wiring, battery service, engine lubrication, etc.

This program is sponsored by Earl Hammons, local Standard Oil Distributor. Each student enrolling in the course will be furnished a workbook by the Standard Oil Company. Local machinery dealers who will cooperate in the course include: L. D. Bryant, hardware and machinery dealer and Wayne Stewart, Southern States Agent.

After the course is completed each boy will be given an opportunity to participate in a County Tractor Driving Contest, which will participate in a District Contest and the district winner in the junior and senior divisions will participate in the State 4-H and FFA Tractor Driving Program at the Kentucky State Fair.

VIBRIOSIS

An infectious disease known as vibriosis causing an infectious sterility of cattle and abortion in sheep and cattle has been found to be present in Kentucky livestock. In all probability, the infection is not new to this state, but has been diagnosed here only in recent months.

The Southern Agricultural Experiment Stations, including the University of Kentucky, are engaged in a cooperative regional project for research on vibriosis. It is important for the success of the research efforts that the University obtain aborted fetuses from both cattle and sheep in as fresh a condition as possible. It is requested that livestock owners submit aborted fetuses to the Experiment Station because the examinations of such specimens is in many cases the most accurate means of determining the cause of sterility problems and abortions. During the month of February each group will decide which area of Homemaking they would rather study for the coming year. Foods, Clothing, Home Furnishings, or Home Management and report to another planning conference which is scheduled for Feb. 24.

Many Diseases On Decline Health Department Reports

Immunizations and sanitation programs deserve the credit for cutting down many diseases, Dr. Walker Owens, director of the Rockcastle Health Department, reported this week.

During the past year the Rockcastle Health Department has administered 5,708 immunizations for diphtheria, typhoid, smallpox, whooping cough and polio. This record repeated year after year, is probably the reason there has been no proven case of typhoid or diphtheria in Rockcastle in the last 15 years, and no case of smallpox in the last 20 years.

The "pet project" of the Health Department is the rheumatic fever control program. There are seven in the county now, who receive Bi-Clon tablets, which are furnished free, by the Heart Association. The Health Department ferrets out the cases and recommends to the Heart Association, which cannot afford their own tablets.

Rheumatic fever usually attacks children and damages their heart. Three children are now on the waiting list for a heart operation. Two children will go to Lexington clinic next month, for heart operations.

A tri-county heart clinic was held the past year, and 27 from Rockcastle were examined. While the mobile chest x-ray unit was in Rockcastle last spring, 1,589 persons were x-rayed and 12 new cases were discovered. Another 225 x-rays were made at the sanatorium in London.

There are 45 active cases of tuberculosis in the county now. Twenty of these have been in the hospital in the past year. At the present time there are five hospitalized, which exceeds our quota by two patients. It is the duty of the Health Department to see that these patients who are released from the hospital, at London or other places, take 18 to 24 tablets daily, get en-

Mr. Kincer will leave Sunday, for Buffalo, N. Y., where he will close the Atomic Energy Commission office there. He will then leave for Eniwetok Island which is in the Marshall Group of Islands in the South Pacific.

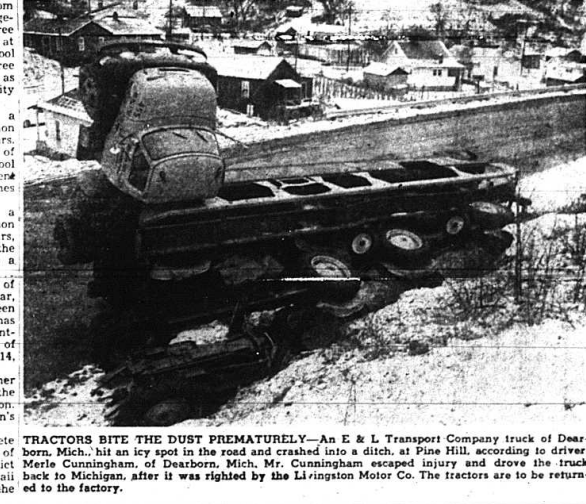

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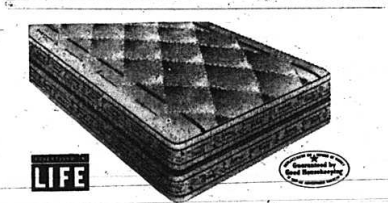
