## Easter Seal Drive Scheduled Mrs. Henderson Chairman

Mrs. Jack Henderson of Mt. Vernon, has been named chairman of the 1958 Easter Seal Appeal for crippled children in Rockcastle County, she announced by G. L. McElroy, Eminence, state chairman. Dates for the 1958 campaign have been set for a later request through April 6. During that period Easter Seals will be mailed to 400,000 Kentuckians together with a letter requesting a contribution to further the work of the Kentucky Society for Crippled Children. During this period aid was given to a total of 3,066 physically handicapped children by the Society. An additional 6,494 received direct help from the Society in cooperation with such agencies as the Kentucky Crippled Children Commission and the State Department of Education. Cost of the program to the Society was \$287,201, of which \$223,965 was raised through the sale of Easter Seals. The funds financed hospital and medical care, therapy, special schooling, equipment, and other services for children throughout Kentucky. In releasing these statistics, McElroy said, "Easter Seal funds provide a broad program of service for physically handicapped children throughout Kentucky. The response of Kentuckians to the Easter Seal Appeal makes it possible for the Society to reach additional children each year."

## Woodall Convicted School Law Violation

Leonard Woodall of Brodhead, was fined, Saturday, by Judge Money Ed Cummins, for failure to send his children to school. He went to jail. Woodall has four children who are listed to attend Brodhead School. The case was delayed three weeks while Woodall sought witnesses. He told the court his children did not go to school because they couldn't get across the creek. John L. Saylor, Rockcastle County Attorney, said, "people evidently aren't aware that conviction can, or will occur, when the attendance law is violated."

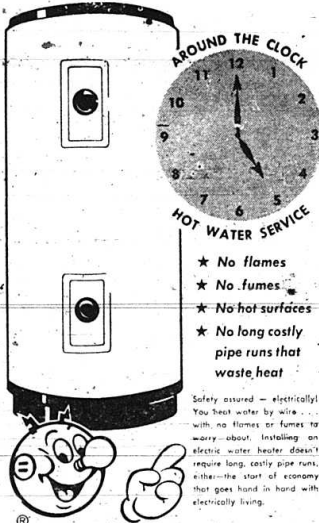
